

THREE WAYS TO REGISTER

- 1. **IN PERSON** days at Northwest Community College, Main Office, 820 3rd Avenue West, Prince Rupert, from Wednesday, December 29, 1982, Monday to Friday from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. No phone registrations accepted. All fees due when registering.
- 2. **IN PERSON** evenings at Northwest Community College's Main Office, 820 3rd Avenue West, Prince Rupert, from Tuesday, January 4, to Thursday, January 27, 1983, 6:30 p.m. to 9:00 p.m.
- 3. **SPECIAL JOINT REGISTRATION** on Tuesday, January 4, 1983, a joint registration for all courses offered by Northwest Community College, Civic Centre and Swimming Pool will be held from 9:00 a.m. to 9:00 p.m. in the auditorium of the Civic Centre. FREE babysitting and refreshments will be available.

IMPORTANT: Many courses have limited enrollment, register early. After January 27, only registrations for courses that have not reached their class limits will be accepted. You may register in these courses up to and including the first night of class only.

FOR ALL STUDENTS

FEES: Tuition varies with each course and must be paid in full at time of registration. Students will not receive credit for courses in which they are not officially registered.

FEES FOR SENIOR CITIZENS

University Transfer Courses: Free registration for all senior citizens. Supplies fees still apply.

Vocational Courses & Professional Development Courses: Seniors must pay the regular fee.

General Interest Courses: A) Seniors can **secure** a seat in a C.E.S. course by paying the full registration fee. B) Seniors who wish to take a course without paying the fee can place their names on a stand-by list and enter the course provided it has reached minimum enrollment but not exceeded the maximum enrollment. All fee payers will have registration priority. Seniors will be notified not less than 24 hours prior to the course start if they will have a seat on the course. Supplies must be purchased.

FEES FOR THE DISABLED

University Transfer Courses: The disabled shall pay regular fees.

General Interest Courses: A) & B) above, under "Fees for Senior Citizens" applies here.

NOTE

HIRING IN THE '80s — EFFECTIVE RECRUITMENT & SELECTION

The objectives of this course are to provide students with an understanding of the jargon of the data processing field and to provide the necessary background for exploring many data processing topics in depth. An introduction to the use of the Apple II micro-computer and some basics of the BASIC language will also be provided. Course topics include: History of Computing, Programming and Programming Languages; Algorithm Development; Introducing BASIC; Elements of Computer Data Processing; Input/Output and Internal Storage; Hardware; Program Maintenance and Documentation; More BASIC; Debugging; Even More BASIC; Arrays; Files; File Handling in BASIC.

Designed for those who have completed an introductory basic computing course. This course provides a 2nd-level course in the programming language BASIC. Skills in BASIC are enhanced by writing file handling routines developed by the use of DATA DIRECTED DESIGN TECH-NIQUES. Graduates of this course will have well-developed BASIC programming skills and a good grounding in file handling concepts.

COMPUTER ACCOUNTING FOR SMALL BUSINESS

This course includes a review of accounting principles, an introduction to a micro-computer and the development of a bookkeeping system which includes a General Ledger Component and an Accounts Receivable Component.


The purpose of this course is to increase participants' skills and confidence in effectively matching job applicants with position requirements; to reduce the probability of making poor selection decisions; to reduce the cost and time of hiring employees. It is designed for employers, managers and supervisors who are involved in the process of hiring employees; those whose position requires that they be concerned with the time and cost of filling vacant or new positions. (Personnel "specialists" should discuss the program content with the resource person before registering. Much of the content may not be new material for those who have formal training in this field.) Topics include the recruitment process, interviewing and the selection process.

BASIC TRAINING FOR SKILLS DEVELOPMENT

Prerequisites: Students must be at least 17 years of age and have been out of the school system for a minimum of one year.

This is a vocational program for adults who wish to upgrade basic academic skills equal to a Grade 12 level to qualify for employment, entry into a vocational training program, or to meet requirements for apprenticeship training. Subjects studied are communications, mathematics and sciences. Studen-Students can enroll any time during the course period (space permitting) and will work at their own speed.

FISHERIES AND MARINE SKILLS PROGRAM

Self-Study Certificate Preparation



The Northwest Community College is currently producing a series of self-study kits which prepare the student for specific MoT examinations. Their examinations are held monthly in Prince Rupert. One module covers one MoT examination.

Each module consists of lecture notes, exercises, answers and assignments. These modules are designed specifically for the fisherman who can study on board ship, at home or in the College.

Modules available for Winter 1983 are: 040 Chartwork and Pilotage; 020 Electronic Navigation Instruments; 060 Navigation Safety (Rules of the Road and Regulations); 161 General Seamanship. **Note:** Other modules up to Fishing Master II will be made available as they are developed.

Tuition: Includes contact with a tutor who will guide the student through the course by telephone in occasional meetings.

Supplies: Includes package of course materials only. Students must supply their own rulers, nautical dividers and writing materials.

Duration: At student's own pace. It is expected that a module shall be completed within 6 months.

Accounting 102 is concerned with basic methodology and logic, recording transactions and maintaining books of account for service and merchandising concerns; preparation and interpretation of financial statements; recording, reconciling and valuation of cash, accounts receivable, inventory and plant and equipment. Preparation of payroll records.

GRADE 12 EQUIVALENCY EXAM (G.E.D.)

This examination program is for adults who have not completed Grade 12, and who wish to earn a certificate stating they have the knowledge equivalent to a Grade 12 graduate. The exam is actually a series of five tests, one in each of English Language, English Literature, Math, Social Studies and Science. This may assist you in qualifying for a better job or for a promotion. Many people challenge these tests for their own personal satisfaction. Students prepare for these tests through home study. To assist students with their home study for the G.E.D. exam, two G.E.D. preparation courses are offered this semester. Please see description of these courses G.E.D. Prep. English and Social Studies, and G.E.D. Prep. Math and Science) for more information. The next testing date for the G.E.D. exam in Prince Rupert is Sat., Mar. 26, 1983. You must be 19 years of age and a B.C. resident for six months prior to writing the G.E.D. exam. The exam fee (\$10.00) must be sent together with an exam application form (available at the Prince Rupert campus) to the Ministry of Education a minimum of three weeks prior to the testing date.

HEALTH CONTINUING EDUCATION

N.W.C.C. offers a service of organizing and delivering continuing education programs for health/human service professionals in all communities in the college region. Preventive health programs for the general public are also offered.

To access this service, an agency should first identify a desired program or educational need, and the existing support (either financial or participatory). As programs must be cost-recoverable, a class size of 15 to 20 participants is desirable to keep fees low, especially if not agency-funded.

Programs of interest offered in the Lower Mainland can be located in the Northwest region with sufficient support confirmed in advance. N.W.C.C. can provide the administrative back-up and assume the hidden costs of organization, publicity and registration, provided the program is open to other agencies. Co-sponsoring or sharing of the responsibilities of program design and delivery is encouraged.

For programs that are being designed locally, 3 to 4 months' planning time must be allowed. To import programs already designed but requiring instructors from Victoria or the Lower Mainland, a minimum of 6 to 8 weeks to contact resource persons, organize and publicize must be allowed.

A few examples of programs offered in the recent past include:

- 1. "Adolescent Sexuality" with Amy Napier-Hemy, in Smithers, co-sponsored with B.V.D.H. Peri-Natal Committee.
- 2. "Emergency Management" from University of Victoria, co-sponsored with Q.C.C. Hospital.
- 3. "Beyond the Crisis" with Denis Boyd, psychologist, co-sponsored with K'San House Society, Terrace.

Spring program planning is happening now; upcoming courses will be publicized in the "Health Update" newsletter.





Students will have a period of time each week to discuss materials. New resource people will be brought in each week. For those who decide to go on in the Early Childhood Education or Human Service Career programs, consideration will be given for the successful completion of this course. For those taking this course as upgrading, a Certificate of Achievement will be awarded upon successful completion.

HUMAN SERVICE WORKER (H.S.W.)

This career program is directed at the people who wish to obtain training and practical skills in the social services field. Training is composed of university transfer and special courses designed to prepare the student to work at a para-professional level in the "helping professions". Usually, para-professionals are supervised by a professional person. In general, this program is of interest to people working, or intending to work, as home-school coordinators, child care workers, teacher aides, youth workers, and others interested in community work in the health, counselling and legal areas. With credits from the university transfer program, students may wish to continue with their education at a university degree level.

H.S.W. 162 — Communication II

ENTRY LEVEL PROGRAMS — provincial programs to take place of Pre-Apprenticeship and Pre-Employment.

MECHANICAL PROGRAMS (Continuous Intake/Exit)

Group intake Jan. 17, 1983.

These programs have been restructured for January 1983. The course has been organized into modules of instruction to ensure maximum flexibility for individualized training. The program has three levels of training. Times are to be paced with overall time guides.

Common Core Program: Includes a series of modules that is common to all trade specialties and is transferable to other programs in the province as well as all entry level courses offered at the Terrace Campus.

Occupational Core: Covers all modules that are common to the mechanical cluster indicated below.

Specialties: Students who have successfully completed common core and mechanical occupational core can select one or more of the following specialties:

- 1. Automotive Specialty
- 2. Heavy Duty Module 1
- 3. Small Engine Repair
- 4. Marine Engine Repair

General Mechanics: Completion of Common Core, Occupational Core plus Automotive, Heavy Duty Module 1 and Small Engine Repair will provide a student with a General Mechanics certificate from Northwest Community College.

CARPENTRY (Feb. 21, 1983 — 5-month program)

Pre-Apprenticeship Carpentry is being phased out and the entry level Carpentry program is being implemented. Provincially, it will cover the same basic material but will be divided into three levels.

Common Core: Includes a series of modules that is common to all trade specialties and is transferable to other programs in the province as well as all entry level courses offered at the Terrace campus.

Contruction Occupational Core: Covers all modules that are common to the construction cluster of programs.

Specialty: Students who have successfully completed a common core and construction occupational core can select:

- 1. Carpentry (Terrace campus)
- 2. Other construction specialties offered in other colleges throughout the province

MODULAR WELDING PROGRAM

(Continuous Intake)

This course has been organized into package modules to ensure maximum flexibility for individualized training. Students enter the program on a continuous basis and progress at their own speed.

Module "C" is the first level of training and takes approximately 7 months. Module "B" will begin in September 1983. Please see the College calendar for details.

ELECTRONICS TECHNICIAN

(Jan. 31-Oct. 25, 1983)

This program is designed to provide students with the skills and knowledge necessary to enter a rewarding career in a variety of areas within the electronics field.
