HOLIDAYS: Classes will not normally be held on Statutory holidays or when schools are closed.

TEXTBOOK SALES: Textbooks will be available at Northwest Community College, 820 3rd Avenue West, 9 a.m. to 5 p.m., Monday to Friday, or evenings, Monday to Thursday, 6:30 p.m. to 10:00 p.m. beginning January 2nd. 1981.

COUNSELLING SERVICES: The College Counsellor visits Prince Rupert twice a month. The counsellor is available day or evening to both secondary students and adults, to discuss any questions they may have regarding further education or career plans. LEARNING RESOURCE MATERIALS: Northwest Community College Library and resource materials are catalogued at the Prince Rupert Campus and may be ordered by students. Students registered in university transfer courses or career/technical program courses can arrange with their instructors to order books and periodicals from the learning resource centres of other B.C. post-secondary institutions, including S.F.U., U.Vic., and U.B.C.

ACADEMIC/ CAREER-TECHNICAL

LOCATION OF CLASSES AND SEMESTER START DATE

All academic/technical courses, i.e. university transfer and career/ technical, will begin the week of January 12th, 1981, and will be held at the Prince Rupert campus of Northwest Community College, 820 3rd Avenue West, Prince Rupert unless otherwise noted.

COURSE FEES

All courses are \$26.50 per course plus text, unless otherwise noted. Fulltime students taking a complete load of five courses pay \$130.00 per semester.

LATE REGISTRATIONS

Students may be admitted to University Transfer courses up to three weeks late. Registration after this time will only be permitted in exceptional circumstances.

ADMISSION REQUIREMENTS: The Academic Division has an "open door" admissions policy and the College will, in general, not require a specific educational background except for some science courses. Students coming from high school are normally expected to have completed grade twelve. Courses are designed for students who intend to proceed to a first degree at a university and for adults who wish to further their intellectual interests and who may have been out of formal schooling for some time.

AUDITORS: I don't want credit, I just want to sit in.

It is possible to sit in on courses offered at Northwest Community College as an auditor. Auditors must register for the course and pay fees, but are not required to write exams and hand in class assignments. Auditors, however, must attend class regularly and a record of courses audited is entered on the student's permanent record.

ACCREDITATION & TRANSFERABILITY OF COURSES: Courses taken at NWCC are recognized as either university transfer or college credit. Transferability to other post-secondary academic institutions (SFU, UBC and UVic) is according to specific entrance requirements. Students are advised to check with a counsellor or the university they plan to attend for details on the transferability of particular courses. Courses under "Career Technical" receive College credit.

A college transer guide is available at the Prince Rupert campus. If in doubt, please check with your instructor.

TIMETABLING: I hope math isn't the same time as biology.

Northwest Community College does its best to see that courses within the same program have no timetabling conflicts. Schedules and classroom locations will be available during registration week.

FINANCIAL AID: I want to go but I can't afford it.

All college students are eligible for loan and grant money from the B.C. Student Assistance Plan, as are all other post-secondary students in B.C. To qualify, you must take at least three courses.

Northwest Community College also offers more than \$5,000 worth of scholarships and bursaries. Scholarships are awarded on the basis of academic merit and bursaries are awarded on the basis of financial need. Bursaries for individual course fees are available from the faculty union. SELF STUDY CERTIFICATE PREPARATION

The Northwest Community College is currently producing a series of self-study kits which prepare the student for specific MoT examinations. Their examinations are held monthly in Prince Rupert. One module covers one MoT examination.

Each module consists of lecture notes, exercises, answers and assignments. These modules are designed specifically for the fisherman who can study on board ship, at home, or in the College.

Modules available for Winter 1981 are: 040 Chartwork and Pilotage; 020 Electronic Navigation Instruments; 060 Navigation Safety (Rules of the Road and Regulations). Note: Other modules up to Fishing Master II will be made available as they are developed. Pre-requisites - None.



FULL-TIME VOCATIONAL PROGRAMS IN TERRACE

Did you know that a number of full-time Vocational Programs begin in January and February? The following programs are offered in Terrace:

Industrial Records and First Aid

(5 months - Start date: February 2)

Students enrolled in this program will receive training in general clerical skills such as business machines, office procedures, typing, payroll and timekeeping, accounting and accident prevention. A large portion of the program is in preparing students to be examined for the Industrial "C" First Aid ticket. Graduates will find employment as camp clerks, payroll departments, industrial relations officers, safety officers in combination with first aid duties.

General Welding

(10 months - Start date: February 2)

This course covers areas such as safety trade theory and practices, oxyacetylene welding and cutting procedures and arc welding techniques with emphasis on metallurgy blue print reading, sketching and layout in plate and structional fabrication. Practical projects are designed and involve layout, assembly and welding to specific measurements and tolerances. The shop work is designed to simulate working conditions and training equipment is kept current to meet industrial standards. Upon successful completion of the 10 month General Welding program, the student will receive a diploma with eligibility to test to a D.P.W. #3 and D.P.W. #4. (For further information contact Mr. E. Marine Engine Repair

(10 months - Start date: February 2)

This program provides training on current equipment used in the marine engine mechanics field. It will include training in two and four stroke gasoline and diesel engines as well as in major propulsion systems. Upon completion of this course, the student will be able to diagnose and repair all major components of marine engine systems as well as other small engines such as snowmobiles, chain saws, lawnmowers, etc.

Cook Training Programs

Three Cook Training programs are offered for full-time students in the well-equipped College Cafeteria. The 12-month General Cooking program covers all phases of basic cooking including the preparation and serving of soups, salads, sandwiches, meat cooking and vegetable preparation. Kitchen management, cost and inventory control and menu planning form an integral part of the full program.

The 6-month Camp Cooking program uses components of the General Cooking program as they relate to quantity cooking and menu planning for those planning to seek employment as camp cooks. The 3-month Short Order Cooking program instructs students in the College's short order kitchen specifically for employment in fast food industry.

Electronics Technician

The student will be able to perform a wide range of duties at the technician level within the electronics industry. Emphasis on bench work and trouble shooting with hands on experience using up-to-date test equipment with practical applications.
