





(General Educational Development Tests)

G.E.D. Tests are administered by the College for the Ministry of Education. The five tests are designed to measure levels of achievement in Writing Skills, Social Studies, Science, Mathematics and Literature and the Arts. A grade 12 secondary school equivalency certificate is awarded by the Ministry to candidates who pass all five tests.

To write the tests, you must be:

- at least 19 years of age
- · out of high school for at least one year
- a B.C. resident





Occupational First Aid Level 3 is a 70 hour program designed to cover all medical techniques considered to be within the responsibility of the Occupational First Aid Attendant providing emergency care in industry. This course prepares learners for the Industrial First Aid Examination, conducted by the Workers Compensation Board. A Level 3 certificate is valid for two years from the date of the examination.



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


