### Admission Policy:

We have an "open-door" admission policy. You do not have to be a highschool graduate to enter college courses. Courses are designed for adults who wish to further their intellectual interests and who may have long since been out of formal schooling, as well as for recent highschool graduates. The College promotes the concept of "lifelong learning" and is sensitive to the particular educational needs of women, workers, and native people. Our instructors are aware that many students are on shift work at Alcan and Eurocan, and are prepared to be flexible in this regard. All Arts and Science courses are accredited at B.C. Universities.

# NATIVE STUDIES 102

# ABORIGINAL Peoples and the Land

Note: This course is held at the Band Council Hall in Kitamaat Village.

A series of 14 Lectures will explore the effects of European contact on the aboriginal peoples of North America with emphases on Canada and B.C. Relationships will be drawn to aboriginal peoples in other parts of the world, especially Asia and Africa.

This course will emphasize the role of social and economic institutions in the early colonization of aboriginal peoples, progressing to discussions of modern day attempts on the part of Native peoples to gain control of their hereditary lands and resources. Guest speakers, relevant movies and a progressive reading list should combine to make this an exciting weekly event.

Some of the particular topics that will be studies include: The MacKenzie Valley Pipeline; the effect of European religions on Native Culture; the Department of Indian Affairs; the Hudson's Bay Co.; the historical development of Native Political organizations; and land claims in the Northwest.
