Community Education Services (CES) is a joint School District and College program designed to deliver a wide variety of continuing education courses in the Prince Rupert area, including academic, university transfer, vocational, general interest, and community education.

Tuition Fees: Fees are set according to the extent and type of course. Some courses may require student purchase of material and/or textbooks. Fees must be paid IN FULL at registration.

Cancellations: Courses may be cancelled if there is not sufficient enrolment. Refunds WILL NOT be given unless a course is cancelled.

General: Unless otherwise listed, classes for the fall semester commence the week of September 12 for academic courses, and the week of September 19 for most other courses. Starting dates are included in each course description.

## UNIVERSITY TRANSFER PROGRAM

Admission: The Northwest Community College has an 'open door' admissions policy - students do not have to be high school graduates to enter college academic courses. The courses are designed for adults who wish to further their intellectual interests and who may have left the formal schooling system some time ago, as well as for recent high school graduates. Students do not have to have future academic pursuits in mind to enrol in this program.

Registration: Registration will be held at the college campus, Amante Building, 820 - 3rd Avenue West, on Tuesday, September 6, 1977, 12 p.m. to 4 p.m. and 6:30 p.m. to 9:30 p.m. College personnel and instructors will be on hand to meet with and assist students.

Tuition Fees: \$25.50 per course per semester. Courses normally require two (2) semesters: Sept. - Jan and Jan. - April. Senior Citizens, 60 years of age and over, are not charged tuition fees.

# ADULT SECONDARY SCHOOL PROGRAM

To be eligible for this program, one must be 19 or older, or 18 and out of school for at least one year. In order to graduate, students must complete English 12, Social Studies Il, and five other credit courses from the Senior Secondary program curriculum, three of which must be numbered '12.'

Course may be completed by enrolling in (1) the ministry of education's Correspondence program or by (2) attending day classes at the Prince Rupert Senior Secondary School.

# GENERAL EDUCATIONAL DEVELOPMENT TESTS - Grade 12 equivalency

This is a series of five comprehensive examinations in English Composition, Social Studies, Natural Sciences, Literature, and Mathematics, which are designed to measure as precisely as possible the students' major generalizations, ideas, and intellectual skills normally gained through secondary-school attendance.

GED certification provides an opportunity to earn an official statement of grade 12 equivalency standing which may assist in qualifying for better jobs, promotions, and admission to post-secondary educational institutions. To write these tests, you must meet the following requirements;

1) be at least 19 years of age:

2) be out of school at least one academic year;

3) be a resident of B. C. for at least six months, and 4) pay a \$5.00 administrative charge.

Next sittings in Prince Rupert are scheduled for October 14th and 15th. Applications forms may be picked up at the CES offices and must be completed and returned by September 16th.
