It's none other than the Pink Panther making a delivery of balloons & roses to Thorine Steinkampf, from her Valentine! Thorine works in Accounting.



### Remembering Linda Buchfink & her Family

Be strong, yet gentle Humble, yet bold Swayed always by beauty and truth.

On January 29th, Linda
Buchfink, a NWCC employee in
Smithers, was killed in a helicopter accident along with her husband Gary and her two children,
Molly and Broddy. The family
was well known in the Bulkley
Valley for their involvement and
contributions in many aspects of
the communities of Smithers,
Houston and Telkwa. This included a sincere interest in and
support for the college.

Linda was employed by the college between 1977 and 1981 in a number of positions as a clerk and as a part-time instructor in Smithers and Houston. Gary was employed during the same period to teach several part-time courses. More recently, and at the time of her death, Linda was working in Smithers in the Career Development Program as the Career Advisor/Work Experience Officer. Gary was working as a Counsellor at Northwood House

in Houston and participated in the Student Success Program as a guest speaker on a variety of topics aimed at removing personal barriers to success.

The helicopter trip that ended in tragedy was meant to take the Buchfinks to a cabin on Morice Mountain for a skiing adventure. Such a trip would have been typical of the family. The Buchfinks were a tightly knit family, known for their love of each other and their passion for life. Their lives were filled with adventures which included settling along the Bulkley River far from their original homes in U.S.A., living and working in Africa, cycling holidays, crosscountry ski racing, career changes, and much more.

The Buchfinks knew what it was to live. They will be remembered by those they touched.
