Jessica's Travels: The Dangers and Pleasures of Working in New Zealand



The Wake of Ferry Tragedy

n the 22nd of March, the BC ferry Queen of the North sank after striking a rock in Wright Sound while carrying passengers to Port Hardy from Prince Rupert. Within an hour of the collision the ferry had sunk, luckily most of the crew and passengers were evacuated, and were headed towards Hartley Bay where they spent the rest of the morning. Injured and elderly personnel were quickly air-lifted to Prince

Rupert for medical attention. As passengers and crew returned to Prince Rupert, Premier Gordon Campbell and BC Ferry President David Hahn greeted them. There were 102 passengers and approximately 16 vehicles on board at the time.

The residents of the small community of Hartley Bay are being hailed as heroes after quickly responding to the ferry's Mayday. The people of the fishing village quickly jumped into action by rescuing passengers and providing them with blankets, clothing, and hot beverages. The passengers and crew

were then transported to Prince Rupert on board the Sir Wilfred Laurier.

The Queen of the North was built in 1969, and had the capacity to hold 700 passengers and crew as well as up to 115 cars. The ferry is an extremely important link to Vancouver Island and to isolated locations such as the Queen Charlotte islands. The Queen Charlotte Islands rely heavily on the ferry to bring supplies and tourists, and the full repercussions of it's sinking are not known.

A couple from 100 Mile House are still unaccounted for in the wake of this event. They are now viewed as missing persons. The ferry's wreck lies approximately 1200 feet below the surface and is too deep for most remotely operated vehicles. Several divers were sent to determine the cause of the accident and have so far ruled our mechanical and steering errors. The ship is not salvageable due to massive destruction of the hull during it's descent. The ecological impact of the ferry's sinking is not known, but there was a considerably large diesel slick where it sank.



This fall a new course will be offered at NWCC's Prince Rupert Campus. The course CPSC 113: Computer Programming with Lego Robots will begin in September. This class uses Lego Mindstorm® Robots and Java programming to construct and operate robots to perform a series of tasks. This course will introduce students to the basic elements of programming and robot control algorithms; exploring fundamental concepts such as data types, loops, decisions, arrays, classes and objects. It will also integrate other disciplines including team work, design, engineering and electronics. This

course has a three hour weekly lab in which students are expected to make use of their time to build robots and become more familiar with the program. No previous experience with Java is required but knowledge of information technology or physics would be helpful.

Spirit of Hartley Bay

leven passengers were air lifted to Prince Rupert hospital from Hartley Bay. The oil spill is now larger than Vancouver Island but has not done any "serious" environmental damage. A submersible was sent to determine how the ship went down and possibly locate the two missing passengers. It has been suggested that the next boat that runs through this route bears the name 'Spirit of Hartley Bay' because of the hospitality and bravery of the people of Hartley Bay.

The 'Queen of the North' sunk after it hit a rock off Gil Island in Wright Sound, about 125 kilometres from Prince Rupert. David Hahn, president and CEO of BC Ferries speculates that the ship went off course, ran aground and sunk 350 metres deep. The captain, who had this position for one month was not on deck at the time because he was taking a nap, this is not uncommon in the late shift for captains to nap and leave crew members in charge. There were 102 passengers and crew on deck, two passengers Shirley Rossette and Gerald Foisey of 100 Mile House are missing and it is presumed they went down with the ship.


Robyn Mitchell a student at PRSS spoke to me about the incident, her sister Megan is a student at NWCC. Robyn says "I was pulled out of school and brought home, my dad was on the ship and we hadn't heard from him." Her father, Lawrence Mitchell, told her of the traumatic experience, "He

was awake in the night and was about to go back to sleep when there was a loud noise, he went out into the hall and a bloody person with a head wound was walking down the hall shocked and in a parka. He went back into his room, got a life jacket, tried to read the emergency instructions, and then went up on deck." The 125 metre ship had hit a rock and

was sinking. A distress call was sent. "The crew was getting people into lifeboats, lowering them into the water and then attached all the boats together. Once everyone was on they got far away from the boat, and there was a spotlight on the boat." The boat sunk in form similar to the titanic, split in half and went straight up and down with cars crashing into each other, and then it disappeared. Lawrence waited two and a half hours in the life boat for the coast guard who was near by at the time...many passengers had been brought to Hartley Bay, but he was not one of them. The Coast Guard ride home took seven hours. With his family panicking at home and his van history he was so relieved when he saw his family "he broke out of the room and he wasn't allowed and yelled for his wife. They hugged and cried, then he gave them souvenirs from the Queen of the North and went back to finish paperwork and orientation." Later he was shown saying goodbye to Megan and his wife for a second time on the news.
