

THREE WAYS TO REGISTER

- 1. IN PERSON days at Northwest Community College, Main Office, 820 3rd Avenue West, Prince Rupert, from August 29 (Monday), 1983, Monday to Friday from 9:00 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. No phone registrations accepted. All fees due when registering.
- IN PERSON evenings at Northwest Community College's Main Office, 820 3rd Avenue West, Prince Rupert, Monday to Thursday evenings beginning Wednesday, September 7, 1983, 6:30 to 9:00 p.m.
- 3. **SPECIAL JOINT REGISTRATION** On Tuesday, September 6, 1983, a joint registration for all courses offered by Northwest Community College, Civic Centre and Swimming Pool will be held from 8:00 a.m. to 8:00 p.m. in the gymnasium of the Civic Centre. FREE baby-sitting and refreshments will be available.

IMPORTANT: Many courses have limited enrollment — register early. After September 21, only registrations for courses that have not reached their class limits will be accepted. You may register in these courses up to and including the first night of class only.

IMPORTANT INFORMATION FOR ALL STUDENTS

FEES: Tuition varies with each course and must be paid in full at time of registration. Students will not receive credit for courses in which they are not officially registered.

FEES FOR SENIOR CITIZENS

Senior Citizens (age 65 or over) and registered disabled persons are eligible for tuition-free enrollment in most Northwest College courses on a stand-by basis, provided that space is still available within 24 hours of the commencement of the course. This exemption will not apply to Security or Tool Deposits or to any charges for materials, books and supplies that are levied against other students in the course.

SPONSORED STUDENTS

Students whose fees will be paid by sponsoring agencies are required to present a letter to this effect from the agency concerned at the time of registration.

LATE REGISTRATION AND REFUND POLICY

General Conditions

- 1. Full refunds will be made only if a course is cancelled by the college or if a student withdraws from a course for medical or bereavement reasons prior to the course start date.
- 2. Refunds requested prior to the course start date will be assessed an administration charge of \$10.00.
- 3. There will be no refunds for courses with tuition fees of \$10.00 or less except for those conditions in General Statement #1.

Part-time Courses (Including All Part-time C.E.S. Courses and All Part-time Vocational Courses)

- 1. Withdrawals before the second class of a course 100% of tuition fees less a \$10.00 administration charge.
- 2. Withdrawal after the second class of a course NO REFUND.
- 3. Special registration and refund policies apply to courses labelled as "Designated Courses". NO REFUNDS will be made after the pre-registration date unless the space can be sold to another student, in which case the withdrawing student will be refunded 100% of the tuition fee less a \$10.00 administration charge.

Academic (Part- and Full-time)

- 1. A \$10.00 "late registration" charge will be assessed to any student registering after the second class.
- 2. Withdrawal after second class 80% of tuition fee less a \$10,00 administration charge.
- 3. Withdrawal after third class or fourth class 50% of tuition fee less a \$10.00 administration charge.
- 4. Withdrawal after fifth class NO REFUND.

Vocational (Full-time)

- 1. A \$10.00 "late registration" charge will be assessed to any student registering after the first day of classes in a full-time vocational program.
- 2. Vocational full-time fees are assessed on a calendar month basis, prorated as necessary in the first and last months:

Entry between:

1st - 15th - 100% of monthly fee.

16th - 23rd -50% of monthly fee.

24th - 31st -25% of monthly fee.

Leaving before:

1st - 15th - 25% of monthly fee.

16th - 23rd -50% of monthly fee.

24th - 31st -100% of monthly fee.

3. Refunds on withdrawal before completion will be 100% of unused tuition (part months prorated as above) less a \$10.00 administration charge. (There will be no administration charge on refunds for students who have completed their program earlier than anticipated when fee payment was made.)

INCOME TAX DEDUCTIBILITY: Receipts totalling over \$100.00 are income tax deductible. Please retain fee receipts. Books are not tax deductible.

CANCELLATION OF COURSES: Northwest Community College reserves the right to cancel or postpone any course for which registration does not reach the required minimum, or in which attendance or progress is unsatisfactory.

HOLIDAYS: Classes will not normally be held on Statutory Holidays or when schools are closed.

TEXTBOOK SALES: Textbooks will be available at Northwest Community College, 820 - 3rd Avenue West, 9:00 a.m. to 4:30 p.m., Monday to Friday; or evenings, Monday to Thursday, 6:30 p.m. to 9:00 p.m., beginning August 29, 1983.

TEXTBOOK REFUNDS - Refunds on textbook purchases will be made:

- (a) When a course has been cancelled by the College and a student returns the textbook purchased for the course to the Bookstore in "like-new" and resalable condition within two weeks of the course cancellation, a refund of 100% of the purchase price will be made by the College.
- (b) When a student withdraws from a course during the first two weeks of classes in the case of full-time courses; or on or before the date of the second class in the case of part-time courses; and returns the textbook purchased for the course to the Bookstore in "like-new" and resalable condition within one week following withdrawal, the College will refund 75% of the purchase price of the textbook.
- (c) No refunds will be made in any case without the original till receipt.
- (d) The determination of "like-new and resalable condition" shall be at the discretion of the College.
- (e) No refunds will be made other than those contemplated in (a) and (b) above.

COUNSELLING SERVICES: The College Counsellor, H. Falladown, visits Prince Rupert once a week on Mondays. The counsellor is available to discuss and advise on College programs, career planning, financial aid, correspondence courses, university or vocational programs. GRADE 12 EQUIVALENCY EXAM (G.E.D.)

This examination program is for adults who have not completed Grade 12, and who wish to earn a certificate stating they have the knowledge equivalent to a Grade 12 graduate. The exam is actually a series of five tests, one in each of English Language, English Literature, Math, Social Studies and Science. This may assist you in qualifying for a better job or for a promotion. Many people challenge these tests for their own personal satisfaction. Students prepare for these tests through home study. To assist students with their home study for the G.E.D. exam, four G.E.D. preparation courses are offered this semester. Please see description of these courses, G.E.D. Prep. English and Social Studies and G.E.D. Prep. Math and Science, for more information. The next testing date for the G.E.D. exam in Prince Rupert is Sat., Nov. 26, 1983. You must be 19 years of age and a B.C. resident for six months prior to writing the G.E.D. exam. The exam fee (\$10.00) must be sent, together with an exam application form (available at the Prince Rupert campus), to the Ministry of Education a minimum of three weeks prior to the testing date.

EARLY CHILDHOOD EDUCATION PROGRAM

Throughout the Northwest Community College region there is a need for trained men and women to participate in this education process. The Early Childhood Education program is designed to prepare students for employment in such areas as child care, nursery and preschool supervision, early intervention and special education, and family day care. E.C.E. 123 (Issues in Family Living)

This course covers working with people, family forms, marriage and family patterns. It will examine the changes occurring in family life.

HUMAN SERVICE WORKER (H.S.W.)

This career program is directed at the people who wish to obtain training and practical skills in the social services field. Training is composed of university transfer and special courses designed to prepare the student to work at a para-professional level in the "helping professions". Usually, para-professionals are supervised by a professional person. In general, this program is of interest to people working, or intending to work, as home-school coordinators, child care workers, teacher aides, youth workers, and others interested in community work in the health, counselling and legal areas. With credits from the university transfer program, students may wish to continue with their education at a university degree level.

H.S.W. 153 (Human Growth & Development)

INSTRUCTOR: Ed Nicholson TIME: Thurs., 7:00-10:00 p.m.

LOCATION: N.W.C.C. DATE: Sept. 8-Dec. 15

This course introduces the student to the basic processes and content of effective communication, so that each student achieves an understanding of what effective communications means as well as a personal understanding of his/her style of communications. Topics to be covered include: active listening, empathy, self-disclosure, giving feedback, understanding and expressing feelings, helpful responding and non-verbal communication.

TERRACE PROGRAMS

TRAINING ACCESS PROGRAM (TRAC)

(This program replaces some programs formerly known as pre-apprenticeship and pre-employment training programs.)

The Training Access Program (TRAC) is an innovative approach to trades training. TRAC provides students with an exposure to the knowledge and skills common to all the various trade specialties within the program before they are required to select a specific training specialty. Furthermore, TRAC is designed on a modular basis which allows students to move through the program from one level to the next. Continuous entry into the program on a twelve-month basis is a further feature of this program. A wait-list system is established whereby students are contacted in advance of their anticipated start date.

This program consists of three levels of training.

Each level is divided into modules. Each module contains a group of skills. The skills are presented in self-paced learning packages that students will work through at their own individual rate. A realistic time frame will be maintained.

Audio-visual materials with practical assignments supervised by qualified trades persons have been developed.

Students who have had previous training and experience may challenge tests and assignments, and if successful, may move through the program more quickly.

1. LEVEL I — Common Core) (approximately 2 - 3 months)

This level provides students with the necessary skills and knowledge which are common to all trade areas. Competency in common core skills and knowledge must be demonstrated before a student can proceed to one of the occupational core areas which should suit the student's interest and aptitude.

2. LEVEL II — Occupational Core (approximately 2 months)

The second level deals with more specialized skills and knowledge which are common to the following six occupational cores. A student can select one of the following six options:

Carpentry
Electrical
Mechanics
Metal Fabrication
Millwright/Machinist
Piping

Competency in the skill and knowledge in an occupational core is required before moving on to the the third level of training — the level of specialty.

3. LEVEL III — Specialty Training (approximately 2 months)

Each of the six occupational cores is divided into several trade specializations. These specialty programs provide the specialized knowledge and skills necessary to become employable at an entry level in a trade area.

At the third level of training, a student will select the specialty within the occupational core that was completed at Level II.


