IMPORTANT INFORMATION

ADMISSIONS & REGISTRATION

Full-time - Students must apply at the College office. In continuous intake programs, waiting lists will be used. Students are encouraged to apply several months in advance of their desired starting time to avoid disappointment.

Part-time - Registrations on Sept. 12th and continue until the course start date. However, if a minimum number of pre-paid registrations is not reached by the pre-registration date, the course will be cancelled. You are encouraged to pre-register and pay the fee by the pre-registration date.

University Transfer - Registrations begin August 17th.

CLASS LIMITS

Most designated courses can only take a limited number of people. Your place in these courses will only be held if you pay the tuition by the pre-registration date.

Tuition varies and must be paid in full at the time of registration. Payment may be made by cash or cheque.

FEES FOR SENIOR CITIZENS

Senior citizens (aged 65 and over) and registered disabled persons are eligible for tuition-free enrolment in most Northwest College courses on a stand-by basis. provided that space is still available within 24 hours of the commencement of the course. This exemption will not apply to Security or Tool Deposits or to any charges for materials, books and supplies that are levied against other students in the course.

SPONSORED STUDENTS

Students whose fees will be paid by sponsoring agencies are required to present a letter to this effect from the agency concerned when registering.

FINANCIAL AID

Financial aid for education takes many forms. There are loans, scholarships and bursaries. You may borrow money, interest free, through the Canada Student Loan or B.C. Loan programs. The College provides over \$16,000 each year in non-repayable bursaries. The College also has an Entrance Scholarship program which may pay your full tuition. For further information, contact the College

ENDOWMENT FUND

Corporations, businesses, service clubs, unions and individuals may contribute tax-deductible donations to the fund by contacting the College. Your contribution will remain in the fund permanently and continue to provide student aid money. For information, contact the College office.

Some tuitions are income tax deductible, so keep your receipts. Education Deduction Certificates for income tax claims will be issued ONLY upon presentation of your course receipts.

HOLIDAYS

Classes are not normally held on Statutory Holidays or when schools are closed.

REFUND & LATE REGISTRATION POLICY

A NO-REFUND POLICY AFTER THE PRE-REGISTRATION DATE IS IMPOSED ON CLASS-LIMIT COURSES. The College reserves the right to change fees without notice, to limit registrations in any program, or to cancel or revise any of the courses listed.

General Conditions

- 1. Full refunds will be made only if a course is cancelled by the College or if a student withdraws from a course for medical or bereavement reasons in writing prior to the course start date.
- 2. Refunds requested prior to the course start date will be assessed an administration charge of \$10.00.
- 3. There will be no refunds for courses with tuition fees of \$10.00 or less except for those conditions in General Statement #1.

Part-time Courses (Includes all General Interest and Part-Time Vocational courses)

- 1. Withdrawal before the second class of a course 100% of tuition fees less a \$10.00 administration charge.
- Withdrawal after the second class of course NO REFUND.
- 3. Special registration and refund policies apply to courses labelled as "Designated Courses". (These are all "CLASS LIMIT" courses.) NO REFUNDS will be made after the pre-registration date unless the space can be sold to another student, in which case the withdrawing student will be refunded 100% of the tuition fee less a \$10.00 administration charge.

- A \$10.00 "late registration" charge will be assessed to any student registering after the second class.
- 2. Withdrawal after second class 80% of tuition fee less a \$10.00 administration charge.
- 3. Withdrawal after third class or fourth class 50% of tuition fee less a \$10.00 administration charge.
- 4. Withdrawal after fifth class NO REFUND.

Vocational (Full-time)

- 1. A \$10.00 "late registration" charge will be assessed to any student registering after the first day of classes in a full-time vocational program.
- Vocational full-time fees are assessed on a calendar month basis, prorated as necessary in the first and last months:

Entry between:

1st to 15th - 100% of monthly fee 16th to 23rd - 50% of monthly fee

24th to 31st - 25% of monthly fee

Leaving before:

1st to 7th - 25% of monthly fee 8th to 15th - 50% of monthly fee

16th to 31st - 100% of monthly fee

3. Refunds on withdrawal before completion date will be
100% of unused tuition (part months prorated as above)
less a \$10.00 administration charge. (There will be no
administration charge on refunds for students who have
completed their program earlier than anticipated when
fee payment was made.)

TEXTBOOK SALES & REFUNDS

Textbooks will be available at Northwest Community College, 1070 Main Street, Smithers, 9:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. Monday to Friday; or evenings, Monday to Thursday, 7:00 to 9:00 p.m., beginning Sept. 8.

REFUNDS: Refunds on textbook purchases will be made:

- (a) When a course has been cancelled by the College and a student returns the textbook purchased for a course to the College in "like new" and resalable condition within two weeks of the course cancellation, a refund of 100% of the purchase price will be made by the College.
- (b) When a student withdraws from a full time course during the first two weeks of classes; or from part time courses on or before the second class; and returns the

textbook purchased for the course in "like-new" and resalable condition within one week following withdrawal, the College will refund 75% of the purchase price of the textbook.

- (c) No refunds will be made in any case without original receipt.
- (d) The determination of "like-new and resalable condition" shall be at the discretion of the College.
- (e) No refunds will be made other than those contemplated in (a) and (b) above.

TELECONFERENCE COURSES ACADEMIC COURSES IN YOUR COMMUNITY

Teleconferencing makes it possible for students in the Northwest to "get together" with each other and their instructor without leaving their communities.

Sophisticated "bridging" equipment in Terrace is linked to teleconference convenors (loudspeaker units and microphones) at regional College centres. This bridging of a series of telephone lines allows everyone to communicate with each other.

Classes include lectures, audio visual presentations and interactive seminars. Problems or questions which arise will be discussed and dealt with immediately by the instructor and other students in several locations.

All courses run for 15 weeks. Continuing courses will be offered beginning in January.

ANTHROPOLOGY 101
(Introduction to Physical Anthropology and Archaeology)

DATE: Mon., Sept. 14 TIME: 7:00 - 10:00 p.m.

A general introduction to human biological and cultural history. Students will examine the concepts of evolution, genetics, animal behaviour and race in an attempt to understand what makes us human.

BIOLOGY 101 EVEN/DAY (Introduction Biology I)

DATE: Tues & Wed., Sept. 8
TIME: 5:30 - 7:00 p.m.

The course covers introductory biochemistry, the origin of life, cell biology, plant and animal structure and function, genetics, reproduction and AIDS. Laboratories will include microscopy and animal and plant anatomy and physiology. Experimental techniques, observation skills and genetic experiments will be emphasized.

ADULT BASIC EDUCATION

GENERAL INFORMATION

The Adult Basic Education program gives all adults in the college region a chance to upgrade their skills and knowledge of English. Mathematics and the Sciences. Courses are offered to teach basic Reading and Mathematics through to the Grade 12 level. You may enter this program at any time during the year as space permits. A Math and English assessment is completed at the start to determine your initial placement. Instruction is individualized and self-paced. The time required to complete the course depends on your initial placement and your pace through the course material. You may attend on a full-time or part-time basis, taking as few or as many courses as practical for your needs. An evening program is provided for those unable to attend days. The program is designed to enhance employment opportunities and prepare you for further Vocational Career/Technical programs or University level

ADMISSION

Applicants must have been away from the public school system (high school) for a least one year. They must be capable of concentrated independent study. Admission to persons uner 18 years is subject to additional criteria. Details are available at the College Centre

SPONSORSHIP AND FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE Bursaries and grants (ABESAP) are also available. Ask for details at the College Centre.

SHIFT WORKERS

May alternate between day and evening upgrading classes to suit work schedules.

BASIC EDUCATION

Would you like to improve your Math, English or Science? Would you like a specialized course in reading, spelling or report writing? If you left school without the requirements for a trades, business or academic program, this course can prepare you for further study. Certificates are awarded for successful completion of the program.

COLLEGE PREPARATION

Selected college prep courses are available in Houston such as Physics 040, Chemistry 040, Math 050 and Biology 040.

6.E.D.

This is a course for adults who did not complete secondary school and wish to prepare to write a Ministry of Education Grade 12 Equivalency exam under the General Education Development Program. Adults will study for five tests: English Literature, English Grammar, Science, Social Studies and Mathematics. These classes will help you to prepare for the tests.

B.E.D. EXAMS

The examinations are administered by the College for the Ministry of Education. Application forms are available at the College Office. Basic requirements are that you must be at least 19 years of age, out of school (high school) for at least one full academic year, and satisfy residency standards. Testing will be held at the Houston College Centre, Dec. 11 & 12. Applications must be made by Nov. 12. Examination fee is \$10.50 payable to the Minister of Finance.

The Instructor's Diploma Program is co-sponsored by the Ministry of Advanced Education and Job Training and the Vancouver Community College/Vancouver Vocational Institute.

The Ministry supervises the program and issues the diploma. The VCC/Vancouver Vocational Institute supervises the admission of candidates and administers the program.

Courses can be offered locally on weekends with each course scheduled to run on two weekends over a three-week period. A minimum of 14 students is required.





General Conditions

1. Full refunds will be made only if a course is cancelled by the College or if a student withdraws from a course for medical or bereavement reasons in writing prior to the course start date.

2. Refunds requested prior to the course start date will be assessed an administration charge of \$10.00.

3. There will be no refunds for courses with tuition fees of \$10.00 or less except for those conditions in General Statement #1.

Part-time Courses (Includes all General Interest and Part-Time Vocational courses)

1. Withdrawal before the second class of a course -100% of tuition fees less a \$10.00 administration

2. Withdrawal after the second class of course - NO REFUND.

3. Special registration and refund policies apply to courses labelled as "Designated Courses". (These are all "CLASS LIMIT" courses.) NO REFUNDS will be made after the pre-registration date unless the space can be sold to another student, in which case the withdrawing student will be refunded 100% of the tuition fee less a \$10.00 administration charge.

- 1. A \$10.00 "late registration" charge will be assessed to any student registering after the second class.
- 2. Withdrawal after second class 80% of tuition fee less a \$10.00 administration charge.
- 3. Withdrawal after third class or fourth class - 50% of tuition fee less a \$10.00 administration charge.
- 4. Withdrawal after fifth class NO REFUND.

Vocational (Full-time)

1. A \$10.00 "late registration" charge will be assessed to any student registering after the first day of classes in a full-time vocational program.

2. Vocational full-time fees are assessed on a calendar month basis, prorated as necessary in the first and last

3. Refunds on withdrawal before completion date will be 100% of unused tuition (part months prorated as above) less a \$10.00 administration charge. (There will be no administration charge on refunds for students who have completed their program earlier than anticipated when fee payment was made.)

REFUNDS: Refunds on textbook purchases will be made:

(a) When a course has been cancelled by the College and a student returns the textbook purchased for a course to the College in "like new" and resalable condition within two weeks of the course cancellation, a refund of 100% of the purchase price will be made by the College.

(b) When a student withdraws from a full time course during the first two weeks of classes; or from part time courses on or before the second class; and returns the

textbook purchased for the course in "like-new" and resalable condition within one week following withdrawal, the College will refund 75% of the purchase price of the textbook.

- (c) No refunds will be made in any case without original receipt.
- (d) The determination of "like-new and resalable condition" shall be at the discretion of the College.
- (e) No refunds will be made other than those contemplated in (a) and (b) above.
