# Basic Training for Skills Development (BTSD)

#### General Information

Would you like to improve your Math, English or Science? Would you like a specialized course in reading, spelling or report writing? Would you like to acquire the necessary skills to gain entrance to trade or vocational training? If your answer is "YES" to any of the above questions, then this is the course for you. Each student begins at his own level and works at his own speed. The instructor will design a program with each student to suit his individual needs. College certificates are awarded for successful completion of Level II, Level III and Level IV.

#### Requirements for Admission

Applicants must:

- 1. Have been away from the public school system for at least one year.
- 2. Be capable of concentrated, independent study.
- 3. Be over 18 years of age. (see criteria for under age applicants, below).
- Have a career or educational goal.

#### Under Age Application Admission Criteria

Above factors apply plus:

- 1. Written permission from the Superintendent of the School District.
- 2. Written permission from the High School Principal. (School District #88 requires #2 only.)
- 3. Reasons for leaving school must be fully outlined. (A behavior problem does not qualify for entry into Upgrading).
- 4. Interview and permission of parents or guardians with College Staff -- (where practical).
- 5. Interview with College staff, counsellor and/or instructor.
- 6. Work experience is an asset. This provides an indication of maturity, career goal, etc.
- 7. A maximum of two students per class under 18 years of age will be admitted to the program at any time.

Other applicants with special circumstances will be considered on an individual basis by the A.B.E. Coordinator's office and the Register.



# Notice for Adults Without Grade 12 GENERAL EDUCATIONAL DEVELOPMENT TESTS (G.E.D.)

#### what are the G.E.D. Tests?

The General Educational Development Tests are a series of five comprehensive examinations in the areas of Writing Skills, Social Studies, Science, Reading Skills and Mathematics. They are designed to measure as directly as possible the major generalizations, ideas and intellectual skills that are normally gained through 12 years of formal education.

#### 2. Why Take the G.E.D. Tests?

Many adults who did not graduate from secondary school have acquired skills, through work and study experiences, at or above secondary school level. The O.E.D. tests provide an opportunity for these people to earn an offical document stating they have a secondary school equivalency standing which may assist them in qualifying for better jobs, for promotions within their own organizations, and in applying for admission to post-secondary educational institutions.

#### 3. Who May Take the Tests?

Applicants must meet the following four requirements at the time of application:

\* Minimum age of 19.

\* British Columbia residency for at least six months preceding the date of application to write.

\* Out of school for at least one full academic year.

\* Have not received a Grade 12 graduation certificate from any institution.

#### 4. How Much Does it Cost to Take the Tests?

A \$10.50 administration fee for all or any of the tests is payable at the time of application. It is not refundable. Payment should be made by certified cheque or money order made payable to: Minister of Finance, Government of B.C.

#### 5. How Do I Apply to Take the Tests?

General Program Information

To better meet your needs, most courses are offered on a continuous—intake, individualized—learning format. Details of this learning approach are listed below:

Grade 10 or equivalent required in all courses except Electronics, which requires Grade 12 - Algebra and Physics.

Continuous intake -- register anytime (space permitting) -- Electronics every 2 months.

Self-paced courses -- approximately 6 months' duration [except Electronics (10 months) Cooking (3 to 12 months)].

Full-time or part-time enrollment in day courses.

Upgrading in Math, Science and English if required

Students able to check out, go to work and return to training without losing credit and being asked to start over

Successful students are eligible to write first-year apprenticeship exam.

Credit may be gained for Common Core and Occupational Core (first and second levels) of related trade programs even though trade specialty not offered at NWCC. Check with counsellor.

The goal of the Long Term Care Aide/Homemaker program (Provincial Curriculum) is to prepare a graduate who will be competant and confident in performing specified skills and who will have a background knowledge at the level of an 'informed consumer'.

The specified skills include:

- individual and family growth and development patterns and expectations for all groups.
- human body structure and functions.
- an introduction to the health and social service systems, to relevant government and voluntary agencies, and to workers/professionals
- an introduction to health problems commonly encountered by the Long Term Care Aide/Homemaker.

A graduate of these programs will be prepared to work as a

- Long Term Care Aide in a personal care, intermediate care or extended care faculity.
- Homemaker in a client's private home.

## **NORTHERN NATIVE INDIAN PROFESSIONAL NURSING PROGRAM**

Northwest Community College, the B.C. Institute of Technology, Health & Welfare Canada, and the Nisga'a Valley Health Board are pleased to announce the start of a Northern Native Indian Professional Nursing Program.

Essentially, the program is the existing B.C.I.T. General Nursing program with the addition of traditional medicine and some adaptations for Northern Native educational needs. B.C.I.T. is a provincial institution that enrolls students from all regions of the province. The General Nursing program has five terms of 17 weeks duration. Terms one through four are offered concurrently in a health care agency and an educational institution. Term five is a preceptorship term offered mainly in a hospital.

B.C.I.T. and Northwest Community College have agreed to co-operatively offer the B.C.I.T. General Nursing program through the following arrangement:

- Northwest Community College will offer a pre-entry training program
- Northwest Community College will offer Terms 1 and 2
- B.C.I.T. will offer Terms 3, 4 and 5
- B.C.I.T. will arrange Term 5 placements in the college region if desired by the student and if suitable experience is provided by the hospital.

Nursing Pre-entry Program

It is recognized that many potential students may lack the necessary pre-requisite courses or grade level to enter the nursing program. To address this situation, commencing August, 1985, Northwest Community College will offer a complete pre-entry training program. This program will include the necessary English, Math, Chemistry and Biology courses needed to meet these educational pre-requisites. This program is open to individuals wishing to raise their marks or to individuals who lack one or more of the pre-requisite courses. It will also be possible for students who meet the necessary pre-requisite to enrol in several Northwest Community College courses that transfer directly to the first-year nursing program.

Depending on the present educational level of the student the pre-entry program may last from 5-12 months. Students are encouraged to attend these courses as long as possible to ensure a high level of skills. To do so will enhance their ability to handle the rigors of the actual nursing program.

Students planning to enter this program will be required to complete a set of placement tests in English and Math. These tests are designed to help college staff and the student to select the best programs to up-grade the student's pre-requisite skills. These tests are schelduled to take place at N.W.C.C. Terrace August 10, 1985. Additional placement tests may be scheduled as required.

Prospective students will be able to enrol in the English and Math components of the pre-entry program at any Northwest Community College ABE or BTSD program. It will be necessary to attend N.W.C.C. (Terrace) to complete the Chemistry and Biology portions of this program. For non-Terrace students there are residence facilities at N.W.C.C. or a wide choice of private and commercial accommodation in Terrace. The pre-entry program has been developed so that students who complete the program will meet the pre-admission requirements at most Schools of Nursing in British Columbia and Alberta. The pre-entry program will also satisfy the pre-admission requirements for many other health career

Spaces in this program are limited; so please act soon. If you know of individuals who would be interested in this career training program (employment prospects are very good) please pass this information on to them. 

# Academic Division

# General Program Information

The Academic Division offers a comprehensive selection of first-and-second year university transfer courses in the humanities, social sciences and sciences. You can select a combination of prerequisite and elective courses to complete your first or second year of studies at Northwest Community College, students usually take five courses per semester. You then transfer to the program of your choice at one of the universities or community colleges in B.C. or elsewhere. In addition, the Academic Division offers a two-year Human Service Worker and a one-year Early Childhood Education career program.

The complete Academic program is available at the Terrace campus where residential facilities for more than two hundred out-of-town students are available.

### Part Time and Evening Program

It is possible to register for one or more courses during the day or in the evening and in that way spread your course work over a number of years at your convenience. To accommodate students who cannot attend classes during the day, Northwest Community College offers a significant number of courses in the evening at the Terrace, Kitimat, and Prince Rupert campuses. The selection of courses varies from year to enable students to complete their studies in the evening and also to provide courses which are of general interest.

### Correspondence Courses

For students unable to attend the College, a number of correspondence courses are offered: Anthropology, Economics, English, Psychology, & Sociology. (See page 21.)

## Admission, Registration and Cost

The College has an open admission policy. Mature students may be admitted without submission of their high school transcript. However, recent graduates are expected to submit their transcript.

You can obtain application forms at any College centre, or by writing to the Registrar's office in Terrace. Part time students may register without having been formally admitted to the College.

Registration for all courses in Terrace, Kitimat and Prince Rupert will take place from August 26 to August 30, 1985. Classes start Tuesday, September 3, 1985. Late registration is often possible. Register in person at the college campus nearest to you.

The fee for all courses is \$21.00 per credit hour (\$63 for a 3 credit course) to a maximum of \$315.00 per semester for five or more courses. Most courses consist of three credit hours.

#### Humanities

English 101-3: Literature and Composition I

Instructor: G. Stanley, B.A., M.A. Mons. & Weds. - 10:30 a.m. - Noon Section II

Instructor: G. Stanley, B.A., M.A. Tues. - 9:00 a.m.- Noon

Section III Instructor: J. Patterson, M.A., Ph.D. Thurs. - 9:00 a.m. - Noon

Section IV Instructor: J. Patterson, M.A., Ph.D. Weds. - 7:00 - 10:00 p.m.

Reading and discussion of modern autobiography, fiction and drama. Lectures on grammar and style. Written assignments based on analysis of the literature read, personal experience, and subjects of general interest. (3,0,0)

English 201-3: English Literature 1300-1650 Instructor: 6. Stanley, B.A., M.A.

Thurs. - 7:00 - 10:00 p.m.

Medieval and Elizabethan England. Reading and discussion of works by Chaucer, Shakespeare, Donne and others. Written assignments based on the works read.

English 151-3 (HSW): Technical Writing I Instructor: 6. Stanley, B.A., M.A. Hons. - 1:00-4:00 p.m.

Methods and forms of technical writing, including letters, resumes, short reports, and communication with media. Lectures and exercises in grammar, vocabulary and style. Students will also read and discuss some modern literature.

French 101-3: Introductory French I Instructor: J. Patterson, M.A., Ph.D. Mon/Wed/Fri: 9:00 -10:30 a.m.

This is the beginning French course for college students, which stresses the opportunity to communicate immediately. Texts used are based on natural everyday French and approximately equal emphasis is given to the four language skills: understanding, speaking, reading and writing. Reading content will interest mature students. Several video taping sessions are arranged at a local studio.

French 110-3: Advanced French I Instructor: J. Patterson, M.A., Ph.D.

Tues: 7:00-10:00 p.m.

A study of contemporary French novels, poetry and stories. A review of French grammar. This course is scheduled in the evening to be of special interest to members of the Francophone Community and to community French Immersion teachers. (3.0.0)

Prerequisite: French 12 or French 108, or permission of the instructor.

#### Social Science Courses

Anthropology 101-3: Introduction to Physical Anthropology and Archeology Instructor: T.B.A.

Tues: 9:00 m.m. - Noon

A general introduction to human biological and cultural history. Students will examine the concepts of evolution, genetics, animal behaviour and race in an attempt to understand what makes us human. (3,0,0)

History 106-3: Canada Since the 1860's Instructor: P. Weber, M.A., Ph.D.

Thurs: 7:00 - 10:00 p.m.

This is an attempt to make major themes of development meaningful to us today. The course will investigate the interrelation of social, economic and political factors, pay significant attention to British Columbia and the activities of common people.

(Please Note: This is a one-semester course. It will be followed by another history course whose nature will be determined in September 1985. If you are interested in a specific course please contact the History Department. - Students primarily interested in Canadian affairs may wish to enrol in "The Canadian Economy" in the winter semester.)

Political Science 203-3: International Politics Instructor: P. Weber, M.A., Ph.D.

Mons: 7:00 - 10:00 p.m.

This course will examine the relations between the superpowers, Europe and the Third world through the study of their internal organization and of international economic and political developments. (Please Note: This is a one-semester course. In the winter semester students may wish to take a course in "The Canadian Economy", or in Modern History.)

Sociology 101-3: Introductory Sociology I Instructor: T.B.A.

Weds: 1:00 - 4:00 p.m.

An examination of the structure of society through the major topics in the discipline of sociology: culture, socialization, primary groups, status and role, and associations.

Sociology 205-3: Sociology of the Family I Instructor: T.B.A.

Tues: 7:00 - 10:00 p.m.

The family and related social institutions. Topics include the origin and history of the family, marriage and children in Western society.

Psychology 101-3: Introductory Psychology I
Section I

Instructor: A. Klingner, B.A., M.A. Tues: 7:00 - 10:00 p.m.

Section II

Instructor: A. Klingner, B.A., M.A. Thurs: 9:00 a.m. - Noon

In the introductory psychology course, Psychology 101 and 102, you will discover some of the reasons why we think, feel and act as we do. The classes consist of lectures, structured experience, discussions and films, as well as other audio-visual presentations. The topics for this course include: a perspective of psychology; life-span psychological development; the biology of behaviour; sensation; perception; the nature of consciousness; conditioning and learning; and motivation and emotion. This course should be followed by Psychology 102. (3,0,0)

Psychology 201-3: Development Psychology I Instructor: L. Tarwick, M.A.

Weds: 7:00 - 10:00 p.m.

The developmental psychology course, Psychology 201 and 202, offers an exploration of human development through the life-span, from conception to death. Following an introduction to the prevalent views of developmental psychologists and the way they attempt to answer relevant questions, the course proceeds to examine the physical, cognitive and psychosocial aspects of development in infancy and play years. This course should be followed by Psychology 202.

Prerequisite: Psychology 101 and 102, or permission of the instructor.

Psychology 221-3: Abnormal Psychology Instructor: T.B.A.

Weds: 9:00 a.m. - Noon

This course offers an overview of the contemporary theories of psychopathology - behavioural, humanistic, psychodynamic and biophysical. as well as a perspective on research, classification and treatment of affective, social, psychotic and organic disorders.

Prerequisite: Psychology 101 and 102, or permission of the instructor.

#### Science Courses

Biology 101-3: Introductory Biology I Instructor: J. Shepard, B.Sc., M.Sc.

Mon. & Wed. 2:00 - 3:30 p.m.(Theory Section I)
Thurs: 9:00 a.m. - Noon (Lab - Section I)

Thurs: 1:00 - 4:00 p.m. (Lab - Section II)

This course will explore human beings as biological entities beginning with a review of cell biology and DNA. We will cover human genetics and evolution, human ecology, anatomy and physiology, reproduction and development, and nutrition. Aspects of health and disease will be integrated with other topics.

Biology 212-3: Environmental Studies Instructor: J. Shepard, B.Sc., M.Sc.

Tues: 7:00 - 10:00 p.m.

This course will cover principles of ecology and will focus on their application to resource utilization and exploitation in the Northwest, including forest resources, watershed and fisheries, big game management, and mineral extraction. The laboratory consists of weekend field trips exploring various features of terrestial and aquatic ecology and examination of resource development issues in forestry, fisheries and mining.

Chemistry 101-3: Introductory Chemistry I

Instructor: C. Jagdeo, B.Sc., M.A. Mon/Wed/Fri: 10:30-11:30a.m. (Theory Section)

Tues: 8:30-11:30 a.m. (Lab Section I)
Tues: 1:00 - 4:30 p.m. (Lab Section II)

This is a basic first-year course in chemistry which will enable students to pursue further courses in all areas of Science and Engineering. Topics will include: A review of some basic principles, including quantum mechanics and electronic configurations, the periodicity of chemical and physical properties, chemical bonding, thermochemistry, properties of gases, and chemical equilibrium, in both gases and solutions. (4,3,0)

Prerequisite: Chemistry 11, or Chemistry 083, and Math 11 or Math 111/112.



Computer Science 111-3:

An Introduction to Computers

Instructor: J. Stone, B. Math
Thurs: 7:00-10:00 p.m. (Theory Section)

Mon: 7:00-10:00 p.m. (Lab Section I) Tues: 1:00-4:00 p.m. (Lab Section II)

This course is intended to provide persons with no previous computer experience with an introduction to the technology, common uses of computers and the concepts of programming. Students will acquire the skills necessary to begin using the computer as a personal problem-solving tool. The programming component of the course does not require any advanced mathematic. Students will be introduced to the programming language Logo. Logo is a modern computer language which is easy to learn and includes powerful features for the solution of sophisticated problems. Weekly lab sessions provide students with an opportunity to use a computer to gain experience with the concepts presented in lectures. Additional computer time is available to students in the evenings and on weekends. (3,3,0)

Prerequisite: Algebra 11, or permission of the instructor.

Computer Science 121-3: Programming in Pascal Instructor: J. Stone, B.Math Mon.Wed/Fri: 3:30-4:30 p.m.

(Theory Section)
Thurs: 1:00-4:00 p.m. (Lab Section)

A rigorous introduction to programming for those who are considering further study in computer science. Computer time is available to students during scheduled labs, in the evenings and on weekends. (3,3,0)

Prerequisite: Algebra 12, or Computer Science 112, or permission of the instructor.

Mathematics 101-4.5: Calculus I Instructor: C. Williston, Ph.D. Mon/Wed/Fri: 9:00-10:30 a.m.

An introduction to the basic techniques of DIFFERENTIAL calculus designed to meet the needs of science and engineering students at a first-year university level. Calculus is the mathematics of changes as opposed to algebra, geometry and trigonometry which involve fixed quantities. DIFFERENTIAL calculus involves finding the rate of change of one variable quantity with respect to another.

Mathematics 111-3:

College Algebra & Trigonometry I Instructor: C. Williston, Ph.D.

Mon. & Wed: 7:00 - 9:30 p.m.

The first part of a two-semester course in which the class meets twice per week. The topics covered in Math 111 and Math 112 includes those in Algebra 12. This course prepares students for Math 101-Calculus. Students should consult the counsellor or the instructor about transfer credit for Math 111/112. (5,0,0)

Prerequisite: Algebra 11 or Math 082.

Mathematics 130-3: Finite Math Instructor: C. Williston, Ph.D.

Tue: 1:00-2:30 p.m.
Thurs: 10:30 a.m. - Noon

A course designed for those who need a science/math elective and who are planning to take courses in economics, business, sociology, political science, psychology and biology. This course will also prepare the student for more specialized courses in the social sciences such as statistics and econometrics. Topics will include: linear equations, linear programming, matrices, set theory, probability, combinations. (3.0.0)

Prerequisite: Algebra 11 or Math 082


Physics 101-3: Motion Energy & Temperature Instructor: C. Jagdeo, B.Sc., M.A.

Mon. & Wed: 12:30-2:00 p.m.(Theory Section)

Fri: 1:00-4:00 p.m. (Lab Section)

An analysis of motion, its causes and consequences. Application of these results to engineering and design problems. High-speed motion and Einstein's Special Theory of Relativity. Fundamental properties of fluids and gases, heat, temperature and entopy. (3,2,1)

Prerequisite: Physics 11 and Algerbra 12 or equivalent.
Corequisite: Students are strongly advised to take Math 101.





A Two-Year Part-Time Program equivalent to the first full year at ECCAD, Granville Island Campus

Emily Carr College of Art and Design has expanded its services to include an innovative part-time credit Foundation program; offered on weekends for maximum accessibility to all people interested in pursuing credit studies in visual arts and design. The students who complete, the Outreach Foundation program will be eligible for direct transfer into second-year courses at ECCAD, Vancouver.

#### Information for E.C.C.A.D. Foundation Students

#### Part-time Foundation Program Format

Studio courses are taught over five weekends (60 hours) with studio time available for individual work during the week. The Survey of Western Art, a 20-part course (8 credits), is divided into two 10-week sessions (4 credits each) as a self-paced learning package that may be viewed in a group or through individual study in the local College library. All courses are taught by ECCAD instructors.

#### **Application Procedure**

ECCAD college catalogues and application forms are available from ECCAD, Vancouver and Northwest Community College centres. Applications must be accompanied by a \$5 application fee and an official transcript of previous studies.\*

\* Late applications will be considered if space is available.

#### Regular Students

Outreach Foundation program is opened to people 18 years of age or older who have graduated from Grade 12 and who meet entry requirments of ECCAD. All must complete an application form and prepare a portfolio of original work for presentation at an admissions interview. Preference is given to students enrolling in the full two-year part-time Foundation program. Those who successfully complete the part-time Foundation program may transfer directly into second year at ECCAD, Vancouver.

#### Occasional Students

Individuals may enrol in one or more Outreach Foundation courses by following the same admission procedure. They will be admitted to the course of their choice if their background, work and motivation are equivalent to regular full-time student applicants. Up to 10 people may be accepted as occasional students in any of the studio courses offered in Terrace and Prince George during 1985/86. Students intending to enrol in Survey of Western Art (I or II) as occasional students are not required to present a portfolio at the admissions interview.

#### Admissions Interviews

All applicants are required to attend an admissions interview. The interview lasts 20 to 30 minutes. Applicants will be expected to present a body of their work, usually in the form of a portfolio, and answer questions about it. However, it is important to be aware that the presentation of a folio involves only a part of the interview. The personal interview deals with other aspects of the applicant's potential as a Foundation student and provides the opportunity for the student to discuss his or her work, previous experiences. future hopes and intentions.

#### The Portfolio

Many prospective students may have questions about the portfolio. They are encouraged to read the guide contained in the ECCAD college catalogue regarding the preparation of a body of work to be presented as a portfolio at the admission interview. Specific questions may be addressed to ECCAD Outreach, Vancouver.


#### Fees







Tuition Reduction: (For Seniors & Disabled)

Senior Citizens (age 65 or over) and registered disabled persons are eligible for tuition-free enrolment in most Northwest Community College courses on a stand-by basis, provided that space is still available within 24 hours of the commencement of the course. This exemption will not apply to Security or Tool Deposits or to any charges for materials, books and supplies that are levied against other students in the course. Further information on this exemption can be obtained from the Registrar's Office or the Regional Centre nearest you.

**Sponsored Students:** 

Students whose fees will be paid by sponsoring agencies are required to present a letter to this effect from the agency concerned at the time of registration.

#### Income Tax:

Receipts totalling over \$100 are income tax deductable. Distance Education students only may deduct both the cost of their books and tuition. **Please keep your receipt**.

#### Holidays:

Classes are not normally held on Statutory Holidays.

### Late Registration and Refund Policy

#### General Conditions:

- Full refunds will be made only if a course is cancelled by the College or if a student withdraws from a course for medical or bereavement reasons prior to the course start date.
- 2. Refunds requested prior to the course start date will be assessed an administration charge of \$10.
- There will be no refunds for courses with tuition fees of \$10 or less except for those conditions in General Statement #1.

#### Part-time Courses

# (Including all Part-time RES Courses and all Part-time Vocational Courses)

- Withdrawals before the second class of a course --100% of tuition, less a \$10 administration charge.
- Withdrawal after the second class of a course -- NO REFUND.
- 3. Special registration and refund policies apply to courses labelled as 'Designated Courses'. NO REFUNDS will be made after the pre-registration date unless the space can be sold to another student, in which case the withdrawing student will be refunded 100% of the tuition fee less a \$10 administration charge.

#### Academic (Part-and Full-time)

- A \$10 'late registration' charge will be assessed to any student registering after the second class or after the second week in standard semester courses.
- Withdrawal after second class -80% of tuition fee less a \$10 administration charge.
- Withdrawal after third or fourth class -- 50% of tuition fee less a \$10 administration fee.
- 4. Withdrawal after fifth class NO REFUND

#### Vocational (Full-time)

- A \$10 'late registration' charge will be assessed to any student registering after the first day of classes in a full-time vocational program.
- Vocational full-time fees are assessed on a calendar month basis, prorated as necessary in the first and last months.
- 3. Refunds on withdrawal before completion will be 100% of unused tuition (part months prorated as above, less a \$10 administration charge. (There will be no administration charge on refunds for students who have completed their program earlier than anticipated when fee payment was made.)
