

ECE 134: Observing and Recording

This course is an introduction to observing and recording the behaviour of young children. It is intended to support students' understanding of general sequences of growth and development as well as the unique development of individual children. Students will observe children's behaviour as well as classroom practices, and will use observation information as a basis for curriculum and guidance planning.

Occupational First Aid Level 1 is a one day program designed to provide life saving first aid skills to workers in industry. The level 1 course covers the following topics:

A Level 2 certificate is valid for two years from the date of the examination. Applicants wishing the WCB Level 2 certification must, before writing the WCB examinations:

- a) be at least 16 years (with restriction) or 19 years of age (no restriction)
- b) undergo a medical examination and complete a WCB medical form
- c) successfully complete 36 hrs. of the WCB Level 2.

Note: Level 3 is required where job site is more than 20 minutes from the hospital

Occupational First Aid Certificate Level 3

Occupational First Aid Level 3 is a 70 hour program designed to cover all medical techniques considered to be within the responsibility of the Occupational First Aid Attendant providing emergency care in industry. This course prepares learners for the Industrial First Aid Examination, conducted by the Workers' Compensation Board. A level 3 certificate is valid for two years from the date of the examination.

Applicants wishing the WCB Level 3 certification must, <u>before</u> writing the WCB examinations:

- a) be at least 16 years (with restriction) or 19 years of age (no restriction)
-) undergo a medical examination and complete a WCB medical form
- c) successfully complete 70 hrs. of the WCB Level 3.

RED CROSS FIRST AID COURSES

These courses are excellent for the general public, outdoor programs and recreational activities, daycare centre workers, teachers and anyone with a family.

Vital Link

The Canadian Red Cross Society's New Vital Link Program upgrades the former Red Cross Standard First Aid course. This is a 16 hour course designed to teach the fundamentals of emergency care and first aid. Cardiopulmonary Resuscitation (CPR) is included.

Childsafe

This is an 8 hour course designed to do more than teach emergency first aid for infants and children. Its main premise is that accidents can be prevented by educating the adult, changing the environment, and educating the child. WCB Falling/Bucking Training Standard
