LIFE LONG LEARNING

This brochure outlines the Community Education Programme available in Smithers and Houston from Northwest Community College and the Continuing Education Services of School District #54 (Smithers). It includes:

University Transfer Courses Vocational Upgrading High School Completion Arts and Crafts Personal Improvement General Interest Recreation

This programme is offered through the co-operation of YOUR College and YOUR School District. Be involved -YOUR participation and YOUR suggestions will determine the future growth and direction of this programme.

ADMISSION REQUIREMENTS

THIS PROGRAMME HAS BEEN DESIGNED TO MEET THE NEEDS OF ALL ADULTS IN OUR COMMUNITIES WHO WILL HAVE VARYING GOALS AND EDUCATIONAL BACKGROUNDS. ALL MATURE STUDENTS ARE WELCOME. Northwest College has an open-door admissions policy - STUDENTS DO NOT HAVE TO BE HIGH SCHOOL GRADUATES to enter college academic courses. These courses have been carefully designed to:

- 1. further the intellectual interests of adults in our communities by tailoring the content to their concerns,
- 2. also provide university transfer credit for those people working towards degrees by maintaining the content at a high standard.

Students may AUDIT academic courses or take them for CREDIT. A student who elects to Audit is not required to write examinations or term papers. To obtain Credit for a course a student must complete all assignments. Northwest College is particularly concerned in serving the needs of women, workers, and native people.

FEES

Tuition fees are due and payable at the first session of each class.

Tuition fees normally only cover the cost of classroom instruction. If required, texts and materials may be purchased through the instructors.

The courses are FREE OF CHARGE to Senior Citizens, but charges for texts and materials still apply. Retain your fee receipts for your Income Tax Return. Receipts totalling over \$25.00 are deductable.

REFUNDS

A complete refund of fees is made only when a course is cancelled. Classes require a minimum number of participants, usually ten, to be self-supporting. Lack of enrollment or withdrawals can result in cancellation of a course.

UNIVERSITY TRANSFER CREDIT

Transfer credit has been arranged with British Columbia Universities (generally this implies full transferability to any Canadian University) for the following courses:

These courses are designed to broaden everyone's intellectual pursuits and the only admission requirements are a mature mind and interest in the subject.

SPECIAL SERVICES

COUNSELLING

The student services Counsellor from Northwest Community College will be visiting Smithers and Houston on a regular schedule. He will be available to advise adults and secondary students on any post-secondary education programs they may wish to pursue. Phone the Offices of Continuing Education at 847-3461 or 845-7266 to arrange for an appointment.

BASIC LITERACY

Individual tutoring in the student's home or tutor's home will be available for adults who have minimal or no skills in reading, writing and arithmetic but who do speak fluent English. Students can study independently through the use of audio cassette tapes. People who wish to take part in this programme may not be able to read this ad. Please direct them to the Continuing Education Co-ordinator in Smithers 847-3461. Entrance fee \$10.00. Materials supplied.

ADULT SECONDARY PROGRAMME

The British Columbia Adult Secondary School Programme is designed to enable adults whose formal education has been interrupted to complete secondary school graduation. It consists of seven courses selected from the Senior Secondary (grades 11 & 12) curriculum: English 12, Social Studies 11, and five other courses, three of which must be at the grade 12 level. Adults are welcome to take all or some of these courses at Smithers Senior Secondary School or Houston Senior Secondary.

CORRESPONDENCE COURSES

The Correspondence Branch, Ministry of Education, Victoria, B.C., offers a wide range of academic upgrading and vocational courses, many of which carry credit. A number of courses for university credit are available by correspondence from B.C. Universities and universities in other provinces.

WHAT IS G.E.D.? GRADE 12 EQUIVALENCY

Under the General Education Development Programme, an adult writes five tests: English Literature, English Grammar, Science, Social Studies and Mathematics. They are designed to measure the major generalizations, ideas and intellectual skills that are normally gained through twelve years of schooling. Successful candidates are issued with a certificate from the Ministry of Education. Victoria, stating that they have the equivalent of a Grade 12 education. TEST FEE: \$5.00 Candidates must meet the following requirements: be nineteen years of age or older, have been out of school for at least one full academic year and have lived in British Columbia for at least six months. TESTING SESSION - Smithers - Friday night and all day Saturday - April 28 and 29, 1978.

The UPGRADING MATHEMATICS or UPGRADING ENGLISH courses will help to prepare you for these tests (see pages 7, 21 and 22). G.E.D. textbooks are available from the Offices of Continuing Education.

ACADEMIC

CANADIAN GEOGRAPHY - GEOGRAPHY 205

This course will examine the cultural-geographic landscape of Canada, with special reference to minority groups and their reflection on the landscape, urbanization, contemporary land questions, resource developments, Canada and the international scene, and the artist in Canada. Class meetings will include lectures, films, discussions, guest speakers and field trips. No prerequisite. 1½ credit units. Register at first class.

CHILD PSYCHOLOGY - PSYCHOLOGY 202

The psychological development of children will be examined, with emphasis on intellectual and social development and the development of personality. The course is designed to provide students with an awareness of growth and development through childhood and adolescence. It also emphasizes the practical implications of important studies in child development and is for anyone involved in the care or education of children. No prerequisite. 1½ credit units. CROSS CULTURAL SOCIOLOGY - SOCIOLOGY 111

This course will examine different living patterns of various cultures. It will focus on China and B.C. Northwest cultures (the Gitsan culture in particular) in comparison with Canadian culture. The influence of the socialist government in China and the history of the matrilineal system of the Gitsan culture will be studied. Students will be encouraged to examine concepts and theories of ethnocentricity, assimilation, political structures and sexism. No prerequisite.

Bronowski's film documentary The Ascent of Man will be shown in coordination with related lectures. Readings for the course will range from Aristotle to Vonnegut, Marx to Camus. UPGRADING READING

Don't let underdeveloped reading skills hold you back in your job or studies. Improve your comprehension and reading rate through an individualized program tailored to your needs.
