#### EES

Fees vary according to the length and type of course. Generally, but not always, they are \$1/hr. for evening classes. Fees are payable at registration, preferably, or before the second class at the latest. They can also be paid at the Northwest College Centre in Hazelton.

All courses are free to senior citizens. Bands will pay the fees for many courses for status Indians who show need upon application.

Retain your fee receipt for your Income Tax return. Receipts totaling over \$25.00 are deductable. All fees include a \$1.00 student accident insurance charge.

#### REFUNDS

Refunds will not be given after the second class. Refunds will be given for all cancelled courses.

#### REGISTRATION

You are not formally registered for a course until the fee has been fully paid. If registration in a course is limited to a set number of people (e.g. ten, fifteen), you must pay your fee and not just sign up to guarantee that you have a place. The last opportunity to register and pay fees for a course will be before the second session. No one who has not registered and paid the course fee by this time will be allowed to continue in a course. Late entry into courses will be allowable upon the permission of the instructor, but fees must be paid at the first session the late entering student attends.

GIRLFRIEND - a surprise winner of the Cannes Film festival in 1978.


CHESSPLAYERS - directed by India's most famous movie-maker, Satyajit Ray.
