LEARNING UNLIMITED

Community Education Services is what Northwest Community College and the continuing education branch of School District #52 is all about. The two have joined resources in developing a program designed to offer as many courses and services as possible and as needed to the Prince Rupert - Port Edward area.

The college has just recently begun to expand its programs from its established center in Terrace, and this year participating school districts agreed to combine the local college coordinator's position with that of the Director of Continuing Education - a move that has streamlined methods and delivery systems.

Programs offered through the college and the school district are designed for the public in mind with an eventual goal to work in co-operation with other community programs offered through the region.

Most classes meet at the Prince Rupert Secondary School and the college campus above the Amante Furniture Store at 820 West 3rd Avenue during Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday evenings.

Registration for all classes except academic will take place on Wednesday, January 12, 1977.

Those enrolled in academic arts must register the first night of class. Academic courses begin on Monday, January 10, 1977.

Fees are payable at the time of registration. Cheques and money orders should be made payable to School District #52. Refunds will be granted only when courses are cancelled.

A husband and wife may register in a course for one and one-half times the regular fee. Usually, old age pensioners will be required to pay a registration fee of only \$2.00 for each course, however, where the fee includes cost of books or material, an additional charge may be necessary.

ACADEMIC

Admission: The College has an "open door" admissions policy - students do not have to be high school graduates to enter college academic courses. The courses are designed for adults who wish to further their intellectual interests and who may have left the formal schooling system some time ago as well as for recent high school graduates. The college promotes the concept of "lifelong learning".

All academic courses offered in the spring are continuations of a fall semester course. Registration will take place on the first night of the class or new registrations may be taken at the college campus in the Amante Building, 820 West 3rd Avenue, Prince Rupert, B.C.

Tuition Fees: \$25.50 per course per semester.
Courses normally require two (2) semesters: Sept. - Jan. and Jan. - April.
Senior Citizens 60 years of age and over are not charged tuition fees.

Course Descriptions:

ANTHROPOLOGY 101/102:

An introduction to physical and cultural anthropology. This course will focus on three major themes: the origins of human beings and society, the history of North American native peoples, and an examination of present-day developments in countries of the Third World (China, Africa, and the Arab countries).

ECONOMICS 101/102:

An introduction to economic thought and history. The first semester of this course will focus on the development of the economic aspects of society attention to the theories of major philosophers and current economic issues. The second semester is devoted to study and analysis of economic problems in Canada; wage and price controls, inflation, and resource development are among the issues that will be examined. The course is designed for the lay person who wants to acquire a better understanding of economic matters.

ACADEMIC

ENGLISH 101/102:

A study of twentieth-century writing: novels, short stories, drama, and poetry, and a program of student writing. A reading list will be available at registration.

ENGLISH 201/202:

English literature 1350 - 1900: a survey of English literature from Chaucer to Hopkins, based on a selection of works from major authors. A reading list will be available at registration.

HISTORY 101/102:

Selected topics in economic development, social change, and political power, 1840's to present.

This course is designed to give the student an understanding of the nature of historical studies, of basic concepts and terminologies, and of fundamental issues and developments in modern history. Emphasis will be laid on the interrelation of political-intellectual with social and economic history. The course will be organized on a seminar basis to allow a maximum of individual participation and discussion in class.

PSYCHOLOGY 101/102:

An introduction to psychology. Topics include: a brief history of psychology, elementary experimental design, the nervous system, thinking, language, intelligence and testing, personality theories, mental health, and a brief introduction to social psychology.

SOCIOLOGY OF EDUCATION 203/204:

A seminar for teachers, educational administrators and anyone else who cares about the direction of education in Canada today. This course will be structured around the reading and discussion of a series of books embracing a broad spectrum of opinion in the field. Works by Holt, Kozol, Herndon, Kohl, Martell, Tussman, and Bowles and Gintis will be among the readings. The course will deal with both practical questions and current theoretical issues.

WOMEN'S STUDIES 101/102:

This course will examine the status and role of women in Canadian society. It will trace the development of sex role divisions in the family and other institutions, and examine the influence of education, the media, etc., on the development and reinforcement of female role models. Particular attention will be paid to the role of women in the paid labour force. The status of women at all levels of society will be examined; in addition, North American conditions will be contrasted to those in other cultures, particularly in Europe and Asia.

Admission Requirements:

1. Completion of Grade 12 and evidence of good student potential.

2. Mature students may be admitted without Grade 12 if they show, through interview the shility to achieve desired academic work

interview, the ability to achieve desired academic work.

 Applicants must have had some experience in the care of children under six years particularly with groups of children. References certifying that the experiences were successful are required at the time of interview.

4. Persons accepted for the course must have presented a medical report verifying that there are no indications that the applicant's future employment will be hindered by a present physical, mental or emotional problem. Current T.B. certificates must be presented before admission to the course.

On successful completion of the program, students will be licenced as pre-school supervisors by the Community Facilities Licencing Board (Government of British Columbia).

Skills are developed in communications, applied science, mathematics and english. This course runs daily, Monday through Friday, from 8:30 to 3:30. EDUCATIONAL UPGRADING

ADULT SECONDARY SCHOOL PROGRAM

This program is designed to enable adults whose formal education has been interrupted to complete secondary school graduation. Special regulations permit adults to graduate on completion of English 12, Social Studies 11 and five other courses, three of which must be at the Grade 12 level.

Only persons who are, at the time of application, nineteen years of age or older are eligible for admission. An eighteen year old who has been out of school for at least one year may be admitted with special permission.

Adults entering the program are able to take secondary school courses during the day at Prince Rupert Secondary School, in the evenings when courses are offered through Adult Education and by correspondence from the Provincial Department of Education.

GENERAL EDUCATIONAL DEVELOPEMENT TESTS

The Grade 12 equivalency test is aimed at adults who did not graduate from secondary school but have acquired skills, through work and study experiences, at or above secondary school level. The GED tests provide an opportunity for these people to earn an official document stating they have a Grade 12 secondary school equivalency standing, which may assist them in qualifying for better jobs, for promotions and in applying for admission to post-secondary educational institutions. Some people may wish to take the tests for personal satisfaction.

The tests are delivered in a series of the five comprehensive areas of English Expression, Social Studies, Natural Sciences, Literature and mathematics.

Persons applying to write the exams must meet the following three requirements at the time of application - minimum age of nineteen; at least six months B.C. residency, and out of school for at least one full academic year.
