


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## PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

The College continues to expand programs to meet the needs of you the people in our region. During the past year programming increased by about 5% over the previous year. Indications are that we will experience a similar increase during the current year.

It is important to note, though, that we are constantly striving to meet emerging needs, and that we are not just continuing - albeit with improvements - current offerings. This past year for example, has seen implementation of major new training programs in aquaculture, forest management, and nursing; business education has also been given a major boost with the inauguation of our Mobile Computer Centre that will allow us to give expanded business training throughout the region. ## IMPORTANT INFORMATION FOR ALL STUDENTS

### Late Registration and Refund Policy

#### General Conditions:

1. Full refunds will be made only if a course is cancelled by the College or if a student withdraws from a course for medical or bereavement reasons prior to the course start

- 2. Refunds requested prior to the course start date will be assessed an administration charge of \$10.
- There will be no refunds for courses with tuition fees of \$10 or less except for those conditions in General Statement #1.

#### Part-time Courses (Including all Part-time RES Courses and all Parttime Vocational Courses)

- 1. Withdrawal before the second class of a course 100% of tuition fees less a \$10 administration charge.
- Withdrawal after the second class of a course NO
- 3. Special registration and refund policies apply to courses labelled as "Designated Courses". NO REFUNDS will be made after the pre-registration date unless the space can be sold to another student, in which case the withdrawing student will be refunded 100% of the tuition fee less a \$10 administration charge.

#### Academic (Part- and Full-time)

- 1. A \$10 "late registration" charge will be assessed to any student registering after the second class or after the second week in standard semester courses.
- 2. Withdrawal after second class 80% of tuition fee less a \$10 administration charge.
- 3. Withdrawal after third class or fourth class-50% of tuiton fee less a \$10 administration charge.
- 4. Withdrawal after fifth class NO REFUND.

#### Vocational (Full-time)

- 1. A \$10 "late registration" charge will be assessed to any student registering after the first day of classes in a fulltime vocational program.
- 2. Vocational full-time fees are assessed on a calendar month basis, prorated as necessary in the first and last months.
- 3. Refunds on withdrawal before completion will be 100% of the unused tuition (part months prorated as above) less a \$10 administration charge. (There will be no administration charge on refunds for students who have completed their program earlier than anticipated when fee payment was made.)

#### Tuition Reduction: (For Seniors & Disabled)

Senior Citizens (age 65 or over) and registered disabled persons are eligible for tuition-free enrolment in many Northwest Community College courses on a stand-by basis, provided that space is still available within 24 hours of the commencement of the course. This exemption will not apply to Security or Tool Deposits or to any charges for materials, books and supplies that are levied against other students in the course. Further information on this exemption can be obtained from the Registrar's Office or the Regional Centre nearest you.

#### Sponsored Students:

Students whose fees will be paid by sponsoring agencies are required to present a letter to this effect from the agency concerned at the time of registration

#### Income Tax:

Receipts totalling over \$100 are income tax deductable. Distance Education students only may deduct both the cost of their books and tuition. Please keep your receipt.

## **General Program Information**

The Academic Division offers a comprehensive selection of first- and second-year university transfer courses in the humanities, social sciences and sciences. You can select a combination of prerequisite and elective courses to complete your first or second year of studies at Northwest Community College; students usually take five courses per semester. You then transfer to the program of your choice at one of the universities or community colleges in B.C. or elsewhere. In addition, the Academic Division offers a twoyear Human Service Worker and a one-year Early Childhood Education career program.

The complete Academic program is available at the Terrace campus where residential facilities for more than two hundred out-of-town students are available.

#### Part-Time and Evening Program

It is possible to register for one or more courses during the day or in the evening and in that way spread your course work over a number of years at your convenience.

#### **Correspondence Courses**

For students unable to attend the College, a number of correspondence courses are offered: Anthropology, Economics, English, Psychology, Sociology and Geography.

#### **Admission, Registration and Cost**

The College has an open admission policy. Mature students may be admitted without submission of their high school transcript. However, recent graduates are expected to submit their transcript.

You can obtain application forms at any College centre, or by writing to the Registrar's office in Terrace. Part-time students may register without having been formally admitted to

Registration for all courses in Terrace, Kitimat and Prince Rupert will take place immediately. Register in person at the College campus nearest to you.

Classes start Sept. 2. Last day for late registration and changing of classes is Sept. 19 for all academic students as well as H.S.W. and E.C.E. students.

The fee for all courses is \$22.00 per credit hour (\$66.00 for a 3-credit course) to a maximum of \$330,00 for five or more courses. Most courses consist of three credit hours.

Teleconferencing makes it possible for students in the Northwest to "get together" with each other and their instructor without leaving their communities.

Sophisticated "bridging" equipment in Terrace is linked to teleconference convenors (loudspeaker units and microphones) at regional centres. This bridging of a series of telephone lines allows everyone to communicate with each other

All courses run for 15 weeks. Starting dates are September 2, 1986, and January 5, 1987. Registration forms are available throughout the year at all College offices.

Tuition is \$66 per course plus cost of textbooks.

#### STARTING SEPTEMBER 2, 1986:

ECONOMICS 202

(Wed., 7-10 p.m.)

(Principles, Structures and Policies I)

An analysis of economic activities, institutions and theories. It will focus on the production and distribution of wealth, the big corporation, the Third World, and the role played by governments on the federal and provincial levels; it will offer a detailed critique of monetary, fiscal and investment policies. INSTRUCTOR: Dr. Peter Weber

(Tues., Thurs., 10:30 a.m.-12 noon) (Literature and Composition I)

Reading and discussion of modern fiction, non-fiction and poetry. Written assignments will be based on personal experience, local history and responses to the literature read. The instructor will give help where needed on grammar, punctuation, etc. INSTRUCTOR: George Stanley

PSYCHOLOGY 101 (Mon., 7-10 p.m.)

An exciting first-year survey course, this term investigates major findings in the areas of lifespan development, the nervous system, perception, learning and memory. INSTRUCTOR: Larry Dickerson

SOCIOLOGY 101 (Thurs., 7-10 p.m.)

Sociology encourages the understanding of ourselves, communities and the human world. An examination of the structure of society through the major topics in the discipline of sociology: culture, socialization, primary groups, status and role, and association INSTRUCTOR: Shannon Mark

EARLY CHILDHOOD EDUCATION (Tues., 7-9:30 p.m.)

(Infant Development and Growth)

The student will learn the process of child development in typical and atypical children from conception to age five. INSTRUCTOR: Larisa Tarwick



Classes include lectures, audio-visual presentation and interactive seminars. Problems or questions which arise will be discussed and dealt with immediately by the instructor and other students in several locations



In addition to a full range of programs in Terrace, Northwest Community College now offers five academic courses by teleconferencing. Students in the Northwest share benefits of group interaction through a sophisticated "party line" that simultaneously links them with their instructor and each other.

Two traditional correspondence courses are also available: ENGLISH 101/102 and PSYCHOLOGY 101/102.

#### STARTING JANUARY 5, 1987:

**ECONOMICS 201** 

A continuation of Economics 202. This course will continue to deal with current structural and regional problems of the Canadian economy, with specific aspects of private and public sector policies. It will also include a thorough presentation of traditional micro-economic theories and an analysis of the socio-political implications of the welfare state.

**ENGLISH 102** (Tues., Thurs., 10:30 a.m.-12 noon) A continuation of English 101. Reading and discussion of modern fiction and drama. Written assignments will be based on responses to the literature read and on subjects of general

**PSYCHOLOGY 102** 

A continuation of Psychology 101, this course surveys fascinating research in the areas of thinking, motivation, personality, intelligence, psychological disorders and therapies, stress and health, and social influences on behaviour

SOCIOLOGY 102 (Thurs., 7-10 p.m.)

An examination of the major institutions of society and some of the major trends of modern society. Religion, law, education, politics, urbanization, industrialization and social movements will form the







# Fisheries and Marine Training



The Department of Transport Regulations for the certification of Masters, Mates, Engineers and deck personnel for the fishing industry and the general stream, are in the process of being revised. There are many changes taking place, changes that will require certification of sea-going personnel who, up to the revision of the Regulations, were able to operate without a certificate.

The time to act is now. The Department of Transport has issued the warnings — don't be left behind!

The Northwest Community College, Marine Training Department, in Prince Rupert offers Department of Transport certificate preparation programs leading up to the examinations required for Watchkeeping Mate, the Command Endorsement to the Watchkeeping Mate, Fishing Masters IV, III, II and I, Master Minor Waters, Master Small Craft, upgrading tutorials for ON II and ON I levels, and Marine Engineer IV.

The certificate preparation programs are offered in two modes:

- 1. Full-time daytime courses from 0830 hrs. to 1530 hrs., 5 days per week.
- 2. Continuous-intake, self-paced format. This format allows a student to enter at any time during the year, take any part of the program and work at his own pace. The D.O.T. examinations can be attempted on the fourth Monday of every month except for the month of August.

All parts of the program are modular with the examinations attempted on completion of each module.



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## TRADES PROGRAMS IN PRINCE RUPERT

Trades Common Core: This program, lasting approximately three months, is required for all students commencing training for any trade. Students completing this program can elect to stay in Prince Rupert for further training in mechanical trades or may transfer into any of nine other trades offered at Northwest Community College or other B.C. colleges.

2. Mechanical Occupational Core: This program, lasting approximately three months, is required for all students wishing to specialize in the mechanical trades which include Marine Engine Mechanic, Heavy Duty Mechanic and Automotive Mechanic. Students specializing in Marine Engines will remain in Prince Rupert to complete their training when they have finished this program. Students desiring the other trades must transfer to N.W.C.C. Terrace or another B.C. college to complete their specialization.

Prerequisite: Completion of Common Core
3. Marine Diesel Option: This program includes: 1) servicing cylinder block assemblies; 2) servicing engine support systems; 3) servicing electrical systems; 4) servicing emission systems; 5) servicing fuel injection nozzles and systems; and 6) trouble-shooting

diesel engines.

4. Marine Engine Mechanics: This program, lasting approximately two months, is designed to prepare students for employment in the marine industry. Professional seamen, wishing to seek certification in Marine Engineering, may also be granted credit by the Ministry of Transport upon completion of this program. Detailed course outlines are available at the Prince Rupert Campus, 820-3rd Avenue West.

Prerequisite: Completion of Mechanical Occupational

5. Marine Engineer Class II and IV Certificate: Instruction covers all areas of the syllabi of examinations for the Marine Engineer Class IV Certificate. To sit the examination, 36 months' time at sea in an engine room capacity is required. Remission will be granted for the time spent in marine engineering related industry or on approved courses. Class II candidates must hold a Class III certificate.

## VOCATIONAL AND TRADES TRAINING PROGRAMS LEARNING FORMAT

All instruction in the trades training program sat N.W.C.C. is now available in a self-paced, individualized learning format. This new method of instruction, often referred to as TRAC, permits trainees to enroll in any one of several trades training programs whenever the trainee finds it convenient. Students learn at their own speed on an individualized basis. The program allows trainees to enroll on a part-time or full-time basis, select parts of a course needed for specific purposes and receive credit for training completed. Should the student be required to leave his course and return to employment, he is able to receive credit for all training completed prior to termination.

Most students favour this flexible approach to learning and prefer the TRAC format to past lock-step approach.

Instruction is now available in seven trades at N.W.C.C. (see figure 1 above). The first two to three months of this training, referred to as Common Core, can be credited to eight or nine trades, even though these trades re not available at Northwest Community College. By taking advantage of this feature, students can reduce the time away from home and effect considerable savings.

WHAT ARE THE COURSE PREREQUISITES?
All students entering any of the trades programs shown in figure 1 above are required to be functioning at the Grade 10 equivalency level. Pre-tests are available upon request to assist students in determining whether they have the necessary prerequisites. Intensive Math, Science and English Upgrading programs are available to assist students not having the required prerequisites.

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
