REGISTRATION

You are not formally registered for a course until the fee has been fully paid. If registration in a course is limited to a set number of people (e.g. ten, fifteen), you must pay your fee and not just sign up to guarantee that you have a place. The last opportunity to register and pay fees for a course will be before the second session. No one who has not registered and paid the course fee by this time will be allowed to continue in a course. Late entry into courses will be allowable upon the permission of the instructor, but the full fee must be paid at the first session the late entering student attends.

Retain your fee receipt for your Income Tax return. Receipts totaling over \$25.00 are deductible.

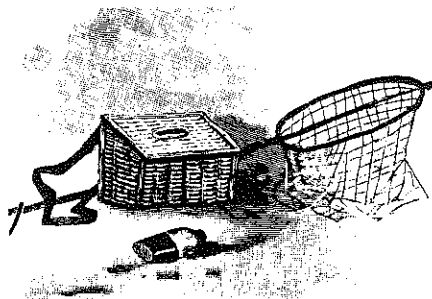
REFUNDS

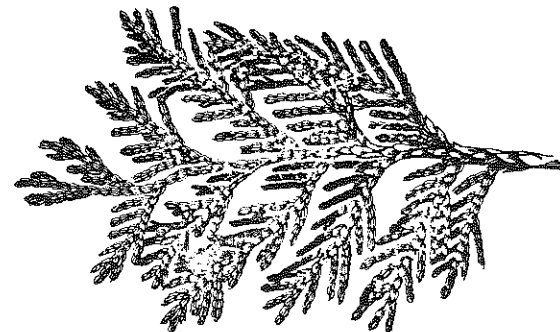
PRINTMOBILE

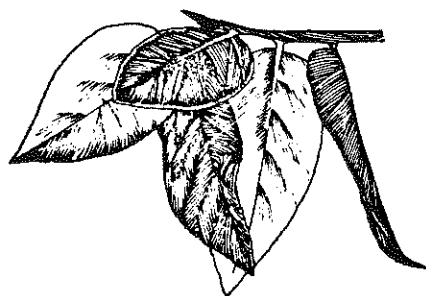



HUMAN SERVICE WORKER PROGRAM

The Human Service Worker (HSW) Program is directed to those people who want to obtain training and skills in the social service fields at the para-professional level.

The program is aimed at home-school co-ordinators, child care workers, teacher aides, etc. In short, any interested person working or volunteering in community work (e.g. health, legal counselling, elderly) will benefit.

H.S.W. 164: BEHAVIOUR MANAGEMENT

This course is an introductory study of the techniques used in managing behaviour. It will look at how behaviour is learned and therefore can be relearned for effective living.

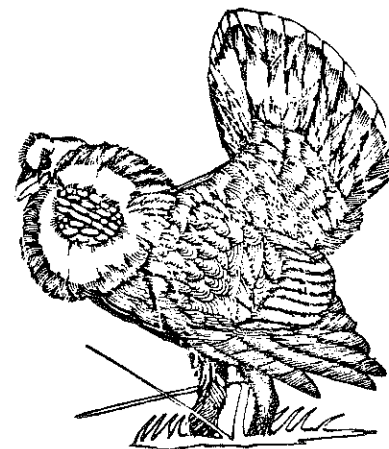

JOINT N.W.C.C./S.F.U. GENERAL CERTIFICATE IN CRIMINOLOGY

The Department of Criminology at Simon Fraser University will offer a sequential certificate-degree program through directed independent studies (DISC) after September 1980.

The program is designed to provide students with a general theoretical foundation in Criminology and consists of a combination of S.F.U. correspondence courses (DISC) and a variety of university transfer courses in Philosophy, Sociology and Psychology which can be taken from N.W.C.C. This program would be of importance to persons employed in the criminal justice system and of interest to members of the community who wish to have a basis for continuing development in a study area that is relevant to their life goals and interests.

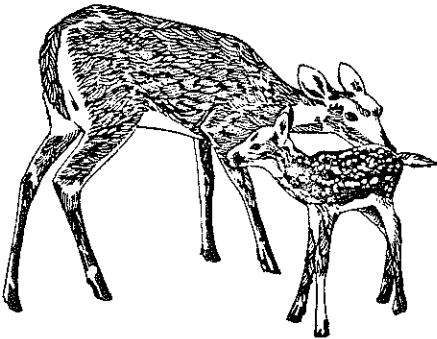
The Workers Education Program runs from September until May and is offered throughout the College region - no pre-requisites other than interest is needed for any W.E.P. course.

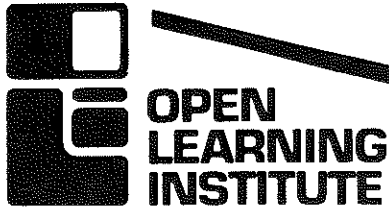

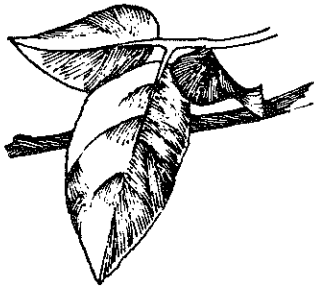
WHAT DOES IT COST?

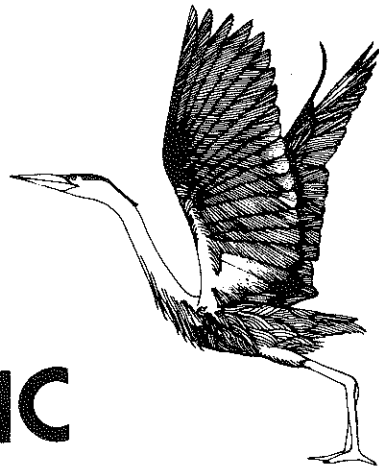
National Coaching Certification Program
