B.C. SPORTS-AID PROGRAM

The B.C. Sports-Aid Program is for anyone involved in sports, fitness or recreational activities who is concerned about the safety and well-being of others who participate. This program consists of a core course plus 4 specialty modules as shown.



The core course provides a broad background in injury prevention and treatment, and prospective sportaiders should take it first. The entire course is voluntary, so it is obviously not mandatory to complete all 5 modules. The courses do complement one another, however, and together they provide a wellrounded coverage of the topic, so completion of the entire program is strongly encouraged.

* C.P.R. and First Aid are available at Northwest Community College in Terrace.

PROGRAM CONTENT

CORE COURSE

The Core Course, which is completed in one day, consists of lecture, demonstration and discussion sessions. It covers the following topics:

Body Basics - a brief overview of basic anatomy and physiology. Recognition and control of potentially hazardous situations. Injury assessment and handling of life-threatening situations.

Management of common injuries

Establishing referral patterns and the effective use of community resources.

Development of a first-aid kit.

C.P.R. basics.

A course manual is provided to all registrants. This course must be completed before the specialty modules as it serves as a background and framework for the other courses.



TAPING MODULE

This module covers 2 days and includes lecture and demonstration sessions and "hands on" taping experience. It deals with taping procedures for injury prevention, for minimizing the chance of further damage when injury occurs, and for facilitating the healing and repair process.

STRENGTH & FLEXIBILITY MODULE

This 1-day course includes lectures, demonstration and practice sessions. The flexibility component considers the proper principles of exercise, recommended and non-recommended exercises, and sample warmup routines. The strength component examines the principles of program design, technique, safety precautions and motivational factors.

Training Access Program (TRAC)

(This program replaces some programs formerly known as pre-apprenticeship and pre-employment training programs.)

The Training Access Program (TRAC) is an innovative approach to trades training. TRAC provides students with an exposure to the knowledge and skills common to all the various trade specialties within the program from one level to the next. Continuous entry into the program on a 12-month basis is a further feature of this program. A wait-list system is established whereby students are contacted in advance of their anticipated start date. Two shifts are available: 8:00 a.m. - 3:00 p.m. and 3:00 p.m. - 10:00 p.m.

This program consists of three levels of training.

Each level of training is divided into modules. Each module contains a group of skills. The skills are presented in self-paced learning packages that students will work through at their own individual rate. A realistic time frame will be maintained.

Audio-visual materials with practical assignments supervised by qualified trades persons have been developed.

Students who have had previous training and experience may challenge tests and assignments, and if successful, may move through the program more quickly.

This level provides students with the necessary skills and

knowledge which are common to all trade areas. Competency

in common core skills and knowledge must be demonstrated be-

fore a student can proceed to one of the occupational core

ELECTRONICS COURSES

Courses 1 to 7 are Heath Continuing Education selfstudy programs containing numerous lab experiments and unit tests as well as 33½ rpm introductory records. In some areas, supplementary lessons have been added.
