Academic

General Program Information

The Academic Division offers a comprehensive selection of first-and-second year university transfer courses in the humanities, social sciences and sciences. You can select a combination of prerequisite and elective courses to complete your first or second year of studies at Northwest Community College, students usually take five courses per semester. You then transfer to the program of your choice at one of the universities or community colleges in B.C. or elsewhere. In addition, the Academic Division offers a two-year Human Service Worker and a one-year Early Childhood Education career program.

The complete Academic program is available at the Terrace campus where residential facilities for more than two hundred out-of-town students are available.

Part Time and Evening Program

It is possible to register for one or more courses during the day or in the evening and in that way spread your course work over a number of years at your convenience. To accommodate students who cannot attend classes during the day, Northwest Community College offers a significant number of courses in the evening at the Terrace, Kitimat, and Prince Rupert campuses. The selection of courses varies from year to year to enable students to complete their studies in the evening and also to provide courses which are of general interest.

Correspondence Courses

For students unable to attend the College, a number of correspondence courses are offered.

Admission, Registration and Cost

The College has an open admission policy. Mature students may be admitted without submission of their high school transcript. However, recent graduates are expected to submit their transcript.

You can obtain application forms at any College centre, or by writing to the Registrar's office in Terrace. Part time students may register without having been formally admitted to the College.

Registration for all courses in Terrace, Kitimat and Prince Rupert will take place from August 26 to August 30, 1985. Classes start Tuesday, September 3, 1985. Late registration is often possible. Register in person at the college campus nearest to you.

The fee for all courses is \$21.00 per credit hour (\$63 for a 3 credit course) to a maximum of \$315.00 per semester for five or more courses. Most courses consist of three credit hours.

Kitimat Academic/University Transfer Course Timetable

Anthropology 101-3: Introduction to Physical Anthropology and Archeology Thurs. 7:00-10:00 p.m. Instructor: T.B.A.

A general introduction to human biological and cultural history. Students will examine the concepts of evolution, genetics, animal behaviour and race in an attempt to understand what makes us human. (3,0,0)

Written assignments based on the works read. (3.0.0)


Psychology 101-3: Introductory Psychology I Tues. 7:00-10:00 p.m. Instructor: T.B.A.

In the introductory psychology course, Psychology 101 and 102, you will discover some of the reasons why we think, feel and act as we do. The classes consist of lectures, structured experience, discussions and films, as well as other audio-visual presentations. The topics for this course include: a perspective of psychology; life-span psychological development; the biology of behaviour; sensation; perception; the nature of consciousness; conditioning and learning; and motivation and emotion. This course should be followed by Psychology 102. (3,0,0)

Political Science 203-3: International Politics Weds. 7:00-10:00 p.m. Instructor: P. Weber

This course will examine the relations between the Super-Powers, Europe and the Third World through the study of their internal organization and international economic and political developments. (3,0,0)

NORTHERN INDIAN PROFESSIONAL NURSING PROGRAM

Northwest Community College, the B.C. Institute of Technology, Health & Welfare Canada, and the Nisga'a Valley Health Board are pleased to announce the start of a **Northern Indian Professional Nursing Program**.

Essentially, the program is the existing B.C.I.T. General Nursing program with the addition of traditional medicine and some adaptations for Northern Native educational needs. B.C.I.T. is a provincial institution that enrolls students from all regions of the province. The General Nursing program has five terms of 17 weeks duration. Terms one through four are offered concurrently in a health care agency and an educational institution. Term five is a preceptorship term offered mainly in a hospital.

B.C.I.T. and Northwest Community College have agreed to co-operatively offer the B.C.I.T. General Nursing program through the following arrangement:

- Northwest Community College will offer a pre-entry training program
- Northwest Community College will offer Terms 1 and 2
- B.C.I.T. will offer Terms 3, 4 and 5
- B.C.I.T. will arrange Term 5 placements in the college region if desired by the student and if suitable experience is provided by the hospital.

Nursing Pre-entry Program

It is recognized that many potential students may lack the necessary pre-requisite courses or grade level to enter the nursing program. To address this situation, commencing August, 1985, Northwest Community College will offer a complete pre-entry training program. This program will include the necessary English, Math, Chemistry and Biology courses needed to meet these educational pre-requisites. This program is open to individuals wishing to raise their marks or to individuals who lack one or more of the pre-requisite courses. It will also be possible for students who meet the necessary pre-requisite to enrol in several Northwest Community College courses that transfer directly to the first-year nursing program.

Depending on the present educational level of the student the pre-entry program may last from 5-12 months. Students are encouraged to attend these courses as long as possible to ensure a high level of skills. To do so will enhance their ability to handle the rigors of the actual nursing program.

Students planning to enter this program will be required to complete a set of placement tests in English and Math. These tests are designed to help college staff and the student to select the best programs to up-grade the student's pre-requisite skills. These tests are schelduled to take place at N.W.C.C, Terrace August 10, 1985. Additional placement tests may be scheduled as required.

Prospective students will be able to enrol in the English and Math components of the pre-entry program at any Northwest Community College ABE or BTSD program. It will be necessary to attend N.W.C.C. (Terrace) to complete the Chemistry and Biology portions of this program. For non-Terrace students there are residence facilities at N.W.C.C. or a wide choice of private and commercial accommodation in Terrace. The pre-entry program has been developed so that students who complete the program will meet the pre-admission requirements at most Schools of Nursing in British Columbia and Alberta. The pre-entry program will also satisfy the pre-admission requirements for many other health career programs.

Spaces in this program are limited; so please act soon. If you know of individuals who would be interested in this career training program (employment prospects are very good) please pass this information on to them. 

Requirements for Admission

Applicants must:

- 1. Have been away from the public school system for at least one year.
- 2. Be capable of concentrated, independent study.
- 3. Be over 18 years of age. (See criteria for under-age applicants.)
- 4. Have a career or educational goal.

Under-Age Application Criteria

Above factors apply plus:

- 1. Written permission from the Superintendent of School District 80.
- 2. Written permission from the High School Principal or Counsellor.
- 3. Reasons for leaving school must be fully outlined. (A behaviour problem does not qualify for entry into Upgrading.)
- 4. Interview with College Counsellor or Director.
- 5. Written contract with instructor re attendance and work progress.
- 6. Work experience is an asset. This provides an indication of maturity and a career goal.

REGISTRATION on a full- or part-time basis is accepted at any time. Applicants will be accepted as spaces are available in the various programs. A limited number of spaces are available to Kemano residents who wish to register as distance students.

Diploma Program:

Clerk Typist and Clerk Bookkeeper programs are 4- to 6-month courses which include work in Data Processing, Office Practice, Accounting, Typing, Dictatyping, Business Machines and Business English.

PREREQUISITES: Grade 12 graduation is preferred for all courses. A minimum of Grade 10 or BTSD Level III or the equivalent is acceptable. Business experience may be accepted in lieu of formal schooling in some cases. For individual evaluation of experience, please make an appointment to see the instructor.

Accounting Option — Prerequisite — A Northwest Community College Clerk-Bookkeeper certificate or equivalent experience and training. A 4-month course including Financial Accounting, Economics, Law, Data Processing, Business Mathematics and Computerized Accounting. For students working towards CGA or RIA certification, the following courses will give credit on these professional programs: Accounting 150-151, Economics 150-151, Business Law 150-151.

Advanced Options (Diploma Programs)

PREREQUISITE for the following advanced options is a Northwest Community College Clerk-Typist or Clerk-Bookkeeper certificate, or possession of extensive qualifying experience as a dictatypist (50 net wpm minimum) or a clerk stenographer (80 wpm shorthand and 50 net wpm typing minimum). Applicants who do not have an NWCC Clerk-Typist or Clerk-Bookkeeper certificate should make an appointment with the instructor.

Medical Stenographer

Includes Medical Terminology, Transcription, Medical Typing and Office Practice. 4 to 6 months to completion.

Word Processing

Includes courses in Word Processing Concepts, Electronic Typewriters, EasyWriter II and Wordstar word processors, advanced transcription and advanced word processing applications. In addition to the above prerequisites, students should have superior skills in spelling, grammar and punctuation, and the ability to use various reference sources. 5 months.

Administrative Secretary

Includes the full word processing program as described above, as well as Business Law, Roughdraft Typing and Advanced Typing. Students should have superior English skills and the ability to study abstract subjects.

Office Management

Refund Policy

Vocational (Full-time)

- 1. A \$10.00 "late registration" charge will be assessed to any student paying fees after the first day of the month in a full-time vocational program.
- 2. Vocational full-time fees are assessed on a calendar month basis, prorated as necessary in the first and last months:

3. Refunds on withdrawal before completion will be 100% of unused tuition (part months prorated as above) less a \$10.00 administration charge. (There will be no administration charge on refunds for students who have completed their program earlier than anticipated when fee payment was made.)

Evening Programs & Workshops

17 Sessions - Marg Ross - \$102.00 plus text Accounting 101/102 These two College CREDIT courses are basic to a Business Careers diploma in Clerk-Bookkeeping. The introductory level (101) covers income statements, profit and loss, general ledgers and payroll. Students who complete 101 may proceed to study Accounting 102: specialized journals, cash control, bank reconciliations and inventory control. Project work includes a complete set of books for both a service and a retail company. Either Accounting 101 or 102 can be completed this term. (College, Room 4) 51 hours

Business Computers 102 (Introduction to Business Programs) 13 Sessions - Susan Scott - \$110.00 plus text

grams now in use in business: word-processing (WORDSTAR), computer filing (EASYFILER), and a spreadsheet program used in accounting (VISICALC). For beginners to the computer, and those who plan to take more advanced business/computer courses, this is a required course. Both theory and practical work are necessary. The text, "Computers Today", and a diskette should be brought to the first class. Class size limited to 8. NO REFUND. (College, Room 3)

The Business of Management



39 hours

This telecourse is designed to help the new or aspiring business person learn essential skills in planning and organizing, staffing and directing, controlling, decision-making, motivating and communicating. Top experts in management share their experiences to present a realistic picture of management in the 1980s. The College supplies tutorial support for those wishing to take this course for credit as Management 150 toward the Diploma in Business Administration or in Office Management.

Computerized Accounting (Business Computers 103)

10 Sessions — David Burke — \$80.00

A College CREDIT course in hands-on computer applications for the accounting student. The student will gain experience in setting up and maintaining company records on a microcomputer. Throughout the assigned job simulations, the emphasis will be on the importance of accurate input, careful verification of data, and maintenance of a good audit trail. Prerequisite is Accounting 101/102 or equivalent. (College, Room 3) 36 hours

Typing for Beginners 12 Sessions — Nadia Green — \$50.00 plus text This is a course for people who have never used a typewriter. A "touchtyping" course teaching keyboarding basics on electric typewriters. This is a practical course for those using computers, word processors or typewriters. Practice times available. The New Computer Literacy



This telecourse reflects the trend toward a more practical approach in introductory computer courses. It is an up-to-date survey of electronic data processing, computer hardware and software systems, and developments that will provide the basis for further advancements in information processing. To receive full credit as BCPT 150 toward the Diplomas in Business Administration or in Office Management, students will be required to complete a number of programming assignments. To do so, students will need to have access to an IBM, Apple or compatible personal computer. Students may be able to arrange computer time at the College centres in Terrace, Prince Rupert, Smithers or Kitimat. Tutorial support is included in the tuition fee.

Airbrakes

4 Sessions + 1 Sat. - Joe Farina - \$50.00 (includes manual)

This course prepares drivers for a written practical serviceability test on types of airbrake systems in use on motor vehicles. Participants will be given proof of course attendance and practical examinations by the instructor in order to take the written test at the Motor Vehicle Branch within 30 days from the completion of the course.







Long Term Care Aide/Homemaker Program (Certificate)

The goal of the Long Term Care Aide/Homemaker program (Provincial Curriculum) is to prepare a graduate who will be competant and confident in performing specified skills and who will have a background knowledge at the level of an 'informed consumer'.

The specified skills include:

- individual and family growth and development patterns and expectations for all groups.

- human body structure and functions.
- an introduction to the health and social service systems, to relevant government and
- voluntary agencies, and to workers/professionals

A Two-Year Part-Time Program equivalent to the first full year at ECCAD, Granville Island Campus

Students come to understand the realities and challenges of a genuine commitment to the arts. The discovery of emerging interests is promoted. In the second half of the Foundation program, students explore topics and studio experiences which prepare them for the College's second-year fine art and design

Emily Carr College of Art and Design has expanded its services to include an innovative part-time credit Foundation program; offered on weekends for maximum accessibility to all people interested in pursuing credit studies in visual arts and design. The students who complete, the Outreach Foundation program will be eligible for direct transfer into second-year courses at ECCAD, Vancouver.

Information for E.C.C.A.D. Foundation Students

Part-time Foundation Program Format

Studio courses are taught over five weekends (60 hours) with studio time available for individual work during the week. The Survey of Western Art, a 20-part course (8 credits), is divided into two 10-week sessions (4 credits each) as a self-paced learning package that may be viewed in a group or through individual study in the local College library. All courses are taught by ECCAD instructors.

Application Procedure

ECCAD college catalogues and application forms are available from ECCAD, Vancouver and Northwest Community College centres. Applications must be accompanied by a \$5. application fee and an official transcript of previous studies.*

* Late applications will be considered if space is available.

Admissions Interviews

All applicants are required to attend an admissions interview. The interview lasts 20 to 30 minutes. Applicants will be expected to present a body of their work, usually in the form of a portfolio, and answer questions about. However, it is important to be aware that the presentation of a folio involves only a part of the interview. The personal interview deals with other aspects of the applicant's potential as a Foundation student and provides the opportunity for the student to discuss his or her work, previous experiences, future hopes and

The College of New Caledonia and Northwest Community College both add a modest registration fee to cover student services on those campuses. Financial Aid

Financial aid is available to students taking 12 credits in one semester. These regular students are eligible for Canada Student Loans, but not for the B.C. Student Loan Program. 

General Program Information

To better meet your needs, most courses are offered on a continuous-intake, individualized-learning format. Details of this learning approach are listed below:

- Grade 10 or equivalent required in all courses except Electronics, which requires Grade 12 Algebra and Physics.
- ** Continuous intake -- register anytime (space permitting) -- Electronics every 2 months.
- ** Self-paced courses -- approximately 6 months' duration (except Electronics (10 months) Cooking (3 to 12 months)).
- ** Full-time or part-time enrollment in day courses.
- ** Upgrading in Math, Science and English if required.
- ** Students able to check out, go to work and return to training without losing credit and being asked to start over.
- ** Successful students are eligible to write first-year apprenticeship exam.
- Credit may be gained for Common Core and Occupational Core (first and second levels) of related trade programs even though trade specialty not offered at NWCC. Check with counsellor.
- ** The first part of the course in a number of similar trades is available at Smithers, Hazelton, Prince Rupert, and Kitimat.


