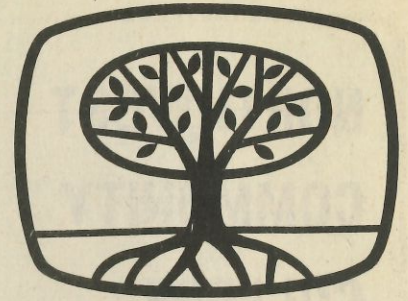

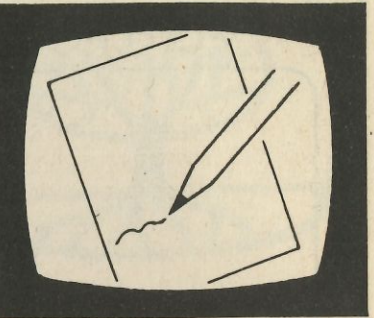

## USE YOUR HEAD

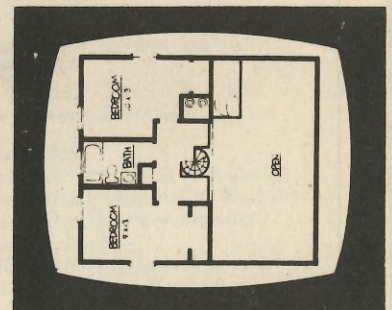

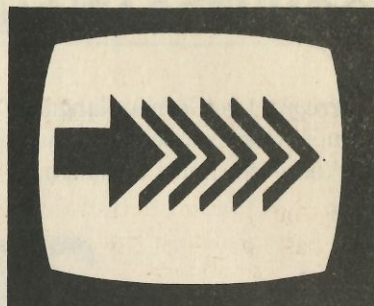

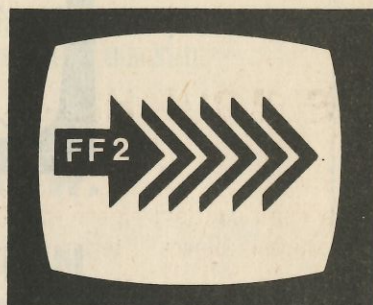

## GUTEN TAG

This introductory course is based on a series of 26 half-hour television programs broadcast on the Knowledge Network. These programs consist of exercises carried out by an instructor and a student (structured so that viewers can take part in them) and film episodes that feature incidents and events in the lives of a group of people who are learning German. By these means, the programs provide students with an understanding of grammar and vocabulary for basic conversation.

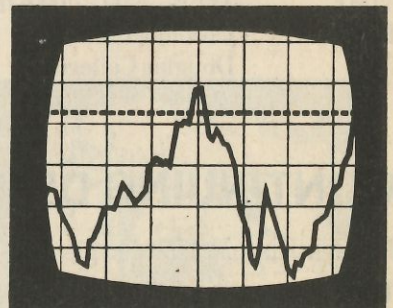
### UNDERSTANDING THE STOCK MARKET

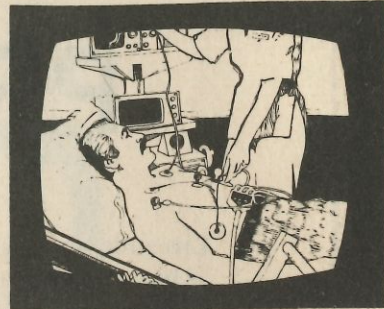


# HEALTH

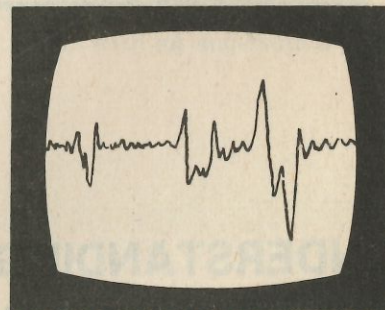

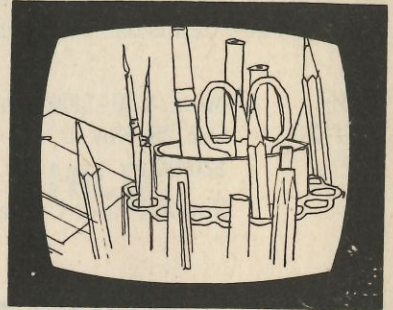

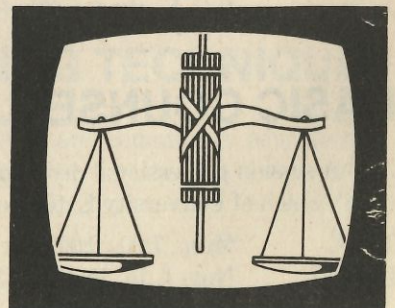
## CONTEMPORARY ISSUES IN CRIMINOLOGY AND CRIMINAL JUSTICE

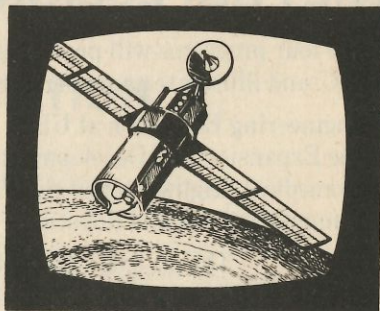
## BASIC INTRODUCTION TO BROADCASTING

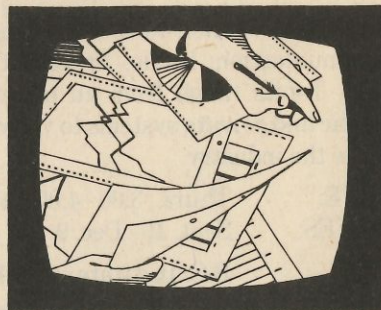

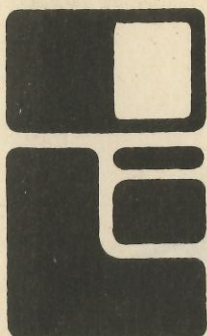

## UNDERSTANDING BEHAVIOR IN ORGANIZATIONS

(Equivalent to NWCC's BUS 275)

This course examines the fascinating subject of human behavior in organizations and provides an understanding of the complex relationships amongst human motivation, job satisfaction and productivity. Some of the major topics covered in the course include the following: human needs and motivation, quality of work life, power and conflict, women in management, communication within organizations, coping with technology and change, organizational behavior modification, leadership, organization design and organization development. ADMN 210 is built around programs broadcast on the Knowledge Network. If you don't receive the Knowledge Network on your TV set, you should not enrol in this course.
