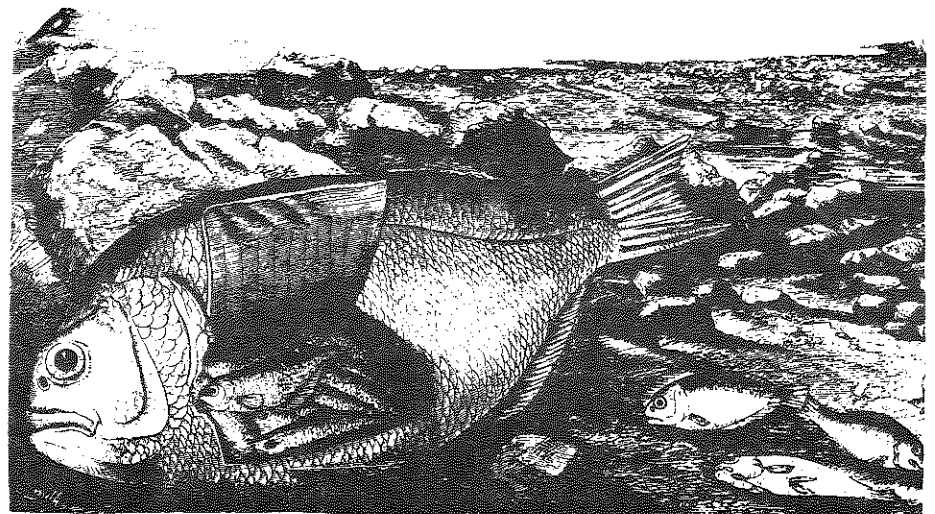

REGISTRATION

You are not formally registered for a course until the fee has been fully paid. If registration in a course is limited to a set number of people (e.g. ten, fifteen), you must pay your fee and not just sign up to guarantee that you have a place. The last opportunity to register and pay fees for a course will be before the second session. No one who has not registered and paid the course fee by this time will be allowed to continue in a course. Late entry into courses will be allowable upon the permission of the instructor, but the full fee must be paid at the first session the late entering student attends.

Retain your fee receipt for your Income Tax return. Receipts totaling over \$25.00 are deductible.

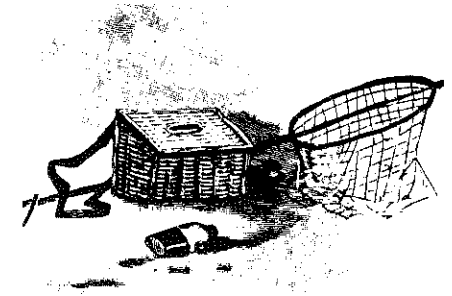
REFUNDS

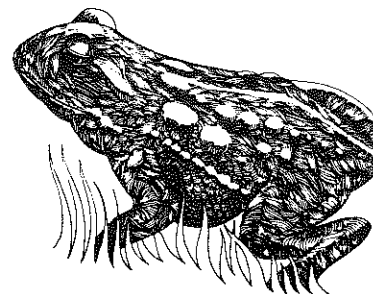

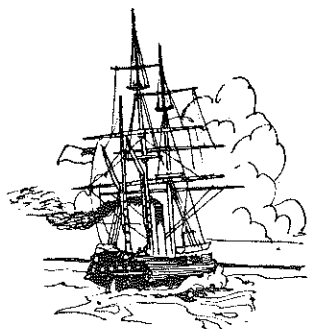

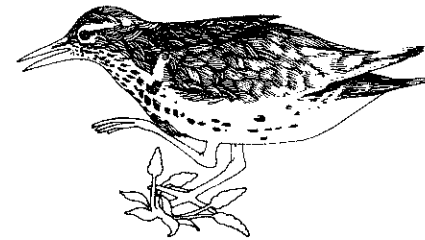

G.E.D. - GENERAL EDUCATION DEVELOPMENT TESTS (Grade 12 Equivalency)

The General Educational Development tests provide an opportunity for adults who did not graduate from secondary school to acquire an official document stating that they have a Grade 12 equivalency standing. This may assist you in qualifying for better jobs, for promotion, and in pursuing further training. Candidates must meet the following requirements: be nineteen years of age or older, have been out of school for at least one full year, and have lived in British Columbia for at least six months.

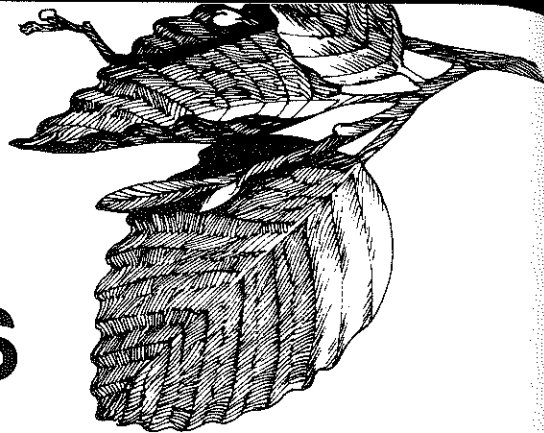

HUMAN SERVICE WORKER PROGRAM

The Human Service Worker (HSW) Program is directed to those people who want to obtain training and skills in the social service fields at the para-professional level.

The program is aimed at home-school co-ordinators, child care workers, teacher aides, etc. In short any interested person working or volunteering in community work (e.g. health, legal counselling, elderly) will benefit. Three one semester courses will be offered this year, one in the fall, two in the winter.

H.S.W. 153 - Human Growth and Development

An introduction to the study of human development, including normal development stages, both physical and emotional, from infancy to old age, including influences on development and problems with development.

EARLY CHILDHOOD EDUCATION

This program has two main thrusts. It is designed: 1) to prepare students for careers in areas such as childcare, day care, nursery and pre-school supervision, 2) to offer to the general public a series of workshops and short courses relating to family life as well as childcare and development. Both of these components -- the career training program and the community education program -- are available in this area. The career program will be fully available on a part-time basis over the next few years. 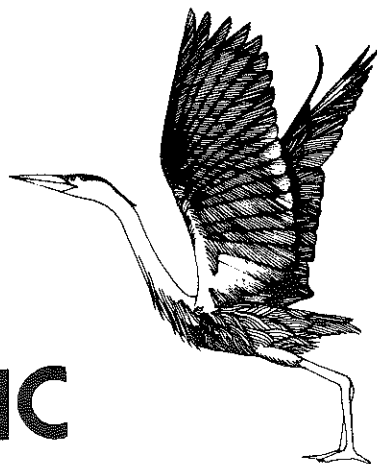
E.C.E. 134 - Introduction to Child Development
