## IMERGIOUS!

#### REGISTRATION

You are not formally registered for a course until the fee has been fully paid. You must pay your fee one week in advance and not just sign up to guarantee that you have a place. Late entry into courses will be allowable upon the permission of the instructor, but the full fee must be paid at the first session the late entering student attends.

PLEASE NOTE: Air Brakes and Mobile Welding courses need pre-payment TWO WEEKS in advance.

#### FEES

Fees vary according to the length and type of course. Fees must be paid one week in advance of the first class.

#### SPONSORED STUDENTS

Students whose fees will be paid by sponsoring agencies are required to present a letter to this effect from the agency concerned at the time of registration. This includes sponsorship from Bands, Department of Indian Affairs and Ministry of Human Resources. Otherwise students must pay their fees and make their own arrangements for reimbursement.


#### HOW TO GET THE COURSE YOU WANT







#### **CONVERSATIONAL GERMAN**

There are two German language programs on the spring schedule. Although they have not yet been developed as complete telecourses, they can be very useful for extra practice for people taking a regular course in German, or for those who know the language and wish to brush up on it.

#### **GUTEN TAG**

This introductory course is based on a series of 26 half-hour television programs broadcast on the Knowledge Network. These programs consist of exercises carried out by an instructor and a student (structured so that viewers can take part in them) and film episodes that feature incidents and events in the lives of a group of people who are learning German. By these means, the programs provide students with an understanding of grammar and vocabulary for basic conversation.


#### **APPLIED SKETCHING TECHNIQUES**


#### **DESIGNING HOME INTERIORS**

#### SELF-STUDY CERTIFICATE PREPARATION



The Northwest Community College is currently producing a series of self-study kits which prepare the student for specific MoT examinations. Their examinations are held monthly in Prince Rupert. One module covers one MoT examination.

Each module consists of lecture notes, exercises, answers and assignments. These modules are designed specifically for the fisherman who can study on board ship, at home or in the College.

Modules available for winter 1983 are: 040 Chartwork and Pilotage; 020 Electronic Navigation Instruments; 060 Navigation Safety (Rules of the Road and Regulations); 161 General Seamanship. **Note:** Other modules up to Fishing Master II will be made available as they are developed.



#### ORGANIZATIONAL BEHAVIOUR

FULL-TIME PROGRAMS offered at Terrace campus with modules to be delivered in other centres as needs and facilities are identified.

ENTRY LEVEL PROGRAMS - Provincial programs to take place of Pre-Apprenticeship and Pre-Employment.

#### MECHANICAL PROGRAMS (Continuous intake/exit)

Group intake January 17, 1983.

These programs have been restructured for January 1983. The course has been organized into modules of instruction to ensure maximum flexibility for individualized training. The program has three levels of training. Times are to be self-paced with overall time guides.

**Common Core Program:** Includes a series of modules that is common to all trade specialties and is transferable to other programs in the province as well as all entry level courses offered at the Terrace campus.

Occupational Core: Covers all modules that are common to the mechanical cluster indicated below.

**Specialties:** Students who have successfully completed common core and mechanical occupational core can select one or more of the following specialties:

- 1. Automotive Specialty
- 2. Heavy Duty Module 1
- 3. Small Engine Repair
- 4. Marine Engine Repair

**General Mechanics:** Completion of common core, occupational core plus Automotive, Heavy Duty Module 1 and Small Engine Repair will provide a student with a General Mechanics certificate from Northwest Community College.

#### CARPENTRY (February 21, 1983 — 5-month program)

Pre-Apprenticeship Carpentry is being phased out and the entry level Carpentry program is being implemented. Provincially, it will cover the same basic material but will be divided into three levels.

**Common Core:** Includes a series of modules that is common to all trade specialties and is transferable to other programs in the province as well as all entry level courses offered at the Terrace campus.

Construction Occupational Core: Covers all modules that are common to the construction cluster of programs.

**Specialty:** Students who have successfully completed common core and constructional occupational core can select:

- 1. Carpentry (Terrace campus)
- 2. Other construction specialties offered in other colleges throughout the province

#### MODULAR WELDING PROGRAM (Continuous Intake)

This course has been organized into package modules to ensure maximum flexibility for individualized training. Students enter the program on a continuous basis and progress at their own speed.

Module "C" is the first level of training and takes approximately 7 months. Module "B" will begin in September 1983. Please see the College calendar for details.

#### ELECTRONICS TECHNICIAN (January 31 - October 25, 1983)

This program is designed to provide students with the skills and knowledge necessary to enter a rewarding career in a variety of areas within the electronics field. The core of 26 weeks will provide training in the basics of electrical and electronics theory and related practical assignments. Over the next 16 weeks, the student will receive training in stereo, colour TV, video systems servicing techniques, telecommunications, microprocessors by instructional demonstrations, lectures and practical "hands on" experience.

#### PROFESSIONAL COOK TRAINING (Continuous Intake)

The objective of Professional Cook Training is to prepare students in all the basic skills necessary to gain employment in the hospitality industry. For students who have an interest in working with the general public and a desire for permanent gainful employment. Opportunities are plentiful for graduates.

## HEALTH CONTINUING EDUCATION

NWCC offers a service of organizing and delivering continuing education programs for health/human service professionals in all communities in the College region. Preventive health programs for the general public are also offered.

To access this service, an agency should first identify a desired program or educational need, and the existing support (either financial or participatory). As programs must be cost-recoverable, a class size of 15 to 20 participants is desirable to keep fees low, especially if not agency-funded.

Programs of interest offered in the lower mainland can be located in the northwest region with sufficient support confirmed in advance. NWCC can provide the administrative back-up and assume the hidden costs of organization, publicity and registration, provided the program is open to other agencies. Co-sponsoring or sharing of the responsibilities of program design and delivery is encouraged.

For programs that are being designed locally, three to four months' planning time must be allowed. To import programs already designed but requiring instructors from Victoria or the lower mainland, a minimum of six to eight weeks to contact resource persons, organize and publicize must be allowed.

A few examples of programs offered in the recent past include:

- 1. "Adolescent Sexuality" with Amy Napier-Hemy, in Smithers, co-sponsored with BVDH Peri-Natal Committee.
- 2. "Emergency Management" from University of Victoria, co-sponsored with QCC Hospital.
- 3. "Beyond the Crisis" with Dennis Boyd, psychologist, co-sponsored with K'San House Society, Terrace.

#### Financial Aid Programs Available at Northwest Community College

Northwest Community College administers a limited number of scholarships and bursaries. Due to the limited monies available, applicants should first apply to the B.C. Student Assistance Plan/Canada Student Loan Program. Students who are enrolled in short-term programs who are not eligible for the B.C. Student Assistance Plan are encouraged to apply.

Awards are made in October, December, February and April. Applicants may receive more than one award during their program; so students are advised to apply whenever they have financial need. Applications are retained for the current awards period only.

Applications can be obtained from the Student Services office and must be returned to the Registrar's office by the first of the month in which the awards are scheduled to be made (e.g. October 1, December 1, February 1 and April 1).

Scholarships are awarded on the basis of academic excellence, while bursaries are awarded primarily on the basis of financial need.

The following financial aid programs are currently available:

#### B.C. Telephone Awards

Two awards of \$500 have been made available by the B.C. Telephone Company. The two awards will be given as either bursaries or scholarships at the discretion of the Financial Awards Committee. The preference for these awards is for Scholarships to second year academic students. These awards will be made in October

#### British Sailor's Society Canada Bursary

The British Sailors' Society Canada has given a \$250.00 bursary for a student in the Fisheries and Marine Training Program. To be eligible students must be a son or daughter of a Canadian Seaman and furthering their education in Marine matters. Students should apply on the College Bursary application form.

#### Canadian Cellulose Company Ltd., Terrace

Canadian Cellulose has established a Scholarship and Bursary fund at Northwest Community College which will award a total of \$11,400.00 over the next five years.

It is proposed that two \$300.00 scholarships will be awarded in September of each year (commencing in September 1978) to the applicants who have the most outstanding achievement among the students entering full-time studies at the second-year level in any Northwest Community College program.

In addition, four \$300.00 bursaries are to be awarded annually, the first in October 1979 and every three months thereafter. Applicants will be expected to be full-time students in Northwest Community College programs of more than two months' duration, who are in good academic standing and experiencing financial difficulty.

#### Credit Union Foundation

A grant of \$300.00 is to be made available to Northwest Community College on an annual basis. It is the desire of the Trustees of the Credit Union Foundation that the grant be made to technical, academic or vocational undergraduate student(s) who might otherwise have difficulty completing their studies by reason of financial hardship. The recipient(s) is/are to be Canadian and resident of the area served by the College.

The Credit Union Foundation is a charitable organization of the Credit Union of B.C. founded in 1957. Its aim is "to operate exclusively as a charitable organization to administer a fund or funds for the encouragement, promotion, establishment and advancement of education, scholarships to worthy and needy students who have the ability to make good use of the education thus provided and the promotion of mental, moral, physical and social welfare of the people."

This award will normally be made in February.

#### Northwest Community College Bursary Fund

Northwest Community College has established a general bursary fund with money received from local contributors. This money is intended to be awarded at any time throughout the year to students with good academic standing who may find themselves in financial difficulty.

#### Northwest Community College Faculty Union Bursaries

The Faculty Union of the College has made four \$250.00 bursaries available to full-time and part-time students of the College who are enrolled in University Transfer, Technical or Special Programs. There are three types of awards:

#### 1. Jeff Marvin Memorial Bursary

One \$250.00 bursary for Native Students who are participating in the Aboriginal Studies Program. This bursary was established to provide a continuing memorial to Jeff Marvin's dedication in providing post-secondary education to meet the needs of Indian people in Northwest British Columbia.

Native Students should apply on the Northwest Community College Bursary application form.

- One \$250.00 bursary for a student who has demonstrated active participation in the areas of women's, workers' or natives' rights.
- 3. Two \$250.00 bursaries to students who are in financial need.

Students should apply for awards 2 and 3 on the Northwest Community College Bursary application form by September 1. A statement of their participation should accompany an application for No. 2 bursary above.

#### Thunderbird Emergency Loan Fund

Established in part by a donation from the Northwest College Student Association, this fund can be used for small, short term loans. Students wishing to borrow money from this fund should make application to the Financial Aid Officer.

#### Vancouver Foundation Bursary

The Vancouver Foundation has established a Bursary fund of \$1000.00 to be awarded to Northwest Community College students. These funds are to be awarded to full-time students who have identified vocational or academic objectives, demonstrated ability to reach those objectives, and who, along with their families where possible, are contributing towards their educational costs. Applicants will be expected to demonstrate financial need beyond the limits of the usual sources of aid available to them. Applications for these funds must be made by October 1.

#### British Columbia Student Assistance Plan

This is a comprehensive program of assistance for postsecondary students to ensure that British Columbia residents are not denied the opportunity to reach their educational objectives due to fianncial constraints.

The B.C. Student Assistance Program is composed of two inter-related components:

- (a)The Canada Student Loan Plan, funded by the federal government and provincial government, and provincially administered, allows for a repayable loan of up to a maximum of \$1800.00 per educational year. (Amount may be subject to change.)
- (b) The British Columbia Provincial Grant Program, funded by the province, allows for a non-repayable grant up to a maximum of \$1700.00 per educational year. (Amount may be subject to change.)

The amount of assistance awarded is based on assessed need as determined by the provincial authority.

#### **ELIGIBILITY REQUIREMENTS**

Eligibility for assistance requires enrolment in at least 60% of a full course load in a designated program of study leading to a degree, diploma or certificate. All College students entrolled in programs of six months or longer are eligible. In order to remain eligible, the student must maintain this level throughout the application period.

All students are required to establish British Columbia residency status in order to be eligible for financial assistance through this program.

#### APPLICATION PROCEDURE

Applications are available at the Student Services Office and at the local Community Education Centre.

#### **Sponsorship Programs**

#### Sponsorship Programs

The following information is an outline of the sponsorship programs available. For detailed and up-to-date information as to how you may qualify for sponsorship, you are encouraged to apply directly to the government agency involved.

#### Canada Employment and Immigration Commission

The Canada Employment and Immigration Commission (formerly the Department of Manpower and Immigration) may authorize financial assistance through local offices for persons entering approved vocational training courses which will assist them to:

- (a) upgrade present work skills, or
- (b) retrain for a new job.

#### **B.C.** Ministry of Labour

Pre-indentured apprenticeship training is available to eligible persons who want to prepare themselves for apprentice prior to employment in industry. The Ministry of Labour, under the Pre-Indentured Apprenticeship Plan, recognizes the importance of such training and financially assists eligible people.

#### Ministry of Human Resources

The Ministry of Human Resources, through its district offices, provides assistance to people who:

- (a) are currently in receipt of Income Assistance under the GAIN Act,
- (b) meet the eligibility requirements and are not deemed "job ready", or
- (c) are not able to obtain employment that would provide adequate remuneration to make them self-supporting without further educational or vocational training.

#### Community Vocational Rehabilitation Service

Financial assistance is available under the Vocational Rehabilitation of Disabled Persons Act to any individual who is capable of pursuing regularly an occupation which meets the individual's basic economic needs.

Each applicant undergoes a medical and vocational assessment. When vocational training becomes a part of an individual's rehabilitation program and when such training is not available through the Employment and Immigration Canada Training Program, financial assistance may be obtained.

#### Federal Department of Indian Affairs

The federal government provides a comprehensive program of financial assistance to status Indian people who qualify for enrolment in pre-vocational, vocational and post-secondary training at a variety of educational institutions.
