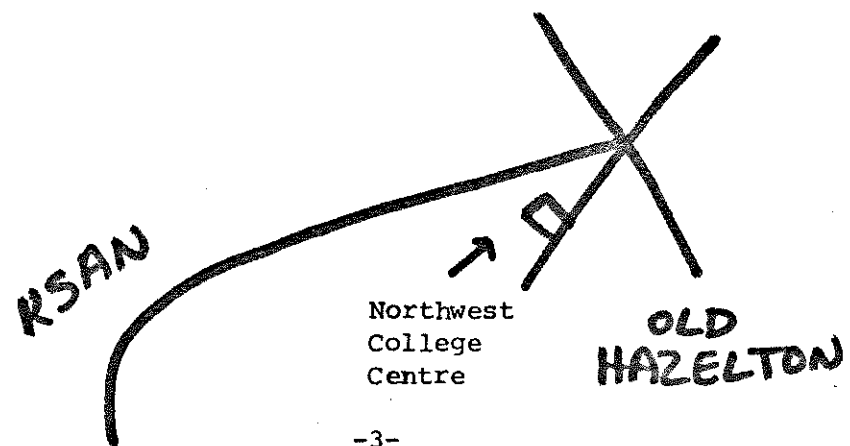

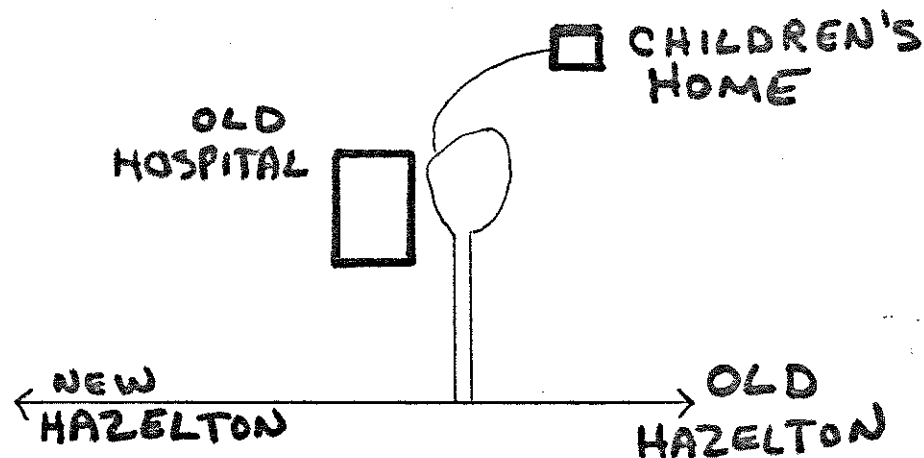

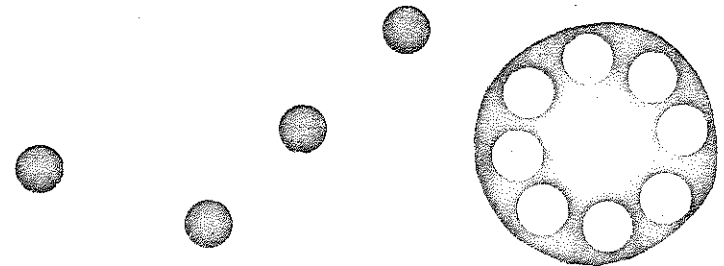

MOBILE UNITS

Northwest College is in the final stages of developing a series of three mobile units. Commencement of the courses in this area will depend upon the level of interest. These courses can be transported to any community if there is sufficient demand. Register your interest, whether you prefer to attend a day or evening class, the location which would be most convenient for you, and the number of hours per day you would be available by placing your name on our wait-list. The college will try to accommodate any reasonable need. Applicants will be informed of dates and details by mail or phone. The courses are listed below.

AIRBRAKES

This course prepares drivers for a written and practical test on the operation and maintenance of air brakes systems for either on-highway or off-highway vehicles. Those taking off-highway exams will be required to pay to the Department of Transport a \$5.00 examination fee. This course can also include young persons who wish to drive air-equipped vehicles. Successful completion will give an air endorsement on the person's license.

Fee is \$32

HYDRAULICS

The course includes the fundamentals of hydraulics, trouble shooting and repairing. It is 30 hours long.
Fee is \$30, plus textbooks.

BASIC WELDING

This unit is used to assist people who are working in occupations which require some welding, e.g. millwrights, mechanics, farmers or equipment operators. The course is basic in nature and gives people a good working knowledge of oxy-acetylene and arc welding equipment.
Fee to be determined.

INDUSTRIAL FIRST AID

This course leads to Workers' Compensation Board certification. Combining theory and practice, it requires extensive out-of-class preparation.
Fee is \$100 and includes text books and examination.

ADULT BASIC EDUCATION

BASIC LITERACY PROGRAM

Individual tutoring in the student's home or tutor's home will be available for adults who have minimal or no skills in reading, writing and arithmetic but who do speak English.

Students can study independently through the use of audio cassette tapes. People who wish to take part in this program may not be able to read this ad. Please direct them to the Northwest College Centre in Hazelton (842-5787).

GENERAL EDUCATION DEVELOPMENT TESTS (Grade 12 Equivalency)

The General Educational Development Tests provide an opportunity for many adults who did not graduate from secondary school to acquire an official document stating that they have a Grade 12 secondary school equivalency standing. This may assist you in qualifying for better jobs, for promotions within your own organization, and

in applying for admission to post-secondary educational institutions.

Candidates must meet the following requirements: be nineteen years of age or older, have been out of school for at least one full academic year and have lived in British Columbia for at least six months.

Testing sessions in Hazelton and Kitwanga will be held sometime this year, if there is sufficient demand. Sign up at the Hazelton Centre (842-5787) if you are interested.

BTSD AND BJRT

Northwest College offers two full-time courses in which students may obtain Manpower sponsorship of fees and training allowances. BJRT (Basic Job Readiness Training) is oriented toward counselling as well as the evaluation of job availability and suitability. It prepares students for BTSD (Basic Training for Skill Development) which is concerned with mathematics and English upgrading to Grade Level 10.

FUTURE PROGRAMS

The College is evaluating the need for evening courses and/or an on-going full time day program for adults who wish to engage in general

academic upgrading. These courses would also be available to BTSD students who wish to attain a Grade 12 equivalency or to attend school when BTSD is not in session. Upgrading would be offered in English, mathematics, and reading skills. If you are interested, please contact the Northwest College Centre (842-5787).

LIFE SKILLS

Life skills training is concerned with problem solving and the attainment of basic everyday skills that relate to the self, family, community, job and leisure. It is a very special and effective kind of counselling which is particularly useful to adults who are interested in further formal education. 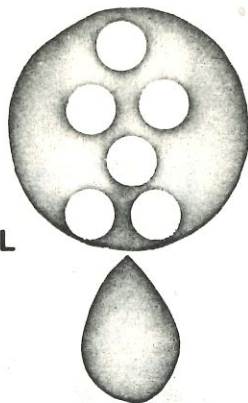
