ACADEMIC CLASSES

GENERAL EDUCATIONAL DEVELOPMENT TESTS (GED)

Under this program an adult writes five tests (English Expression, English Literature, Science, Social Studies, and Mathematics) and if the candidate reaches a set standard, he is issued with a certificate from the Department of Education in Victoria stating that he has the equivalent of a Grade 12 education.

Candidates who wish to write the GED tests must meet the following requirements: been out of school for one full academic year, be nineteen years of age, and lived in B.C. for six months.

People who are interested in writing these tests may obtain application forms and more information by contacting Frances Long at 635-4931. Northwest Community College has a testbook on "How to Prepare for the GED Tests" for \$5.75. The fee to write the tests is \$5.00. Refresher courses in Math and English are available for those interested.

12. SURVIVAL FIRST AID

The purpose of this course is to provide an individual with knowledge and skills that are necessary for the emergency care of an injured person pending the arrival of qualified first aid or medical personnel. Courses will be offered on Saturdays when sufficient applications have been received, and are open to those employed in industry or business where certification is relevant or to students in trades and vocational courses. The full program is completed in one day.

13. BOOKKEEPING (ACC 1)

This is an introductory course into the fundamentals of bookkeeping. It is identical to our regular day course and requires a considerable number of home assignments. Routine profit and loss, balance sheets and payroll calculations are included. Completion of this module carries credit towards a Northwest College Business Certificate.

Completion requires proficiency in the operation of machines plus 70% minimum average in the application of business mathematics. Credit may be applied towards a Northwest College Business Certificate.

Completion of this course carries credit towards a Northwest College Business Certificate.

22. ACELECTRONICS

Prerequisites - Course 21 or equivalent knowledge. Discusses wave forms, period, frequency, A.C. meters, oscilloscope, series and parallel circuits, RC filters, phase shifts, reactance, vectors, transformers, trigonometry, resonance, 8 experiments. Supplementary lessons - vector algebra (complex numbers as applied to AC circuits).

Fee: \$50.00 Total Hours: 30

23. SEMICONDUCTOR DEVICES

Prerequisites - Courses 21 and 22 or equivalent knowledge. Discusses diodes, zener diodes, bipolar transistor operation, field effect transistor operation, thysistors, unijunction transistors, special diode circuits, integrated circuits, optoelectronic devices and applications, 11 experiments. Supplementary information - bipolar transistor parameters.

Fee: \$50.00 Total Hours: 42

24. ELECTRONIC CIRCUITS

Prerequisite - course 21 - 23 or equivalent knowledge. Discusses amplifier functions and configurations, classes of operation, audio, video, RF, IF amplifiers, voltage multipliers, voltage regulation, power supplies, oscillators, RC wave shaping circuits, clippers, AM, FM, SSB, modulation, extensive use of meters and oscilloscopes to perform 18 experiments.

Fee: \$50.00 Total Hours: 42

25. ADVANCED DIGITAL TECHNIQUES

Prerequisites - Courses 21 - 24 or equivalent knowledge. Discusses TTL, ECL, CMOS, PMOS, NMOS integrated circuits, SSI, MSI, and LSI, ROM's and PLA's microprocessors and microcomputers. Designing logic circuits through the use of truth tables Boolean algebra and Karnaugh mapping. Also includes flip-flops and registers, sequential and combinational logic circuits, frequency counters. There will be 24 experiments.

Courses 21 - 25 are Heath Continuing Education self-study programs containing numerous lab experiments and unit tests as well as 33 1/3 rpm introductory records. In some areas supplementary lessons have been added.

NORTHWEST COMMUNITY COLLEGE — SPECIAL PROGRAMS —

The following Special Programs of Northwest College will be holding workshops and seminars at various times throughout the winter. Although these programs will be advertised locally, people who are interested should contact the college and have their name put onto the special programs mailing list.

EARLY CHILDHOOD EDUCATION

There is a need for trained personnel to work with young children in day care centers, parent participation pre-schools, private nursery schools and kindergartens. The Early Childhood Education program is designed to prepare students to qualify as supervisors in pre-school centers licensed by the Community Facilities Board.

Admission Requirements:

Completion of Grade 12 and evidence of good student potential.
 Mature students may be admitted without

 Mature students may be admitted without Grade 12 if they show through interview, the ability to achieve desired academic work.

- 3. Applicants must have had some experience in the care of children under six years, particularly with groups of children. References certifying that the experiences were successful are required at the time of interview.
- 4. Persons accepted for the course must have presented a medical report verifying that there are no indications that the applicant's future employment will be hindered by a present physical, mental or emotional problem. Current T.B. certificates must be presented before admission to the course.

The training program requires a serious investment of time, and in emotional and physical energy; therefore the student should make arrangements so that these will not be in conflict with personal interests.

This program will be offered during the day at the Terrace campus.

Selected courses will be offered in the evening and on weekends in other communities.

Fees for courses in this program are \$25.50 per course or a maximum of \$125.00 per semester.

LABOUR EDUCATION PROGRAM

Presently under development is a program designed to serve the trade union organizations, workers and the general public. Presentation will be through individual short courses, seminars, workshops as well as an extended program of courses. These courses will be made available throughout the College Region.

The program will offer material useful to those engaged in all aspects of practical trade union work: bargaining, grievance procedures, stewards training, litigation, media skills, elements of collective agreements, and arbitration. It will provide unorganized workers interested in trade unionism with an introduction to labour rights. This will include a basic orientation in the legislative framework of certification and trade union organization.

The program will introduce courses which will develop an understanding of the economic, social, and political environment in which trade unions operate. There will be an opportunity to study business organization. Corporate organization, structure and law, management conceptions of "labour relations", interpretation of company financial statements, production management

techniques and corporate political strategies would form some of the elements of a course in business organization. The program will provide for the study of the labour movement; the movement's history, social impact, literature and art.

PROGRAMS IN ABORIGINAL **STUDIES**

Northwest Community College offers a diverse series of programs designed to serve the Native population in the College area. Grouped under the title "Aboriginal Studies", the courses and workshops which are developed take a hard and realistic look at the history, lifestyle and politics of the Native nations of the Northwest. There are four main thrusts to the Programs.

1. Professional Studies Programme

This is a uniquely designed program of university-transfer courses developed especially for Native workers involved in jobs servicing their people. Through a carefully-selected list of readings, subjects, guests speakers and films, students take a modelled look at a whole host of topic areas, such as human behaviour, government structures, land and resources, law, racial stereotypes, sexual stereotypes and political systems. Students maintain their jobs while at school as classes are given for one week every month. Financial support is provided and travelling tutorial help supports students who lack confidence and/or proper study habits.

2. Aboriginal People and the Land

A fourteen-week seminar series, for credit or non-credit, looking at the history of European contact on aboriginal peoples in North America, with specific reference to Canada and Northwest B.C. A diverse variety of films and quest speakers will compare conditions and historical movements from the Northwest Territories to Wounded Knee.

3. Workshops

Aside from the above programs, many workshops and seminars are run through the Program. These are held wherever people may want them and concern just about any issue involving Native people.

4. Native Film Festival

A progressive series of films depicting Native life and struggles worldwide will be run this year. See your newspapers for final schedules and films in September.
