### **GENERAL INFORMATION**

#### CLASS LIMITS

Some courses can only take a limited number of people. Your place in these courses will ONLY be held by preregistration and payment of the fee. If you are registering by mail, confirm availability of space in courses with class limits, BEFORE mailing in registration fee. A "no refund" policy applies to these courses.

#### FEES

You are encouraged to pre-pay for the course you wish to take. Staff will be available to collect fees at the first class. Courses with "class limits" must be pre-paid to ensure your place. All course fees must be paid no later than the second class. Students are required to present registration receipt to the instructor by this time.

Payment for courses, textbooks or other material may be made by Cash, Cheque, Visa or MasterCard.

#### TUITION REDUCTION

Senior Citizens (aged 65 and over) and registered disabled persons are eligible for tuition-free enrollment in most Northwest College courses on a stand-by basis, provided that space is still available within 24 hours of the commencement of the course. This exemption will not apply to Security or Tool Deposits or to any charges for materials, books and supplies that are levied against other students in the course.

#### LEARNING RESOURCE CENTRE


