#### NORTHWEST COMMUNITY COLLEGE HOST AGENCY - STUDENT SUMMER WORKS '96!

This year this program was given \$200,000 to allocate over the North Coast region. Of the \$200,000 that we were given \$181,512 has been allotted and we have disbursed \$2,858.54 to date. The amounts that we have allocated in each area are as follows:

Terrace	\$ 65,912.50	Hazelton	\$ 5,436.00
Kitimat	\$ 18,437.50	Prince Rupert	\$ 50,528.00
Queen Charlottes	\$ 7,900.00	Stewart	\$ 2,156.00
Smithers/Telkwa	\$ 22,534.00	Houston	\$ 4,928.00
Atlin	\$ 3,680.00		

The area that we are covering this year are from Houston to the Queen Charlottes and Kitimat to the Yukon. So far we have received applications from Atlin, Stewart, Houston, Telkwa, Smithers, Hazelton, Terrace, New Aiyansh, Gitwinksihlkw, Prince Rupert and Queen Charlotte City. We have approved 96 applications to date and still have another 321 applications to assess for approval. Of the 96 applications approved, 2 have been in Atlin, 1 in Stewart, 10 in both Smithers and Telkwa, 2 in Houston, 5 in the Queen Charlottes, 25 in Prince Rupert, 18 in Kitimat, 4 in Hazelton and 29 in Terrace and the surrounding area for a total of 96 students being hired.

We have approved a wide variety of positions. Some of these positions have included Student Veterinarian, Forestry Technicians, Accounting Assistants, Reporter and Lab Technician Assistant.

This past month has been very interesting and hectic. We still have another 3 months to go.

## "ALLS WELL THAT ENDS WELL"

On May 25th all eight students (seven men, one woman) graduated from a Professional Driver Training program. This six week, full time upgrading course was aimed at unemployed truck drivers. The training was financed by **Human Resources** Development Canada and sponsored by A.E. Bradford Trucking Ltd., Smithers. Bradford provided the shop facilities and three training trucks; a logging, low bed and dump truck.

This being a pilot project some "teething" problems occurred. However, the students and instructors worked out the rough edges, and at the end everyone felt good about what they had learned.

The course provided the students with real everyday driving experience on mountainous logging roads as well as loading and unloading heavy equipment. The students also appreciated the relaxed and supportive learning environment. In addition, the College is presently offering guidance in resume writing and job search. So far, a few of the students have found employment.

## CULTURE SESSIONS PROVING TO BE WORTHWHILE

An exciting educational initiative that has been taking place in the Eastern Region has been a series of "Between Cultures Dialogue Sessions". With the support of the Federal, Provincial and Wet'suwet'en Treaty offices the College has hosted three dialogue sessions between Wet'suwet'en and non-Wet'suwet'en members from the various communities that make up our region. The first session took place in Smithers in November/95, a second session was held in Houston in March/96 and the third session was held June 8th in Smithers.

The model we are using is an adaptation of the work that has been done by the "Public Conversations Project", a group of family therapists who have had a great deal of success working with groups of people who are divided on controversial issues affecting their community. The third session brought together previous participants for a deeper discussion as well as individuals who are new to the process.

## "IN-HOUSE" BUSINESS CARD SERVICE



Just a reminder....the College now does all personnel business cards "In-House".

THE PROCESS.... Ordering is very simple:

Forward your card information (print or type information... less chance for errors), add account code to charge and have the order signed off by authorized personnel for your department, then send directly to Carol Reynolds, College Services, Terrace. Cards are laser printed on card stock, cost is very reasonable - \$12 PER 50 CARDS (double-sided \$24) and you should have your order within a few days. We suggest keeping orders to 50 as this can be a very cost saving operation for all budgets i.e. Staff information changes frequently so this way there is less to throw away and you will always be up-to-date with your information.

The Canadian Labour Congress chose April 28 as a day of mourning for the thousands of people who are injured, permanently disabled or killed as a result of their work. Every year more than 1200 Canadian Workers are killed on the job. Hundreds of thousands are injured.

Safer Campuses wants to acknowledge all these workers.

As a way of trying to make our campuses safer for workers, our committee has made arrangements for the Workers Compensation Board to provide training to our staff on Violence in the Workplace. # Keep Your Eyes Open For...

No Excuse For Abuse a publication from the YWCA. This kit is designed for individuals who may have an opportunity to assist a woman in an abusive relationship. It has a rural focus and easy to copy information. One kit was sent to each campus -- please be sure to have a look.

The Clothesline Project. This project is scheduled to coincide with Take Back the Night demonstrations across the region. This project involves individuals creating t-shirts to recognize violence against females. Shirts are colour coded to represent various types of abuse - child abuse, sexual assault, wife assault, murder, etc. Shirts are created by women who have experienced the abuse or by friends, family or others who wish to do one to represent someone they know with this experience. We hope to have a regional focus for this project.

Northwest Community College Personal Safety Guide. This guide is going to be available to staff and students by September. It has information on car and bicycle safety, tips for safety in residence, harassment information, information on AIDS/HIV, on Sexual Assault and on learning environments and more. All staff will receive a copy via internal mail.
