

REFUNDS

School District #80 Courses: Fees are not normally subject to refund unless a course is cancelled.

Northwest College Courses: Withdrawal within 2 weeks after commencement of classes — 80% refund.
Withdrawal within 4 weeks — 50% refund.
Withdrawal after more than 4 weeks — NO REFUND

INCOME TAX DEDUCTIBILITY

Retain fee receipts for income tax return. Receipts totalling over \$25.00 are deductible.

ADMISSION POLICY

Northwest Community College: We have an "open door" admission policy. You do not have to be a high school graduate to enter college courses. Courses are designed for adults who wish to further their intellectual interests and who may have long since been out of formal schooling, as well as for recent high school graduates. The College promotes the concept of "lifelong learning" and is sensitive to the particular educational needs of women, workers, and native people. Our instructors are aware that many students are on shift work at Alcan and Eurocan, and are prepared to be flexible in this regard.

COURSE CHANGE/WITHDRAWAL

Northwest Community College: A student wishing to add, drop or change a course must complete the necessary forms available from the Registrar. Changes in programs must be made by the dates specified for these changes in this calendar. A student may withdraw from any course by filing a withdrawal form with the office of the Registrar. After the fourth week, withdrawals will be permitted only under exceptional circumstances, and only with the approval of the instructor. Students who drop a course without officially withdrawing will receive a final grade of F.
