G.E.D. TEST PREPARATION

This course is for persons wanting assessment and instruction in preparation for writing General Education Development Tests. The GED tests offer an opportunity to gain secondary school equivalency standing which may assist in qualifying for employment, for advancement, or for admission to post-secondary educational institutions. Often, the tests are written for personal satisfaction. Instruction is provided for the five test areas: writing skills, social studies, science, mathematics and interpretation of literature. The tests are designed to measure the major generalizations, ideas and intellectual skills that are normally gained through 12 years of schooling. Special arrangements can be made for persons with a visual, hearing or other physical impediment.

G.E.D. TEST SCHEDULE

The tests are administered by the college for the Ministry of Education. Application forms are available at the college office. Applicants must be Canadian citizens or landed immigrants, be at least 19 years old, be British Columbia residents, have been out of school for at least one full academic year and not have received a Grade 12 certificate from any institution. Testing will be held at the Smithers Centre on May 2 & 3. A completed application form must be received by the Ministry of Education at least 21 days before the testing date. The test fee of \$25.00 may be paid by certified cheque or money order payable to the Minister of Finance.

The forest resources of the Upper Skeena River system, including the Bulkley, Babine, and Kispiox drainages, are of major importance to the economic and general well being of the people of this region. As use of these resources has intensified, conflicting demands upon them have increased and serious concerns are being expressed about the appropriateness of past and current management and use policies.

The aim of these seminars is to help those particularly interested in the management of crown forestlands to become better informed about the issues. With this objective in mind, at least one speaker will make the major presentation on a given topic and one or more panel members, each of whom brings a different perspective to the issue will comment. Speakers and panel members will represent various BC ministries, industries and associations.
