REGISTRATION

You are not formally registered for a course until the fee has been fully paid. If registration in a course is limited to a set number of people (e.g. 10, 15), you must pay your fee and not just sign up to guarantee that you have a place. The last opportunity to register and pay fees for a course will be before the second session. No one who has not registered and paid the course fee by this time will be allowed to continue in a course. Late entry into courses will be allowable upon the permission of the instructor, but the full fee must be paid at the first session the late entering student attends.

FEES

If you want to obtain educational counselling or advice about your future, please call the College Centre (842-5291) and make an appointment to see a member of the College counselling staff.



SUPERVISORY MANAGEMENT TRAINING

The Management Skills for Supervisors program is currently being offered throughout the College region. It includes 90 hours of integrated material covering a broad range of management skills. This is a Ministry of Education approved program. It is constructed to be highly experimental in nature and to attract the trainee towards involvement in his own training. To that end such devices as role plays, structured experiences, media experiences, self-scoring inventories and discussions have been liberally employed and supported by relevant theoretical concepts. The program is organized into three parts.

PART I Interpersonal Skills (3 days plus 1 day reinforcement)

PART II Group Skills (3 days plus 1 day reinforcement)

PART III Administrative Skills (3 days plus 1 day reinforcement)

The reinforcement module is normally held four to six weeks after the initial three days of teaching in conjunction with the next three day part. Northwest Community College in Hazelton will be offering Part I in response to requests from Band Offices and local business concerns.

Application deadline: To take the test you must apply at least two weeks before the testing date. Call or stop by the College office for an application form. Please let us know if you have applied to take the test.





VOCATIONAL AND TRADES TRAINING — TERRACE —

A. NEW DEVELOPMENTS IN VOCATIONAL TRAINING: In response to meeting individual student needs by providing a more flexible training system, the Vocational Division is presently developing course materials into package modules to ensure maximum flexibility for individualized training. This new system will allow students to enter programs at various times to progress according to their abilities. To accommodate this versatility in training, it will be essential for students in vocational training to apply as early as possible so that they can be fitted into the program.

1. CARPENTRY AND JOINERY — A pre-apprenticeship program to prepare men and women for employment as apprentices in the Carpentry trade in a four-year apprenticeship program.

The course is highly practical and provides students with a thorough grounding in equipment, materials correct use of tools and basic construction procedures.

- 2. COOK TRAINING PROGRAMS Program will have continuous intake. The objective of Cool Training is to prepare students in all the basic skills necessary to gain employment in the Hospitalit industry. For students who have an interest in working with the general public and a desire for permanent gainful employment.
 - a. GENERAL BASIC COOKING 12 months
 - b. CAMP COOKING 6 months
 - c. SHORT ORDER COOKING 3 months

3. GENERAL MECHANICS — This is a ten-month pre-employment program intended to prepare the student for employment in the mechanical field. On successful completion of this course, the student will have gained a basic knowledge of all phases of mechanics with training equal to pre-apprentice Heavy Duty Mechanics, Automotive Mechanics and pre-employment Marine Engine Mechanics.

4. MARINE ENGINE REPAIR — This program provides training on current equipment used in the marine engine mechanics field. It will include training in two and four stroke gasoline and diesel engines as well as in major propulsion systems. Upon completion of this course, the students will be able to diagnose and repair all major components of marine engine systems as well as other small engines such as snowmobiles, chain saws, lawnmowers, etc. (For further information contact Mr. T. Kenna, Northwest Community College, Terrace.)

DISTANCE EDUCATION AND KNOWLEDGE NETWORK

Northwest Community College recognizes that residents are denied the opportunity to continue their education due to family or geographic limitations. For many other people the programs they need or would like to take have traditionally not been available in the Northwest.

Distance Education is correspondence education in the broadest sense of the word. Programs are designed for guided independent study based on the use of print and non-print learning materials. In many cases the student is assisted by a telephone tutor to whom questions can be directed.

Northwest Community College is working cooperatively with the Knowledge Network of the West (KNOW) to bring a wide range of credit and non-credit programs to communities throughout the Northwest. In Hazelton these programs will be available at the College Centre. HEALTH SERVICES

In 1975 a Health Advisory Committee to the College was formed to advise the College on the continuing education needs of health workers in the northwest region.
