

FEES AND REFUNDS

G.E.D. - GENERAL EDUCATION DEVELOPMENT TESTS (Grade 12 Equivalency)

DATE: Friday and Saturday, October 27 & 28 Application Deadline: October 13

The General Educational Development Tests provide an opportunity for many adults who did not graduate from secondary school to acquire an offical document stating that they have a Grade 12 equivalency standing. This may assist you in qualifying for better jobs, for promotion, and in pursuing further training. Candidates must meet the following requirements: be nineteen years of age or older, have been out of school for at least one full academic year and have lived in British Columbia for at least six months.

G.E.D. PREP

Prepares you to take the G.E.D. tests. This short course is only an orientation to G.E.D. It does not include any material that will assist you in up-grading basic math or English skills. If you are considering taking the G.E.D. tests, THIS COURSE IS STRONGLY RECOMMENDED.



ISTORY 151: LOCAL HISTORY SEMINAR

An examination of the history of the Hazelton and Skeena River area, covering from approximately 1800 to the present time. 
