
Introduction






1. Open Learning Institute

GRADE 12 EQUIVALENCY EXAMS (G.E.D.)

This examination program is for adults who have not completed grade 12, and who wish to earn a certificate stating they have the knowledge equivalent to a grade 12 graduate. The exam is actually a series of 5 tests, one in each of English Language, English Literature, Math, Social Studies and Science. This may assist you in qualifying for a better job or for a promotion. Many people challenge these tests for their own personal satisfaction. Students must prepare for these exams through home study. Texts and practice tests are available for sale from the college office. Next testing dates in Kitimat Feb. 6, 7, 1981 and June 12, 13, 1981. Pre-registration required.

REGULAR HIGH SCHOOL

Mount Elizabeth has provisions for adults who wish to attend regular classes. Students must be fluent in written and oral English. There are different forms of the intaglio technique but in each case the artist incises or erodes a metal plate — usually copper or zinc — with lines or pits that receive and trap the ink. It is, in fact, just the reverse principle of the relief method. If you think of the "in" in the word "intaglio" to mean bite into, you might find it easier to remember. The three major variations are: etching, drypoint and engraving.

SILKSCREEN

The serigraph (seri, meaning silk and graph, to write) is actually the fine art term for the silkscreen print, or as it is now commonly called, the screen print. The screen print image is created when a closely-woven fabric, such as silk, is stretched over a wooded frame and areas of the image are blocked out or masked. The screen is brought into close contact with the paper and ink is then forced through the pores in the fabric with the aid of a rubber squeegee. Screen prints are becoming very popular.

Full-time program in Terrace

Did you know that a number of full-time vocational programs begin in January and February? The following programs are offered in Terrace:

Entrance Requirements

Students must have an aptitude for the program. For most programs, grade 10 is the minimum educational background. Students who have obtained grade 12 graduation generally are more successful in the program and in finding employment upon completion. How to Apply

Application forms are available from any College Centre, or by writing to Northwest Community College, Box 726, Terrace, B.C. V8G 4C2.

What does it cost?

Students who pay their own fees pay \$16.00 per month in tuition. Costs for books, supplies and Student Association are kept to a minimum.

Sponsorship

Sponsorship may be available. Contact the College Center or the Canada Employment Centre for further information. Dormitory facilities are available on campus.

INDUSTRIAL RECORDS & FIRST AID (5 months - Start date: 2 february)

Students enrolled in this program will receive training in general clerical skills such as business machines, office procedures, typing, payroll and timekeeping, accounting and accident prevention. A large portion of the program is in preparing students to be examined for the industrial "C" First Aid ticket. Graduates will find employment as camp clerks, payroll departments, industrial relations officers, safety officers in combination with first aid duties.

GENERAL WELDING (10 months - Start date: 2 February)

This course covers areas such as safety trade theory and practices, oxy-acetylene welding and cutting procedures and arc welding techniques with emphasis on metallurgy blue print reading, sketching and layout in plate and structional fabrication. Practical projects are designed and involve layout, assembly and welding to specific measurements and tolerances. The shop work is designed to stimulate working conditions and training equipment is kept current to meet industrial standards. Upon successful completion of the 10 month General Welding program, the student will receive a diploma with eligibility to test to a D.P.W. No. 3 and D.P.W. No. 4. (For further information contact Mr. E. Marchand, Northwest Community College, Terrace).

MARINE ENGINE REPAIR (10 months - Start date: 2 February)

This program provides training on current equipment used in the marine engine mechanics field. It will include training in two and four stroke gasoline and diesel engines as well as in major propulsion systems. Upon completion of this course, the student will be able to diagnose and repair all major components of marine engine systems as well as other small engines such as snowmobiles, chain saws, lawnmowers, etc.

COOK TRAINING PROGRAMS (Begin 5 January and weekly thereafter).

Three Cook Training programs are offered for full-time students in the well equipped College Cafeteria. The 12-month General Cooking program covers all phases of basic cooking including the preparation and serving of soups, salads, sandwiches, meat cooking and vegetable preparation. Kitchen management, cost and inventory control and menu planning form an integral part of the full program. The 6-month Camp Cooking program uses components of the General Cooking program as they relate to quantity cooking and menu planning for those planning to seek employment as camp cooks. The 3-month Short Order Cooking program instructs students in the College's short order kitchen specifically for employment in fast food industry.


ELECTRONICS (10 months - Start date: 2 February)

Students obtain training on modern electronic training systems. Theories include basic AC & DC, semi conductor devices, electronic circuitry, digital techniques and micro processors in the first part of the course. Specific training in communications systems, home entertainment systems and maintenance. Micro processor programming and interfacing is also included. The student will be able to perform a wide range of duties at the technician level within the electronics industry. Emphasis on bench work and trouble shooting with hands on experience using upto-date test equipment with practical applications. (For more information contact Mr. E.
