

JANUARY IS REGISTRATION MONTH

Registrations are accepted on a first-come, first-served basis. When classes are filled, late registrations are wait-listed for the next class. When there are not enough registrations to form a class, the course is wait-listed until sufficient enrollment is received. Registrants will then be notified of beginning dates.

REGISTRATION IS IMPORTANT

A complete REFUND is made ONLY when a course is cancelled. Classes require a minimum number of participants, usually ten, to be self-supporting. Lack of enrollment or withdrawals can result in cancellation of a course.

ADULT BASIC EDUCATION

BASIC LITERACY

DAY OR EVENING

Individual tutoring or small group tutoring is available for adults who have minimal or no skills in reading, writing, and arithmetic. Students work at their own speed through a program designed for adults that will bring them up to a grade 6 equivalency standing. Instruction time can be arranged to the student's convenience. UPGRADING (B.T.S.D. GRADE 12 COMPLETION)

DAY OR EVENING

Would you like to improve your math, English, or science? Would you like a specialized course in reading, spelling or report writing? Would you like to acquire Grade 8, 10, or 12 equivalency in order to gain entrance to trade or vocational training? Would you like assistance in studying for your G.E.D. examination? If your answer is yes to any of the above questions, then this is the course for you. Each student begins at his own level and works at his own speed. The instructor will design a program with each student to suit individual needs. College certificates are awarded for successful completion of Level 2 (grade 8), Level 3 (grade 10), and Level 4 (grade 12). YOU MAY ENROLL AT ANY TIME.
