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# REGISTRATION

THURSDAY OCT. 6th 7:30-9:00

Registration night will take place at G.M. Dawson School, Port Clements School, Queen Charlotte School, and A.L. Mathers. All N.W.C.C. courses must pre-register on this night. Registration for general interest courses may be made on the first night of class, but registration is on a first come first serve basis, so register early.

N.W.C.C. classes do not require any formal qualifications to enroll. Courses may be taken for credit or simply audited for information and enjoyment.

## PLEASE NOTE

General Education Development Tests (GED): Under this program an adult writes five tests (English Expression, English Literature, Science, Social Studies, and Mathematics) and if the candidate reaches a set standard, he is issued with a certificate from the Department of Education in Victoria stating that he has the equivalent of a Grade 12 education. To write the tests, a candidate must meet the following requirements: been out of school for one full academic year, be nineteen years of age, and lived in B.C. for six months. People who are interested in writing these tests may obtain application forms and more information by contacting the Continuing Education office in Queen Charlotte City or their local coordinator.

The Continuing Education office in Queen Charlotte City has a limited number of G.E.D. test "Practice Books" which are useful in preparing to take the test. The cost is \$5.75. If enough interest were indicated, it is possible that evening classes could be organized to review the basics covered by the G.E.D. Please let us know if you might be interested in further information.
