ADULT BASIC EDUCATION

GENERAL INFORMATION

The Adult Basic Education program gives all adults in the College region a chance to upgrade their skills and knowledge of English, Mathematics and the Sciences. Courses are offered to teach basic Reading and Mathematics through to the Grade 12 level. You may enter this program at any time during the year as space permits. A Math and English assessment is completed at the start to determine your initial placement. Instruction is individualized and self-paced. The time required to complete the course depends on your initial placement and your pace through the course material. You may attend on a full-time or part-time basis, taking as few or as many courses as is practical for your needs. The program is designed to enhance employment opportunities and to prepare you for further Vocational/Career/Technical programs or University level programs.

ADMISSION

Applicants must have been away from the public school system (high school) for at least one year. They must be capable of concentrated independent study. Admission to persons under 18 years is subject to additional criteria. Details are available at the College Centre.

G.E.D.

This is a course for adults who did not complete secondary school and wish to prepare to write a Ministry of Education Grade 12 Equivalency exam under the General Education Development Program. Adults will study for five tests: English Literature, English Grammar, Science, Social Studies, and Mathematics. These classes will help you to prepare for the tests.

G.E.D. EXAMS

The examinations are administered by the College for the Ministry of Education. Application forms are available at the College office. Basic requirements are that you must be at least 19 years of age, out of school (high school) for at least one full academic year, and satisfy residency standards. Testing will be held at the Houston College Centre on Jan. 18th & 19th, March 15th & 16th, May 3rd & 4th, and June 7th & 8th, 1991. Applications must be made one full month prior to exam date. Examination fee is \$25.00 payable to the Minister of Finance and must accompany your application.

ADULT BASIC LITERACY

"360,000 British Columbians are functionally illiterate." A survey commissioned by Southam News indicates that at least this many adults in British Columbia cannot handle the basic reading, writing, and computation tasks which would enable them to function in our modern print-based society. They cannot, for example:

- read the correct dosage from a medicine bottle
- calculate change in a restaurant
- fill in a job application form
- understand the charges on their telephone bill
- read bus schedules
- read bedtime stories to their children
- read printed information in a political flyer

FIRE MANAGEMENT TRAINING APPROVED BY THE MINISTRY OF FORESTS

In co-operation with Northwest Community College, B.C. Forest Service is planning to offer the following Fire Management courses. These courses are part of the prerequisites to obtain Forest Service Certification in the various areas of Fire Management.

These courses will be scheduled for late March and April if there is sufficient demand. To register your interest in any of these courses please call and register at your local College Centre as soon as possible. There is no registration fee for any of the courses.

CERTIFIED FIRE FIGHTER TRAINING

A two day course to learn tasks normally done by a Fire Fighter, such as, line building, burning off, pump and chainsaw operation, and mop-up.

Prerequisites to course:

1) A favorable written Doctor's Certificate.

Prerequisites for Certification

- 1) Successful completion of Certified Fire Fighter Training Course.
- 2) Emergency (Survival) First Aid.
- 3) Fifteen (15) certifiable days of actual Fire Suppression duties within the previous two years.

CERTIFIED CREW BOSS

A two day course to learn tasks normally done by a Crew Boss. They would be expected to supervise up to 10 Certified or Emergency Fire Fighters. Persons performing in an under-implemented role would be paid as a Certified Fire Fighter, if qualified, or at the Crew Boss rate, until they have acquired the necessary experience.

Prerequisite to Course:

1) A favorable, written, Doctors' report.

Prerequisites to Certification:

- 1) Successful completion of Certified Crew Boss Training.
- 2) Emergency (Survival) First Aid.
- Fifteen (15) certifiable days of actual Crew Boss Fire Suppression duties within the previous five years.

CERTIFIED FIRE WARDEN

A two day course to learn tasks normally undertaken by a Sector Boss, Class C Fire Boss, or Fire Warden as authorized in Sec. 124 of the Forest Act. Certification allows Fire Wardens who are willing and able to meet the qualification, to better their involvement in Fire Suppression.

Prerequisite to Course:

1) A favorable, written, Doctors' report.

Prerequisites to Certification:

- Successful completion of Certified Fire Warden Training.
- 2) Emergency (Survival) First Aid.
- 3) Fifteen (15) certifiable days of actual Certified Crew Boss Fire Suppression duties within the previous five years.

CERTIFIED TIME KEEPER

A two day course to learn duties normally undertaken by a Timekeeper on a fire that employes 20 or more persons.

Prerequisites to Course:

None.

Prerequisites to Certification:

- Successful completion of Certified Time Keeper Training.
- 2) Fifteen (15) certifiable days of actual Fire Suppression Duties within the previous two years.

LOOKOUT PERSON TRAINING

The lookout person is responsible for the early detection and accurate reporting of all forest fire outbreaks. The work includes maintaining a strict watch over the area and communicating by radio or other means to the District Fire Control Officer. The nature of the work involves living alone for extended periods of time at isolated locations.

NOTE: The Lookout Person's lot is often a lonely one. The place of work is often inaccessible by conventional means of travel. Most of the time the F.M. Radio is the only link to the outside world. It is entirely up to the individual to make the stay at the Lookout a safe success. The person who can appreciate the advantages of Lookout life will find this work a rewarding experience.
