

REFUNDS

SCALE OF WITHDRAWAL REFUNDS

- (a) Withdrawal within two weeks after commencement of classes; 80 percent refund.
- (b) Withdrawal within four weeks after commencement of classes; 50 percent refund.
- (c) Withdrawal more than four weeks after commencement of classes; NO REFUND.

INCOME TAX DEDUCTIBILITY

Retain fee receipts for income tax return. Receipts totalling over \$25.00 are deductible.

ADMISSION POLICY

Northwest Community College has an "open door" admission policy. You do not have to be a high school graduate to enter college courses. Courses are designed for adults who wish to further their intellectual interests and who may have long since been out of formal schooling, as well as for recent high school graduates. The College promotes the concept of "lifelong learning" and is sensitive to the particular educational needs of women, workers, and native people. Our instructors are aware that many students are on shift work at Alcan and Eurocan, and are prepared to be flexible in this regard.

AUDITOR (NON-CREDIT)

It is possible to audit most of the acadmic courses offered by Northwest College.

An auditor must register and pay fees. Auditors ordinarily do not write examinations or hand in class assignments but may voluntarily participate in all aspects of the course. Record of courses audited is made on a student's permanent record.

A student may change from Audit to Credit or Credit to Audit status only before February 23rd.

Auditors must attend classes on a regular basis.

WITHDRAWAL, TERMINATION, PERMANENT RECORD

Students enrolled in full or part-time credit programs are advised that a permanent record of their work at Northwest College will be maintained. Students who apply for admission to any other post-secondary institution will be asked to supply an official transcript of their record at this college. It is most important therefore that students electing to not complete any course(s) they have undertaken, notify the college in writing of their withdrawal. Students who fail to notify the college or who withdraw after February 23rd without giving adequate reason for their withdrawal may show a failure on their Permanent Record.

CANCELLATION OF CLASSES

Classes require a minimum number of participants — usually 10. Lack of enrolment or withdrawals can result in cancellation of a course.

HOLIDAYS

Classes will not normally be held on Statutory Holidays or when schools are closed.



PROVINCIAL SUPERVISORY CERTIFICATE PROGRAM

Northwest College is piloting a provincially recognized Supervisory Training Certificate Program in Kitimat. Certification requires completion of 3 four-day modules. The complete program includes 90 hours of integrated material covering a broad range of management skills. The program is constructed to be highly experimental, to attract the trainee towards involvement. Units can be completed in any order.

Part 1 - Interpersonal skills, including communication, problem solving, and decision-making.



GRADE 12 EQUIVALENCY EXAMS

The G.E.D. tests, General Educational Development Tests, provide an opportunity for many adults who did not graduate from secondary school to acquire an official document stating that they have a Grade 12 secondary school equivalency standing. This may assist you in qualifying for a better job, for promotion within your own organization, for admission to post-secondary educational institutions or for your own personal satisfaction.

The tests consist of 5 - two hour exams. Study texts are available for sale from the Northwest Community College office. Next testing dates: February 23/24 and June 22/23, 1979, in Kitimat.

C26 ASSERTIVENESS SKILL TRAINING FOR WOMEN

Has anyone ever cut in front of you line? Do you have difficulty saying "no" to persuasive salesmen? Can you comfortably begin a conversation with a stranger at a party? Have you ever regretted "stepping on" someone else? Many people find these and similar situations uncomfortable or irritating, and are at a loss for just the "right" response. Behaviour which enables a person to act in her own best interests, to stand up for herself without undue anxiety, to

express honest feelings comfortably or to exercise her own rights without denying the rights of others in Assertive Behaviour. This course will assist women to develop a more adequate repertoire of assertive behaviour, so that she many choose appropriate and self fulfilling responses in a variety of situations.
