REGISTRATION


HOW TO GET THE COURSE YOU WANT



The student will learn to construct a traditional leaded glass panel of a 12" x 18" cartoon (design). This involves the development skills such as:

- 1. Color Selection.
- 2. Glass cutting and grozing.
- 3. The use of lead channels in creating a window.
- 4. Soldering of lead joints.
- 5. Finishing the panel, puttying and cleaning techniques.

CANADA WORLD YOUTH

HAZELTON AREA TO HOST INTERNATIONAL EDUCATIONAL EXCHANGE

Sixteen young people who are participating in the Canada World Youth program will be visiting Hazelton for ten weeks this Fall. Half the people will be Canadians from all across the country and the other half, young people from throughout India.

Following discussions with representatives of local community groups and services, industry and business, and government departments, it was clear that Hazelton would be a very good community to be involved in the program.

The Hazelton area was identified as a good hosting community for many reasons, including its size, its economic base and its physical setting. The most important quality, however, is that the people in the area were interested in hosting the exchange.

Canada World Youth, a private non-profit organization now in its eleventh year of operation, is an international educational exchange involving young people from Asia, Africa, and Latin America. The participants generally range in age from 17 - 22. The purpose of the exchange is to increase participants' awareness of and interest in other cultures as well as issues of community, national and international development. For the participants, the program is seven months, half of which they spend living and doing volunteer work in a community in Canada and the other half in a community in the exchange country, in this case India. Two field staff representatives, one from Canada and one from India, will be responsible for co-ordinating and supervising the group while in the country.

People involved in hosting exchanges in other B.C. communities in previous years have been enthusiastic about the program. They say they have learned a great deal about other cultures and have enjoyed participating in the group's education programs. The organization also finds that once a community has hosted the exchange, more young people from the community apply to the program in following years.
