ACADEMIC STUDIES

Head: Mr. Stan Persky. Ph. 635-6511.

Admission: The College has an "open door" admissions policy - students do not have to be high school graduates to enter college academic courses. The courses are designed for adults who wish to further their intellectual interests and who may have left the formal schooling system some time ago as well as for recent high school graduates. The college promotes the concept of "lifelong learning".

Registration: Registration will be held in the Amante Building (Upstairs), 820 - 3rd Avenue West, Prince Rupert, on Tuesday, September 7, 1976, 1 - 4 p.m. and 6:30 - 9:30 p.m. College personnel will be present to assist students. Persons wishing to complete the application for admission forms before September 7 may arrange to pick up the forms by phoning the Coordinator of Community Education Services (George Newell), at 624-6054.

Tuition Fees: \$25.50 per course per semester. Courses normally require two (2) semesters: Sept. - Jan. and Jan. - April. Senior Citizens 60 years of age and over are not charged tuition fees.

General: Classes for the Fall semester commence the week of September 13. All academic classes in Prince Rupert meet in the evenings from 7 till 10. Please refer to the College's calendar for more details of the College's programs and regulations.

Course Descriptions:

Anthropology 101/102: Instructor: Stan Persky
An introduction to physical and cultural anthropology.
This course will focus on three major themes: the origins of human beings and society, the history of North American native peoples, and an examination of present-day developments in countries of the Third World (China, Africa, and the Arab countries).

Economics 101/102: Instructor: Mark Loken
An introduction to economic thought and history. The first semester of this course will focus on the development of the economic aspects of society, with attention to the theories of major philosophers and current economic issues. The second semester is devoted to study and analysis of economic problems in Canada; wage and price controls, inflation, and resource development are among the issues that will be examined. The course is designed for the lay person who wants to acquire a better understanding of economic matters.

English 101/102: Instructor: George Stanley
A study of twentieth-century writing: novels, short stories, drama, and poetry, and a program of student writing. A reading list will be available at registration.

English 201/202: Instructor: To be announced English literature 1350 - 1900: a survey of English literature from Chaucer to Hopkins, based on a selection of works from major authors. A reading list will be available at registration.

History 101/102: Instructor: Peter Weber Selected topics in economic development, social change, and political power, 1840's to present.

This course is designed to give the student an understanding of the nature of historical studies, of basic concepts and terminologies, and of fundamental issues and developments in modern history. Emphasis will be laid on the interrelation of political-intellectual with social and economic history. The course will be organized on a seminar basis to allow a maximum of individual participation and discussion in class.

Psychology 101/102: Instructor: Jeff Marvin
An introduction to psychology. Topics include: a brief history of psychology,
elementary experimental design, the nervous system, thinking, language, intelligence and testing, personality theories, mental health, and a brief introduction to social psychology.

Sociology of Education 203/204: Instructor: Stan Persky
A seminar for teachers, educational administrators and anyone else who cares
about the direction of education in Canada today. This course will be
structured around the reading and discussion of a series of books embracing a
broad spectrum of opinion in the field. Works by Holt, Kozol, Herndon, Kohl,
Martell, Tussman, and Bowles and Gintis will be among the readings. The course
will deal with both practical questions and current theoretical issues.

Women's Studies 101/102: Instructor: Joanne Nakonechny This course will examine the status and role of women in Canadian society. It will trace the development of sex role divisions in the family and other institutions, and examine the influence of education, the media, etc., on the development and reinforcement of female role models. Particular attention will be paid to the role of women in the paid labour force. The status of women at all levels of society will be examined; in addition, North American conditions will be contrasted to those in other cultures, particularly in Europe and Asia.

Admission Requirements:

1. Completion of Grade 12 and evidence of good student potential.

2. Mature students may be admitted without Grade 12 if they show, through interview, the ability to achieve desired academic work.

- Applicants must have had some experience in the care of children under six years particularly with groups of children. References certifying that the experiences were successful are required at the time of interview.
- 4. Persons accepted for the course must have presented a medical report verifying that there are no indications that the applicant's future employment will be hindered by a present physical, mental or emotional problem. Current T.B. certificates must be presented before admission to the course.

On successful completion of the program, students will be licenced as pre-school supervisors by the Community Facilities Licencing Board (Government of British Columbia).

ADULT EDUCATION PROGRAM

(School District No. 52)

General: Most classes meet at the Prince Rupert Secondary School, 417 - 9th Avenue West, during Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday evenings. Those courses which meet in other places are so identified in this booklet.

More complete information about the courses can be obtained from the instructors during registration.

Courses may be cancelled if there is not sufficient enrolment to warrant their operation. In some instances, only a limited number of persons can be accompdated in a class.

Holidays: Adult Education classes, except where special arrangements are made, will not meet Thanksgiving Day (October 11), and Remembrance Day (November 11).

Course Fees: Fees are payable at the time of registration.

Cheques and money orders should be made payable to: School District No. 52.

Refunds will be granted only when courses are cancelled.

A husband and wife may register in a course for one and one-half times the regular fee.

Usually, old age pensioners will be required to pay a registration fee of only \$2.00 for each course. However, where the course fee includes the cost of books or materials, an additional charge may be necessary. Fees totalling over \$25.00 are income tax deductable. Please retain your receipts as duplicate receipts cannot be issued.

SPECIAL SERVICES

The Adult Education office maintains up-to-date information on most vocational, technical, correspondence, college, and university educational programs offered in British Columbia, and the Director of Adult Education will be pleased to assist persons who plan to attend post-secondary institutions or register for correspondence courses.

Please contact the Director at 624-6054 if you need our help.

Adult Secondary School Program
The British Columbia Adult Secondary School Program is designed to enable adults whose formal education has been interrupted to complete secondary school graduation. Special regulations permit adults to graduate on completion of English 12, Social Studies 11, and five other courses, three of which must be at the Grade 12 level. Only persons who are, at the time of application, nineteen years of age or older are eligible for admission; an eighteen year old person who has been out of school for at least one year may be admitted to the program with special permission.

Adults entering the program are able to take secondary school courses:

- (a) during the daytime at Prince Rupert Secondary School,
- (b) in the evenings, when courses are offered through Adult Education, and
- (c) by correspondence from the British Columbia Department of Education.

Adult Education

General Educational Development Tests (B.C. Grade 12 equivalency)
The General Educational Development Tests (GED), are a series of five comprehensive examinations in the areas of English Expression, Social Studies Natural Sciences, Literature and Mathematics. They are designed to measure as directly as possible the major generalizations, ideas and intellectual skills that are normally gained through twelve years of schooling.

Many adults who did not graduate from secondary school have acquired skills, through work and study experiences, at or above secondary school level. The GED tests provide an opportunity for these people to earn an official document stating that they have a Grade XII Secondary School equivalency standing, which may assist them in qualifying them for better jobs, for promotions within their own organizations and in applying for admission to post-secondary educational institutions. Some people may wish to take the tests for personal satisfaction.

Persons applying to write the examinations must meet the following three requirements at the time of application:

- 1. minimum age of nineteen
- British Columbia residency of at least six months immediately preceding the date of application to write
- 3. Out of school for at least one full academic year.

Application forms are available from the office of the Director of Adult Education.


