ACADEMIC/CAREER-TECHNICAL

LOCATION OF CLASSES AND SEMESTER START DATE

All academic/technical courses, i.e. university transfer and career/technical, will begin the week of September 15th, 1980, and will be held at the Prince Rupert campus of Northwest Community College, 820 3rd Avenue West, Prince Rupert.

COURSE FEES

All courses are \$26.50 per course plus text, unless otherwise noted. Full-time students taking a complete load of five courses pay \$130.00 per semester.

LATE REGISTRATIONS

Students may be admitted to University Transfer courses up to three weeks late. Registration after this time will only be permitted in exceptional circumstances.

ADMISSION REQUIREMENTS: The Academic Division has an "open door" admissions policy and the College will, in general, not require a specific educational background except for some science courses. Students coming from high school are normally expected to have completed grade twelve. Courses are designed for students who intend to proceed to a first degree at a university and for adults who wish to further their intellectual interests and who may have been out of formal schooling for some time. This latter group forms a large and successful portion of the student body.

AUDITORS: I don't want credit, I just want to sit in.

It is possible to sit in on courses offered at Northwest Community College as an auditor. Auditors must register for the course and pay fees, but are not required to write exams and hand in class assignments. Auditors, however, must attend class regularly and a record of courses audited is entered on the student's permanent record.

ACCREDITATION & TRANSFERABILITY OF COURSES: Courses taken at NWCC are recognized as either university transfer or college credit. Transferability to other post-secondary academic institutions (SFU, UBC, and UVic) is according to

specific entrance requirements. Students are advised to check with a counsellor or the university they plan to attend for details on the transferability of particular courses. Courses under "Career Technical" receive College credit.

A college transfer guide is available at the Prince Rupert campus. If in doubt,

please check with your instructor.

TIMETABLING: I hope math isn't the same time as biology.

Northwest Community College does its best to see that courses within the same program have no timetabling conflicts. This work is done over the summer once we know which class rooms and which instructors are available. Schedules and classroom locations will be available during registration week.

FINANCIAL AID: I want to go but I can't afford it.

There are two types of financial aid available to students at Northwest Community College. All college students are eligible for loan and grant money from the B.C. Student Assistance Plan, as are all other post-secondary students in B.C. To qualify, you must take at least three courses.

Northwest Community also offers more than \$5,000 worth of scholarships and bursaries. Scholarships are awarded on the basis of academic merit and bursaries are awarded on the basis of financial need. Bursaries for individual course fees are available from the faculty union. GRADES: How do they mark, and how do I get my marks?

UNIVERSITY TRANSFER COURSES

BIOLOGY 101

INSTRUCTOR: A. Gottesfeld, B.A.. M.A., PH.d. TIME: Thursday (class) 7 - 10 p.m., Tuesday (laboratory) 7 - 10 p.m.

FEE: \$26.50

A basic introductory course in Biology covering the origin of life, cell biology, a survey of the kinds of living things, including micro-organisms, plants, and animals, DNA, RNA, Mendelian genetics. There will be a field trip to the coast to study inter-tidal life. Lab: Classification of living things, use of the microscope, and a study of

micro-organisms, fungi, plants, and invertebrate animals based on microscopic and macroscopic studies. Techniques for identification will be included.

MATH 101 - CALCULUS 1

INSTRUCTOR: Mona Izumi, B.Sc.

TIME: Mon. & Wed., 7 - 8:30 p.m.

Fri. 4:30 - 6:00 p.m.

An introduction to the basic techniques of differential calculus designed to meetthe needs of science and engineering students. Prerequisite: Math 12.

ENGLISH 101 - LITERATURE AND COMPOSITION

INSTRUCTOR: Dawn Hassett, B.A.

TIME: Wed. 7 - 10 p.m.

Reading and discussion of modern autobiography, fiction, and poetry. Lectures on grammar and style, as well as the teaching of the basic techniques needed to write an essay. Literature studied in the course ranges from contemporary Canadian literature to 20th Century Classics, such as Conrad, Hemingway, and Fitzgerald. Written assignments will include two short essays on the literature covered in class.

ENGLISH 109 · CREATIVE WRITING

Reading and criticism of student writing. Lyric poetry, short fiction, myths, autobiography, journalism, and local history. A magazine booklet will be produced from the course.

HISTORY 131 - LOCAL HISTORY

The history of the Prince Rupert area will be examined in this course. This examination must be made in the context of both provincial and Canadian history as it has affected our area. This course will cover such matters as the fur trade, settler-native relations, labour relations, and famous Prince Rupert personalities, These topics will be discussed within their historical context with the intention of seeing both how they have shaped our world of today and how we might be shaping our area in the future. Extensive use will be made of original photographs. maps, and documents.

EARLY CHILDHOOD EDUCATION (ECE)

Learning in the child's formative years is increasingly seen as an area of vital signifigance. Throughout the Northwest Community College region there is a need for trained men and women to participate in this education process. The Early Childhood Education program is designed to prepare the student for employment in such areas as child care, day-care, nursery and pre-school supervision, early intervention and special education and family day care.

ECE 122 · CURRICULUM DEVELOPMENT

INSTRUCTOR: To be announced

An introduction to curriculum elements as related to child development: includes language, literature, music, science, and social studies. Emphasis in this course is on practical work.

HUMAN SERVICE WORKER (HSW)

Formerly called "Community Service Worker", this career program is directed at the people who wish to obtain training and practical skills in the social services field. Training is comprised of university transfer and special courses designed to prepare the student to work at a para-professional level in the "helping' professions. Usually, para-professionals are supervised by a professional person. In general, this program is of interest to people working, or intending to work, as home-school coordinators, child care workers, teacher-aides, youth workers, and

others interested in community work in the health, counselling, and legal areas. With credits from the university transfer program, students may wish to continue their education at a university degree level.

BASIC TRAINING FOR SKILLS DEVELOPMENT PROGRAM

This is a vocational program for adults who wish to upgrade basic academic skills equal to a Grade 10 level to qualify for employment, entry into a vocational training program, or to meet requirements for apprenticeship training. Subjects studied are communications, mathematics, and sciences.

Students can enroll at any time during the course period, and will work at their own speed. Canada Employment sponsorship is available to a limited number of eligible candidates by registering with the local Canada Employment Centre at the Pride of the North Mall. FISHERIES AND MARINE SKILLS PROGRAM

There is a saying that "A little knowledge can be a dangerous thing." In the Maritime Industry "No knowledge" can be far more dangerous.

This fact, coupled with the certainty that the Ministry of Transport (MoT) is intending to legislate the tonnage of fishing vessels requiring certificated personnel aboard, down to sixty tons, have prompted Northwest Community College to develop a comprehensive marine training program in the areas of certificate preparation. and safety education, as well as practical fishing skills.




