Admission Requirements

THIS PROGRAMME HAS BEEN DESIGNED TO MEET THE NEEDS OF ALL ADULTS IN OUR COMMUNITIES WHO WILL HAVE VARYING GOALS AND EDUCATIONAL BACKGROUNDS. ALL MATURE STUDENTS ARE WELCOME.

Northwest College has an open-door admissions policy - STUDENTS DO NOT HAVE TO BE HIGH SCHOOL GRADUATES to enter college academic courses. These courses have been carefully designed to:

1. further the intellectual interests of adults in our communities by tailoring the content to their concerns:
2. also provide university transfer credit for those people working towards degrees by maintaining the content at a high standard.

Students may AUDIT academic courses or take them for CREDIT. A student who elects to Audit is not required to write examinations or term papers. To obtain Credit for a course a student must complete all assignments. Northwest College is particularly concerned in serving the needs of women, workers and native people.

Registration Fees

Registration fees are due and payable by the first class of each course. A refund will be given only if a course is cancelled. Classes do require a minimum number of participants, usually 10, to be self supporting. The courses are FREE OF CHARGE TO Senior Citizens. Retain your FEE RECEIPT for your Income Tax return. Receipts totalling over \$25.00 are deductible.

University Transfer Credit

Transferability has been arranged with all three British Columbia Universities (generally this implies full transferability to any Canadian University) for the following courses:

Modern Literature and Composition - English 101
Child Psychology - Psychology 201
Pyramids to Picasso - History of Western Art
(UBC Fine Arts 125)
Philosophy of Education - UBC Ed. 400
General Geography - Geography 102.

Special Services

BASIC LITERACY

Individual tutoring in the student's home or tutor's home will be available for adults who have minimal or no skills in reading, writing and arithmetic but who do speak fluent English. Students can study independently through the use of audio cassette tapes. People who wish to take part in this programme may not be able to read this ad. ADULT SECONDARY PROGRAMME

The British Columbia Adult Secondary School Programme is designed to enable adults whose formal education has been interrupted to complete secondary school graduation. It consists of seven courses selected from the Senior Secondary (grades 11 and 12) curriculum: English 12, Social Studies 11, and five other courses, three of which must be at the grade 12 level. Adults are welcome to take all or some of these courses at Smithers Senior Secondary School or Houston Senior Secondary School.

CORRESPONDENCE COURSES

The Correspondence Branch, Ministry of Education, Victoria, B.C. offers a wide range of academic upgrading and vocational courses, many of which carry credit. A number of courses for university credit are available by correspondence from B.C. Universities and universities in other provinces. Contact the Office of Continuing Education in Smithers if you wish information on correspondence courses.

WHAT IS G.E.D.? GRADE 12 EQUIVALENCY

Under the General Education Development Programme an adult writes five tests; English Literature, English Grammar, Science, Social Studies and Mathematics. They are designed to measure the major generalizations, ideas and intellectual skills that are normally gained through twelve years of schooling. Successful candidates are issued with a certificate from the Ministry of Education, Victoria, stating that they have the equivalent of a grade 12 education.

Candidates must meet the following requirements: be nineteen years of age or older, have been out of school for at least one full academic year and have lived in British Columbia for at least six months.

Testing sessions in Smithers and Houston will take place in May, 1978. People who are interested in writing these tests may obtain further information from the Office of Continuing Education. Those requiring upgrading or refresher courses should consider taking the upgrading Mathematics and English evening courses. Test fee: \$5.00 (see pages 8,9,23,24)

CHILD PSYCHOLOGY (PSYCHOLOGY 201)

The psychological development of infants and children, from birth to adolescence will be examined and emphasis will be on intellectual and social developments and the development of personality. The course is designed to provide students with an awareness of growth and development in the prenatal period, infancy, childhood and adolescence. The major theories of development are described and evaluated. Major mile-stones in physical, cognitive, and emotional/social growth will be identified and discussed as well as deviances from these norms. The course also emphasizes the practical implications of important studies in child development and is for anyone involved in the care or education of children. An introductory course in which consideration is given to the philosophical foundations of education and to the practical bearings of theory upon curriculum content and classroom practice in our schools. "PYRAMIDS TO PICASSO" - (THE HISTORY OF WESTERN ART)

The history of architecture, sculpture, and painting of the Western World from Ancient Egypt and Mesopotamia to the present through a selective presentation on television of some representative monuments and significant ideas expressed in visual art. The complete course consists of 46 audio-visual tapes designed for distance education by the Dept. of Fine Arts, U. B. C. along with group discussion and instruction on works presented. Course manuals and texts will be available for those who wish to take the course for University credit. If there is sufficient registration this course will be offered Monday mornings as well as evenings.

Specific issues to be examined will include the glacial history of Canada, pre-historic migrations, Inuit and Eskimo Indian settlement patterns, early historic and contemporary resource utilization, urbanization, communication systems, and regional differences in terms of the cultural landscape. This course will offer new Canadians instruction and guidance towards applying for Canadian citizenship. It will include information on the privileges and responsibilities of citizens, our system of government, Canadian culture, society, history and geography. UPGRADING MATHEMATICS

An individualized programme to take you from your present level of skill in this subject up to the level you wish to attain. Students will be tested to determine their appropriate entrance points into the programme. They may then work towards the level they wish to achieve e.g. Grade 10 Vocational entrance, Grade 12 Vocational Entrance, G.E.D. Grade 12 Equivalency Certificate, University Entrance. AIRBRAKES

This course prepares drivers for a written and practical test on the operation and maintenance of air brake systems for either on-highway or off-highway vehicles. Those taking off-highway exams will be required to pay to the Department of Transport a \$5.00 examination fee. This course can also include young persons who wish to drive air-equipped vehicles. Successful completion will give an air endorsement on the person's licence. Classes will be held four hours per day over a six day period (five evenings and one Saturday morning session). BASIC WELDING

Northwest College is presently developing a mobile training unit which will soon be ready for day or evening classes. It will be used to assist people who are working in a related occupation, e.g. millwrights, mechanics, farmers or other equipment operators. The course will be basic in nature and will give people a good working knowledge of oxy-acetylene and arc welding equipment. Commencement of the course in Smithers will depend upon the number of applicants.
