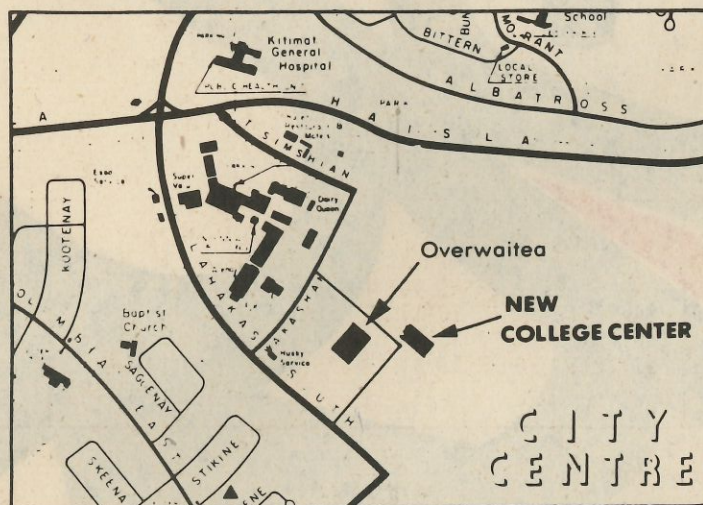
Introduction

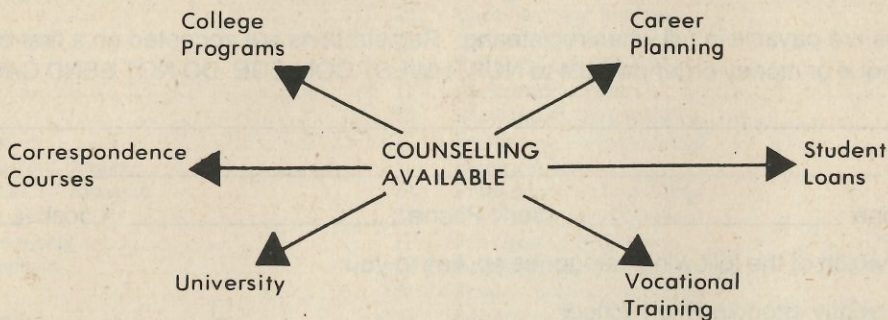

GRADE 12 EQUIVALENCY EXAMS (G.E.D.)

This examination program is for adults who have not completed grade 12, and who wish to earn a certificate stating they have the knowledge equivalent to a grade 12 graduate. The exam is actually a series of 5 tests, one in each of English Language, English Literature, Math, Social Studies and Science. This may assist you in qualifying for a better job or for a promotion. Many people challenge these tests for their own personal satisfaction. Students must prepare for these exams through home study. Texts and practice tests are available for sale from the college office. Next testing in Kitimat: Oct. 16 & 17, 1981, Feb. 5 & 6, 1982, June 11 & 12, 1982. Pre-registration required.

HUMAN SERVICE WORKER PROGRAM

Terrace campus

The Human Service Worker Program is a full-time career-technical program offered on the Terrace campus. It provides a basic training in the field of social services that will allow students to pursue paraprofessional helping careers, for example as child care workers, teacher aides, home-school co-ordinators, support workers, etc. With credits from the university transfer program and the HSW program, students may wish to pursue professional training at a university level, for example as social workers, counsellors, etc.

The HSW program offers a one-year certificate program and a two-year diploma program. Requirements for admission include suitable volunteer or work experience in a helping field, appropriate references and a medical and TB exam. Prospective students are interviewed prior to acceptance into the program.

Courses offered include those in psychology, interpersonal communications, understanding and changing behaviour, community services, written communications and field placements. These placements may be undertaken in the student's own community within the college region.

The HSW certificate may also be taken on a part-time basis at the local college centre, as some of the courses will be offered. For Fall 1981, Psychology 101 will be offered at the Kitimat Campus.

2. **Cook Training Programs** - Program will have continuous intake. The objective of Cook Training is to prepare students in all the basic skills necessary to gain employment in the Hospitality industry. For students who have an interest in working with the general public and a desire for permanent gainful employment. Opportunities are plentiful for graduates.

- a. GENERAL BASIC COOKING - 12 months
- b. CAMP COOKING - 6 months
- c. SHORT ORDER COOKING - 3 months



3. **General Mechanics** - This is a ten-month pre-employment program intended to prepare the student for employment in the mechanical field. On successful completion of this course, the student will have gained a basic knowledge of all phases of mechanics with training equal to pre-apprentice Heavy Duty Mechanics, Automotive Mechanics and pre-employment Marine Engine Mechanics.

4. **Marine Engine Repair** - This program provides training on current equipment used in the marine engine mechanics field. It will include training in two and four stroke gasoline and diesel engines as well as in major propulsion systems. Upon completion of this course, the students will be able to diagnose and repair all major components of marine engine systems as well as other small engines, such as snowmobiles, chain saws, lawnmowers, etc. (For further information contact Mr. T. 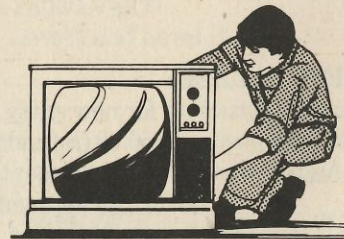


5. **General Welding** - General Welding will be following the Provincial Outline closely. At the present time the "C" Module Outline is complete and will be taught beginning in September. 6. **Industrial Records and First Aid** - To provide instruction in the maintenance of industrial records and to enable students to obtain a Class "C" certificate for Industrial First Aid. Opportunities are generally found in all industries which employ Timekeepers certified to perform first aid duties.
