
APPLIED COMPUTERS TECHNOLOGY

This Certificate Program is designed to provide the student with **computer skills** and **computer knowledge** relating to the fields of Business, Technical Trades and University Studies. 
The rationale for undertaking the project is to integrate courses common to the programs and to offer them in a flexible manner that will enable the student to have multiple entry and exit points.
