**Co-operative Education at NWCC!** 

I've just done a statistical report on Co-op at NWCC for the calendar year 1996 and thought I'd pass some information on to everyone.

Co-op volumes are usually counted in placement weeks rather than numbers of students placed in employment because some students may do more than one work term in a year so could be counted twice. Placement weeks are the full weeks that all Co-op students worked in paid employment for Co-op employers over the past year. In 1996, Northwest Community College students worked a total of 1,531 placement weeks up from 806 in 1995, an increase of 90%.


Wages ranged from \$7.50 to over \$16.00 per hour with the average being approximately \$12.00 per hour. That translates into almost \$700,000 going into the northwest economy from Co-op wages alone.

The male/female mix is 57% male, 43% female.

Students worked throughout the northwest in Prince Rupert, Terrace, Kitimat, Stewart, Hazelton, Smithers, Houston and Burns Lake.

In a six week period, their \$100,000 portfolio grew almost \$14,000, an approximate annualized return of 112%.

The contest was patterned on similar competitions run at other colleges and universities. It was administered by Larry Jones, a 2nd year Business Administration student. Larry acted as the broker to his fellow students, charging a "commission" for his services.

According to Larry, "The early lead in the contest was taken by the instructor's team but was short lived when newly learned financial techniques were used by the student teams. The hotly contested battle between the top student teams resulted in a virtual draw. It was only after I deducted my brokerage commissions and margin interest that a clear winner emerged".

Stop'N' Go Now Open

On their own initiative, Retail Sales students turned their "mock Shop" into a real store. The Stop'N' Go, sells chips, pop, and baking to fellow students in the Employability Skills program. This exercise proved to be an invaluable lesson in inventory control, cash register operation, teamwork, basic bookkeeping and customer service! As this session draws to a close students are beginning to prepare for the final phase of the program - their work experience. The month has been full and exciting with the introduction of interac, credit card processing, merchandising, inventory control, telephone techniques and customer service.

The first intake of students are out on their workplace assignments, confident that the skills they have learned will enable them to do well with their temporary, and possible prospective employers. They have covered all topics with enthusiasm and have become confident in their ability to deal with the many aspects of being a front line employee. They are looking forward to practicing their newly acquired skills.

Integrated Natural Resources As part of the UFAWU contract this program will begin with two cycles starting February 10. The following people have been hired to teach the different components of this program; *Todd Parker*, Salmon Identification and Management (CIRM 101), *Sheila Dobie*, Pacific Herring and Groundfish Identification and Management (CIRM 102), and Commercial Fishing Methods (CIRM 202), *David Rekdal*, Fisheries Regulations (CIRM 103), and *Brian Bawtinheimer*, Fish Habitat and Restoration (CIRM 303).
