Note: Instructors will be available during the evening of Registration, 7:00 p.m. to 9:00 p.m., to meet with students and discuss course content.

FEES: Tuition varies with each course, and must be paid upon registration.

SUPPLIES: Some courses may require purchase of textbooks and other material. Unless otherwise stated, these costs are not included in the tuition. Course descriptions will note supply requirements.

CANCELLATIONS: Courses may be cancelled due to lack of enrolment, so register now, and bring a friend or two.

REFUNDS: No refunds will be granted for School District courses unless course is cancelled. Classes usually require a minimum enrolment of ten to be self-supporting. For Northwest College courses, refunds are granted as follows:

- (a) withdrawal within two weeks after commencement of classes: 80% refund.
- (b) withdrawal within four weeks after commencement of classes: 50% refund.
- (c) withdrawal more than four weeks after commencement of classes: No refund.

GENERAL EDUCATIONAL DEVELOPMENT TESTS - GRADE 12 EQUIVALENCY

This is a series of five comprehensive examinations in English Composition, Social Studies, Natural Sciences, Literature and Mathematics, which are designed to measure as precisely as possible the students' major generalizations, ideas, and intellectual skills normally gained through secondary-school attendance.

GED certification provides an opportunity to earn an official statement of grade 12 equivalency standing which may assist in qualifying for better jobs, promotions, admission to post-secondary educational institutions, or as a personal assessment of skills.

To write these tests, you must meet the following requirements:

- 1) be at least 19 years of age
- 2) be out of school at least one academic year
- 3) be a resident of B.C. for at least six months, and
- 4) pay a \$5.00 administrative charge

PREPARATION: In order to assist participants in preparing for the tests, Continuing Education recommends they enrol in the English and Math refresher courses held during the evenings.

SITTINGS: Next test dates are March 17th and 18th. Application forms must be completed and returned to our office by Friday, February 17th. Administration fee of \$5.00, payable to the Minister of Finance.

HIGH SCHOOL COMPLETION: Under the Adult Secondary School program, the School District presently offers three methods of attaining credits towards Grade 12 graduation: by 1) enrolling in the Ministry of Education's correspondence program; 2) attending day classes at the Prince Rupert Senior Secondary School, and 3) attending Adult Ed evening credit classes when available.

To be eligible for this program, one must be 19 years of age, or older, or 18 years and out of school for at least one year. In order to graduate, students must complete English 12, Social Studies 11, and five other credit courses from the Senior Secondary program curriculum, three of which must be numbered "12." Prospective students should make an appointment with the Continuing Education coordinator before enrolling in this program.

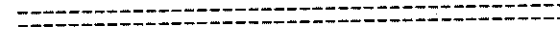
