

THE BRITISH COLUMBIA VOCATIONAL SCHOOL TERRACE

The success of British Columbia's vocational training programme is due very largely to the fact that a number of agencies, all vitally interested in the development of a skilled labour force, cooperate in the planning and operation of each school.

While the Terrace Vocational School was designed, and its construction supervised, by the British Columbia Department of Public Works, a Site Selection Advisory Committee was of invaluable assistance. It consisted of representatives of the Technical and Vocational Training Branch of the Department of Education, a representative of the Federal and Provincial Departments of Labour and representatives of the trade union movement and of business management.

Advisory committees, established to assist school authorities in determining the kind of training required by industry and the content of the various courses, have been established for the various training programmes. They too have a broad representation from the Departments of Education and Labour, the Federal Department of Manpower and Immigration, labour and management.

OBJECTIVE OF THE SCHOOL

The objective of the school is to train men and women in the fields of their choosing so that they may be able to enter business or industry, not as fully qualified personnel, but with sufficient practical experience, related knowledge, and academic background to make them useful and productive workers on commencement of employment. In addition, these facilities are used to upgrade the skills and related knowledge of persons presently employed and to retrain those people who have become unemployed due to technological change.

TRAINING PROGRAMMES

PRE-EMPLOYMENT: A range of courses are offered within the spectrum of job classifications to meet student aspirations and the needs of business and industry. They provide a foundation for entry into a new occupation and a climate for continued learning.

UPGRADING AND TRADE EXTENSION: Opportunities exist in all Regional Schools for upgrading basic skills, and knowledge of selected occupations, leading workers to improved productivity, advancement, and increased income.

PRE-APPRENTICESHIP: This training is provided to individuals desirous of entering a designated trade. By completing a pre-apprentice training programme a person becomes more readily acceptable for employment as an apprentice.

APPRENTICESHIP: This training is provided for individuals who have been indentured as apprentices and who are required to return to school to receive instruction in phases of their work that are not usually taught "on-the-job."

TERRACE British Columbia

Terrace is on the northern Canadian National Railway Trans-Canada route. It is also served by British Columbia Yellowhead Highway #16 and #25. It has a fully modern airport and is the halfway point for the Whitehorse—Vancouver air route. Specifically, Terrace is 90 miles east of Prince Rupert, 357 miles west of Prince George, 26 miles north of Kitimat, and 425 air miles northwest of Vancouver. It is on the 54 degree 30 minute parallel so it is not quite halfway between the southern and northern boundary of British Columbia. It has as its seaports Kitimat and Prince Rupert and for its interior all of northern British Columbia and central Canada. In particular, the area east of the Alaska Panhandle will be serviced through Terrace when the Cassiar—Stewart Highway is completed.

Terrace is strategically located in a region rich in natural and human resources. Combined, they offer a virtually unlimited scope for future development.
